Antelopes To Play Lockney Here

Cats Pass Abernathy

The Antelopes were unable to cage the Idalou Wildcats Friday night, and came out on the short end of the stick 13-8.

The Antelopes opened the game on offense, and after a couple short yards on the ground, they were forced to punt. Vickers was rushed hard and the punt was short.

Idalou took over on Abernathy's 45 yard line. Idalou began at once to move the ball, and with three quick first downs, they were threatening on the three yard line. The Antelope defense dug in and held the Wildcats, saving what seemed like an easy touch down.

Finding themselves in a hole, the offense was unable to move the ball, and Vickers once again punted. This time the punt was a dandy to the Idalou 25 yard line.

The defense fired up after stopping Idalou on the three yard line, forcing the Wildcats to punt.

The Antelopes, finally out of the hole in the offense department, started moving the ball but quickly ran into a stone wall. The ball was jarred loose from Riley. Idalou was again in good scoring position, and that's exactly what they did. With 11:54 left in the second quarter, Idalou led 7 to 0.

Trying to make up for the turnover, the offense got things rolling. Riley hit Larry Lutrick on a 40 yard pass play to the Idalou 30 yard line. After a couple running plays by David McClelland and Dane Vickers, the offense looked as if they were going to bog down in spite of everything. Facing a fourth down situation, Larry Lutrick came through again. With a pass from Riley, the Antelopes had a first down on the three yard line. David McClelland took over from here, and scored with 6:32 left in the first half. The Antelopes elected to go for the two points. Lutrick once again did the job, and the score was Abernathy 8, Idalou 7.

The defense fired up after the score held the Wildcats to no gain. Eddie (Plea) Sepeda tackled the quarterback behind the line of scrimmage on a fourth down situation, and Idalou punted the ball.

Things began to look good for the offense. A fake mask penalty gave the Antelopes good field position on the 45 yard line. A couple quick pass plays to Dane Vickers—one for 40 yards—put the Antelopes in the driver's seat. After an off sides penalty by Idalou, the Antelopes had a first down and goal to go on the two yard line. Riley fired a pass to Larry Lutrick, but a green-shirted Wildcat came up with the ball and headed for the opposite end of the field. Steve Riley managed to get in front of him, stopping a sure touchdown by the Wildcats.

The defense, showing good hustle, came back fighting. They stopped the Idalou drive and caused them to kick a field goal from the 25 yard line. The attempt was no good and the half ended Abernathy 8, Idalou 7.

SECOND HALF
The Antelopes kicked to the Wildcats, and the defense began to get tough. They shut off the Idalou attack. Eddie Sepeda tackled the quarterback behind the line of scrimmage again, and Idalou gave up the football.

The offense was unable to move the ball and Vickers punted again.

The persistent defense, behind a fumble recovery by Bobby Cuevas, gave the offense another chance.

This was not to be the case. Steve Riley had his pass intercepted on the first offensive play, and the Wildcats were given the ball again.

The defense did not falter as they continued to dominate the Idalou attack. Again the Wildcats had to punt and Abernathy had control of the ball.

Thinking maybe the jinx had been broken, the offense started moving but to no avail. Dane Vickers threw a halfback pass to Larry Lutrick who was in the end zone. The pass was intercepted, and Idalou was again given the ball.

FFA FARM SKILL TEAM WINS IN AREA CONTEST

The Abernathy FFA Junior Farm Skill Team -- composed of Pete Stracener, John Hill, Ken Hendrix and Gary Nabors -- placed first in Area 1 competition, therefore qualifying for the state contest to be held at Sam Houston State University, Huntsville, Texas, Saturday, November 18.

The Farm Skill contest requires a team to demonstrate and perform a skill within a twenty minute time limit. The team is judged on: Preparation of the skill, actual performance of the skill, cleaning up practicality of the skill and participation and effectiveness of the team members.

The skill performed included tune-up and service of the Small Gasoline Engine commonly used on lawn mowers, spray units, grain augers and countless other applications. Areas covered include: Ignition system -- spark plug, points and condenser, and carburetion -- service of air cleaner and carburetor adjustments.

The Senior Farm Skill Team placed second in Area. The team members, Roger Phillips, Wes Stanfield and Gary Scoggin, demonstrated the proper use of the Tap and Die Set.

To qualify for area competition, the teams placed first in the Plainview Contest, last Wednesday. The senior chapter conducting team qualified for area by winning first place, but failed to win at area.

SCHOOL BOARD HAS TWO MEETINGS

October 30, 1972
The Board of Education met in a special session Monday night, October 30, for the purpose of instructing the architectural firm of Brasher, Goyette, and Rapier in various phases of the proposed building.

The firm was instructed to proceed with plans to heat and cool the building electrically and to include in the general contract all seating for the small auditorium. Only two items will not be included in the general contract. These are equipment for the building and curtains for the auditorium.

November 6, 1972
Meeting again in regular session Monday night, November 6, the board instructed the architectural firm in the writing of the carpet specifications, including alternate specifications on the type of materials. A date for the opening of bids will be set at a November 20th meeting of the board. It is anticipated that the general contract will be let early in December.

In other action the board examined and approved the computerized record system now being used by the school for processing all expenditures. It was pointed out that approximately 50% of the Texas schools are now using the new encumbrance accounting system, and all schools must change to this system by September of 1973.

The budget progress report was presented and accepted as was the tax report. Eighty-two percent of the local taxes have been collected.

The board appointed Donna Jean Caffey as Title I elementary teacher and approved the textbook committee for 1972-73. Members of the committee appointed are: Delwin Webb, Chairman; Curtis Davenport, General Secretary; Irene Walker, Reading-Grade 4; Larita Galloway, Reading-Grade 5; Jan Hill, Reading-Grade 7; Katherine Peters, Reading-Grade 8; Tella Walker, Reading-Grade 8; Claude Hunter, American History; Mike Auld, Civil Government; Bettie Hardin, Trigonometry; Yvonne McClung, Homemaking; Floyd Galloway, Business and Typing; Carl Iribek, Health; and Don Fondy, Kindergarten.

Proper management of residues from such crops as grain sorghum or sudan is one of the most important conservation practices in this part of Texas," states W. Y. Reece, District Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, Lubbock, Texas.

Crop Residue Management is the leaving of residue on or incorporating it into the soil surface to prevent wind erosion.

"Farmers in the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District have used this practice for years," Reece said. He further states, "It not only protects their land from blowing but also increases the amount of water that soaks into the land."


After the grain sorghum is harvested, the stubble is shredded and cut from the roots below the surface. This conserves moisture which would otherwise be lost in the second growth. The residue is cut in short pieces to make the planting operation easy the following year.

Reece gave several reasons for the proper handling of crop residues:

1. Crop residue breaks up rain drops thus allowing more water to soak into the land.
2. Soil surface is less pulverized by sub-surface tillage, therefore less subject to erosion.
3. Wind erosion is reduced because of the surface roughening factor of the residue.
4. During snow storms less drifting takes place, thus holding the snow in place and providing needed moisture for future use.
5. Decreases run-off.
6. Reduces evaporation.
7. Reduces surface crusting and aids in seedling emergence.
8. May be used in control of soil temperature.
9. Helps maintain organic matter in the soil.
10. Reduces dust accumulation in the homes of both farm and city residents.
