PROTECT HOME FROM BURGLARY DURING VACATION

Homemaking Tips From The Office of County Extension Agent Wynon Mayes

PROTECT HOME FROM VACATION BURGLARY

Protect your home against burglary while away on vacation. Any burglary means a severe budget upset -- especially if insurance isn't adequate. But even with excellent coverage, many items have sentimental as well as financial value -- and simply can't be replaced. Therefore it's crucial to lessen the possibility of burglary by eliminating everything that suggests the house is vacant. A family can do several things before leaving to achieve this.

For one, cancel all daily deliveries and discontinue any newspapers. A yard full of yellowing newspapers is an open invitation to thieves.

Also, connect at least one lamp to an automatic timer so it turns on at dusk and off at bedtime -- creating a lived-in appearance. Thieves watch for lights left on too long as well as darkened houses. Leave shades or blinds in a normal position -- not completely closed. Close and lock all windows and doors -- including those in the garage and outdoor storeroom.

Use pin-tumbler cylinder locks on all outside doors. These locks require a key to both lock and unlock them.

Arrange to have the lawn cut, plants watered and other yard work done. Make an arrangement with the post office or a neighbor to either hold or forward all mail. Notify local police and a neighbor as to date of departure and return. Leave a house key with a neighbor or a friend, informing him of your itinerary and destination. Give him a description of the family car and license number so state police can locate you if necessary. Store valuables in a safety deposit box.

Make a current household inventory. In case of burglary, an accurate inventory helps

determine what items are missing -- simplifying insurance collection.

CREDIT CARD CONVENIENCES

Credit cards offer several advantages, but they also can create financial problems. The credit card is convenient -- but a temptation to overspend. Its greatest advantage is convenience. Using credit cards, travelers and consumers don't have to carry much cash. In fact, if several cards are used, a person can do almost anything without exchanging any currency.

Users also can take advantage of bargains -- even if he or she doesn't have cash on hand at the time.

Most credit card companies don't charge interest if bills are promptly paid. However, if payments are "stretched out" over a long period of time, interest charges will increase.

As an added bonus, family bookkeeping is simplified. Companies itemize monthly statements, so the family sees exactly "where the money went".

On the negative side, some people tend to overspend when using credit cards -- which can seriously affect their budget.

USDA SCHEDULES GROCER MEETING TO DISCUSS FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

A meeting to discuss the Food Stamp Program with Hale County grocers will be conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on Wednesday, June 27. The program will open in Hale County on August 1.

The meeting is set for 7:30 p. m. in the Progress Room of the Chamber of Commerce Building at 710 Fifth Street in Plainview, according to Ellis P. Schmid, food program specialist with the Lubbock field office of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint grocers with food stamp program operations and responsibilities. "Store owners and employees must understand Food Stamp Program operating procedures before a store can be certified," Schmid pointed out, "so it is important that county grocers attend this meeting."

The Food Stamp Program is a cooperative effort involving the State Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Under this program, families certified as eligible by the welfare office can buy USDA food coupons which are used like cash at retail stores authorized by USDA to redeem the coupons.

In addition to the coupons they buy, needy families are given "bonus" coupons to enable them to obtain better diets. The value of the "bonus" coupons is determined by the size of the family, its income, resources and other factors. Cooperating banks redeem the coupons through the Federal Reserve System.
