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

BEEF PRODUCTION SHORT COURSE SET HERE SEPT. 4 to 8

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held Sept. 4-8 under the sponsorship of the Abernathy High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Dr. Delwin Webb, Superintendent, and Mr. Jerry Adams and Speck Cox, Teachers of Vocational

Agriculture. Mr. Frank C. Litterst, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Divi-sion of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M Univer-

of Texas A&M University with a degree in Animal Science. Much of his work was done in livestock production.

After three years of service in the U. S. Army, Mr. Litterst served as instructor in the Veterans Agriculture Program in Hays County four years and was District Sales Manager for Burress Feed Mills, Ft. Worth, Texas, four years.

He then served as Manager, Baldwin Land & Cattle Company, with ranches in Travis and Shelby Counties until 1964. This included operation of a ranch consulting business in Texas and Louisiana. He has successfully operated his own ranching and farming business consisting of both registered and commercial cattle, sheep, Angora goats, pecans and grain farming. He is a former director in the State Shorthorn Breeders Association and a member of American Angus, and Texas & Southwestern Cat-

tle Raisers Association. The short course at Abernathy is scheduled to begin Sept. 4. Monday, at 8 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be determined at registration. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Litterst will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on - the - farm instruction, according to Adams and Cox.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Dr. Delwin Webb, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Adams or Cox. An entry fee of \$3 will be

Beef Production short course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Litterst states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumers' dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Mr. Litterst indicates that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reporduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, calf crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet

'Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University", states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for

Texas A&M. "This cooperative program", states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, farm electric wiring and safety, farm electric motors, arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, pasture, and oxy-acetylene

GRASS FIELD DAY SLATED

A field day will be held September 13 at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City, State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas announced this week. The center serves Texas and

Oklahoma. Livestockmen, seed dealers, sportsmen, and others interested in the search for improved plants are being invited to attend the field day. Harvey Davis of Temple,

executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker. New grasses, forbs, legumes

and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day. Some 1200 strains of 325 plants are being grown at the center.

Chief goal of the SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs and shrubs which have dual values. Such plants are needed by landowners and operators for including in range seeding mixtures, for use in travel lane seedings, in border plantings, or for other uses.

Strains that appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other plants available commercially are then released by conservation districts to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

A new grass variety, Mason sandhill lovegrass, was certi-fied and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Selection 75 kleingrass was released in 1968. The rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the more than 2,500 boys who have lived at the Ranch since it was founded by Cal Farley in 1939.

It is expected that parents or guardians will send their respective students to school dressed and groomed neatly and discreetly. Due to the extreme difficulty of "drawing the line" of discreetness, it is ruled that shorts shall be considered inappropriate dress for regular classroom wear, (except in grades Kindergarten through 5th grade). Shirt tails shall be

worn according to design. Girls' hair should be neat and trim. Hair shall be styled, tied, or pinned so that it shall not interfere with seeing. Boys' hair should be neat and

trim, not to exceed the following limitations: Front -- not to be lower than

the eyebrows. Back -- not to extend below the collar of a standard dress

shirt and not to be curled upward at the collar. Side -- hair to be combed so

that the tops of the ears will Face -- Clean shaven except

for stdeburns that may extend to the lower lobe of the ear and be appro imately the same width and length of the ear. Sponsors of extracurricular

activities may require contestants who represent the school in activities to have hair styled in such a manner that "caring" for it will not interfere with the activity or "penalize" the school in the activity. This should not be interpreted to give a coach or director the authority to say "all boys will have a burr or flatop", but rather the right to exceed the standards set forth previously if it interferes with the activity. is the center of training for employees of local cooperatives from throughout Mid - America. Students are selected by local managers and sent to the center, where they are trained to better serve the members of the local cooperatives that own Farmland Industries.

The school is a modern facility situated on a 24-acre wooded campus about ten miles north of downtown Kansas City. Forty different subjects are taught at the school, involving nearly 2,000 students per year, Instructors for the classes are specialists in feed, fertilizer, petroleum, farm supplies and other product areas from Farm land's headquarters office in Kansas City.

Sale of Reserved Seats for the 1972 Football Season will begin August 14, 1972. Season tickets are \$8.75 per seat for the five regular season home games.






