# **Antelopes To Play Lockney Here**

## Cats Pass **Abernathy**

The Antelopes were unable to cage the Idalou Wildcats Friday night, and came out on on the short end of the stick

The Antelopes opened the game on offense, and after a couple short yards on the ground, they were forced to punt. Vickers was rushed hard and the punt was short.

Idalou took over on Abernathy's 45 yard line. Idalou began at once to move the ball, and with three quick first downs, they were threatening on the three yard line. The Antelope defense dug in and held the Wildcats, saving what seemed like an easy touch

Finding themselves in a hole, the offense was unable to move the ball, and Vickers once again punted. This time the punt was a dandy to the Idalou 25 yard line.

The defense fired up after stopping Idalou on the three yard line, forcing the Wildcats to punt.

The Antelopes, finally out of the hole in the offense department, started moving the ball but quickly ran into a stone wall. The ball was jarred loose from Riley. Idalou was again in good scoring position, and that's exactly what they did. With 11:54 left in the second quarter, Idalou led 7 to 0.

Trying to make up for the turnover, the offense got things rolling. Riley hit Larry Lutrick on a 40 yard pass play to the Idalou 30 yard line. After a couple running plays by David McClendon and Dane Vickers, the offense looked as if they were going to bog down in spite of everything. Facing a fourth down situation, Larry came through again. With a pass from Riley, the Antelopes had a first down on the three yard line. David McClendon took over from here, and scored with 6:32 left in the first half. The Antelopes elected to go for the two points. Lutrick once again did the job, and the score

was Abernathy 8, Idalou 7. The defense fired up after the score held the Wildcats to no gain. Eddie (Flea) Sepeda tackled the quarterback behind the line of scrimmage on a fourth down situation, and Idalou punted the ball.

Things began to look good for the offense. A face mask penalty gave the Antelopes good field position on the 45 yard line. A couple quick pass plays to Dane Vickers -- one for 40 yards -- put the Antelopes in the driver's seat. After an off sides penalty by Idalou, the Antelopes had a first down and goal to go on the two yard line. Riley fired a pass to Larry Lutrick, but a green-shirted Wildcat came up with the ball and headed for the opposite end of the field. Steve Riley managed to get in front of him, stopping a sure touchdown by the Wild-

The defense, showing good hustle, came back fighting. They stopped the Idalou drive and caused them to kick a field goal from the 25 yard line. The attempt was no good and the half ended Abernathy 8, Ida-

SECOND HALF The Antelopes kicked to the

Wildcats, and the defense began to get tough. They shut off the Idalou attack. Eddie Sepeda downed the quarterback behind the line of scrimmage again, and Idalou gave up the foot-

The offense was unable to move the ball and Vickers punted again. The persistent defense, be-

hind a fumble recovery by Bobby Cuevas, gave the offense another chance. This was not to be the case !

Steve Riley had his pass intercepted on the first offensive play, and the Wildcats were given the ball again. The defense did not falter

as they conintued to dominate the Idalou attack. Again the Wildcats had to punt and Abernathy had control of the ball.

Thinking maybe the jinx had been broken, the offense started moving but to no avail. Dane Vickers threw a half back pass to Larry Lutrick who was in the end zone. The pass was intercepted, and Idalou was again given the ball.

Therefore, they left behind them their eldest daughter, Josephine, to attend school here. She is probably the first Chinese girl admitted in Abernathy school system.


## Lions Club News

The new, full-flotation truck, which can operate in moderate mud conditions in fields, has hydraulic booms that spread to cover a 20-row area to apply Slurry Mix fertilizer. Also, herbicides can be applied along with the fertilizer at the same time, making one trip



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
