) Let them do their own partying on their own time after the killing has stopped and peace agreements have been


worked out. I sincerely hope that this will be the last war. And, it should be the last war in which Americans are sent to foreign countries to be killed.

Ragland went to New Mexico in a buggy to bring Miss Lillye Moreman back to Plains in Yoakum County where they were married Nov. 14 1912 by the county judge in front of the courthouse while seated in a buggy. She and her parents had come from Wise County to Post and then to Abernathy before moving to New Mexico.

Mr. and Mrs. Ragland lived on the old home place south of town and also farmed in what is now the Hillcrest addition. He also carried the mail in a onemule buckboard from Plainview to Running Water in about 1905.

The Raglands moved to Plainview in 1928. He has been on the official board of First Methodist Church for 58 successive years. Mrs. Ragland taught a Sunday School class for 25 years.
