The game soon became one of the most popular sports in the world, not only in the playing of the game but as a spectator sport.

Almost every school system in the world--from the junior high school level to the senior college level -- participates in a program of basketball. Professional basketball in itself has become a gigantic business operation, involving millions of dollars annually.

Basketball -- from its origin in 1892 -- has been a game of fierce competition, pitting finely tuned, well organized machines against one another, each striving to beat the other. Feasting began in earnest after sundown when the 50 guests gathered around five pots of boiling water to cook and eat the specially prepared ingredients of "Hot Pot". Armed with chopsticks, bowl, and soy sauce, guests and hosts alike drop in paper thin slices of beef, lamb and chicken -which cook in a matter of seconds and are eaten just as quickly. As the meat cooking continues, the boiling water soon becomes a tasty broth, and with addition of Chinese greens and snow peas, rice noodles and mushrooms, it develops into a superlative soup. According to individual taste, tidbits are removed with chopsticks from the common pot and the broth dipped out and sampled until the






