It is CONSTANTLY brought to the attention of the Abernathy Police Department that a serious problem of double parking exists around the school grounds. This is especially true on 6th Street. During the afternoons when grade school and high school are letting out, 6th Street, 8th Street and Ave. G are bottled up. We must ask for your cooperation in this matter. 
