San Angelo Pageant To Be Presented On River Banks

SAN ANGELO (Special)—For four weekends in June, visitors to San Angelo will have an opportunity to combine a history lesson with an evening of entertainment along the banks of the Concho River.

The special event will be the pageant "The Land And The River," based on the play "The

Town They Left Behind Them" by Dr. Raymond Carver of the Angelo State University faculty. A cast of 50 will dramatize the development of Fort Concho by the Department of the Army, the subsequent settlement of two communities—the respectable Ben Ficklin and the not-so-respectable Santa Ange-

la—the 1882 flood which destroyed Ben Ficklin, and finally the incorporation of the town of San Angelo.

The pageant will be presented on three stages along the banks of the Concho River in downtown San Angelo, offering the perfect setting for the play's big scene: the 1882 flood. Sound effects, lightning, and a deluge of water and debris rushing down the river will create the illusion.

Tickets are available through the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce, P.O. Box 712, San Angelo, Texas, 76901. Admission prices are \$3.50, \$2.50 and \$2.

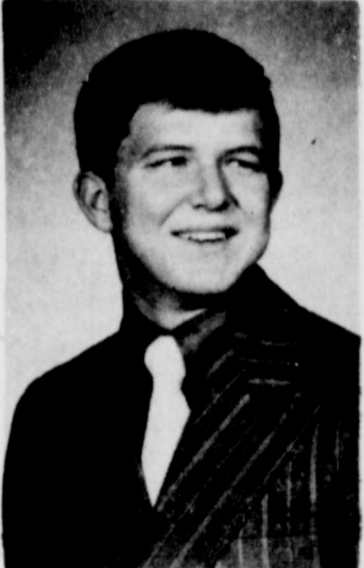
"The Land And The River" will be presented June 9, 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, 23, 28, 29 and 30.

Visitors to San Angelo June 7-9 can combine a viewing of some interesting remarks about the pageant with participation in a myriad of events scheduled for the city's first "Fiesta Del Concho."

Events will include a river parade and street dances June 7; two dances—one formal and one western—June 8; a regatta and a golf tournament.

Additional activities are scheduled on the grounds of Fort Concho, including tours, a barbecue, old fiddlers contest, and concerts of blue grass music.

Officials of Abernathy Consumers Fuel Association have signed a contract with Farm-land Industries for the erection of a large building in Abernathy to house the Consumers Fuel Association Service Center. The new facility will face east on the West Service Street. The firm's property is bounded on the east by the West Service Street, on the north by 10th Street, on the west by Avenue C and on the south by the Conoco station property line. Several huge tanks have been buried on part of that property to store many thousands of gallons of motor fuels, Farm Land Industries, located in the Kansas City area, supply much of the merchandise sold by Consumers Fuel and some other cooperatives.

Hearing On I-27 Planned

The Texas Highway Department will conduct a public hearing on June 1, 1973, at 7:30 p.m., in the Abernathy School Auditorium for the purpose of discussing Interstate 27 from 1.5 miles north of Monroe Overpass to the north city limits of Hale County in Lubbock and Hale Counties.

This hearing will be held for the purpose of discussing the recommended route and design for Interstate 27. The proposed highway project will pass through the towns of New Deal, Abernathy and Hale Center.

The proposed construction will consist of improving the existing four lane divided highway where required to conform to Interstate standards, developing 24 foot travel roadways with surfaced shoulders - multi-lane, controlled access facility with frontage roads, grade separations and interchanges. No additional right of way is anticipated in New Deal, Abernathy and Hale Center. The general right of way width on the remaining sections will vary from 340 feet to 360 feet.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design will be displayed at the public hearing and together with environmental studies and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office on Loop 445 in South Plainview, Texas, and the District Office of the Texas Highway Department at 601 Slaton Highway in Lubbock, Texas.

The State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and information concerning the relocation assistance office will be discussed, along with tentative schedules for right of way acquisition and construction.

All interested citizens are invited to attend this public hearing.

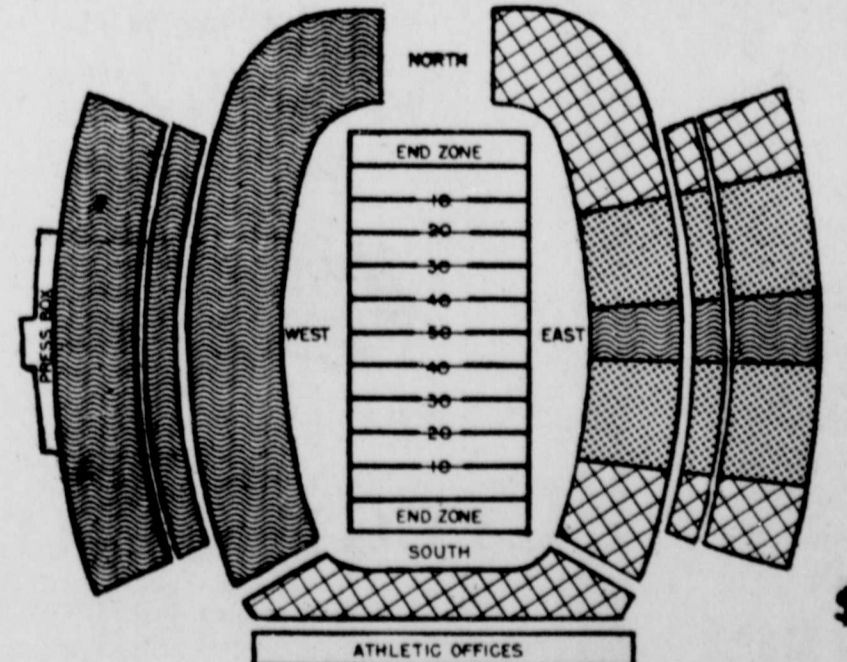
Local Lions have once again kicked off plans for the upcoming Coaches All-America Game in Lubbock Saturday, June 23, 1973.

Robinson, Area Manager, of the Commission's Dallas Office said: "We believe this new service has significantly increased our ability to provide prompt and accurate information on current Federal job opportunities as well as information about special employment programs for returning veterans." Anyone in the North Texas area may call toll-free 1-800-492-4400 (in the immediate Dallas area, the number to call is 749-3150). The North Texas area includes such localities as Amarillo, Lubbock, Wichita Falls, Ft. Worth, Texas kana Abilene, Sherman, Waco and Tyler. Applications for employment, job information, and other Civil Service pamphlets will be mailed on request.

Mrs. Robinson emphasized that this new service is a means to provide prompt Civil Service employment information to all segments of the public and does not imply an immediate increase in Federal manpower needs. This would be used exclusively for the dissemination of weather information on a county wide basis (or on a local basis as weather conditions dictated).

Any individual in the county desiring to participate would simply tune into the frequency for weather information.

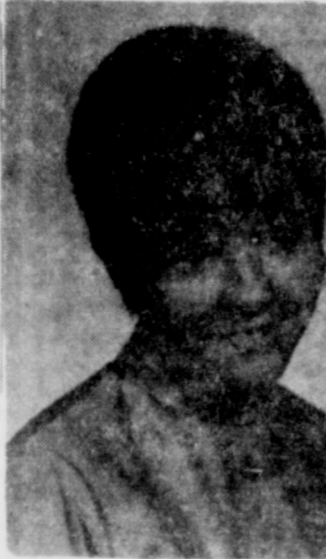

Any individual in the county desiring to participate would simply tune into the frequency for weather information.

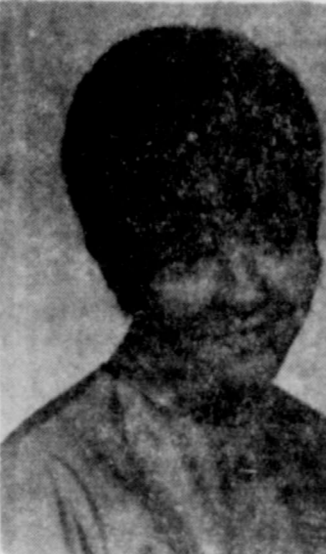

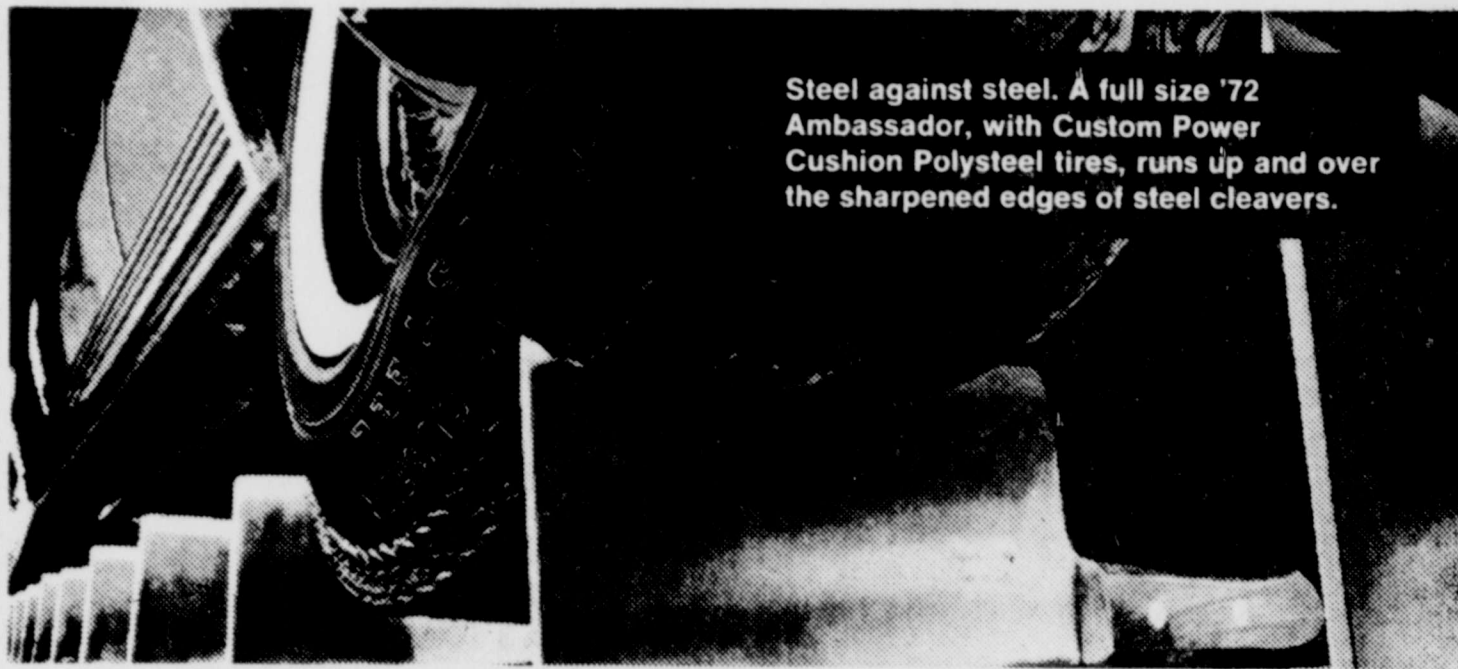

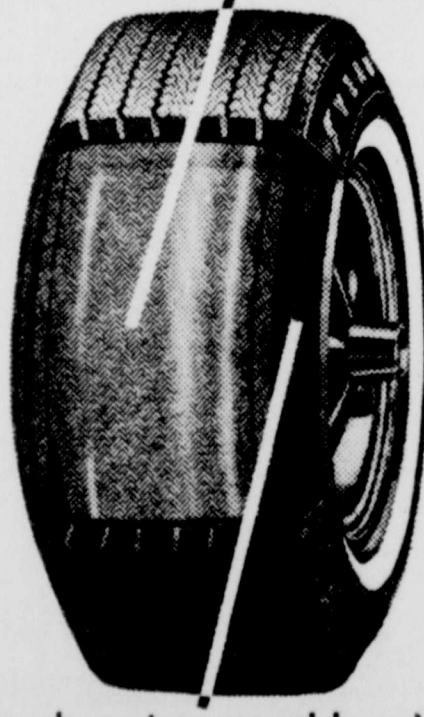
