

BUSES READY TO RO'LL AUGUST 22

H. V. Gallaway, bus fore-man, said eight school buses will be ready to roll on that many routes the morning of August 22, the first day of school in Abercathy. In addition to the eight route buses, the school has three spare school buses for route emergencies and for travel to ball games, etc. The fleet has one new bus this year, a 54passenger International.

School bus drivers must have physical examinations, and the Department of Public Safety must inspect their chaffeur's license.

Mr. Gallaway joins school officials in seeking motorists cooperation in regard to safety of children riding the buses. A motorist is required by state law to come to a complete stop when following or meeting a school bus stopped to take-on or discharge passengers. After coming to a complete stop, the motorist may proceed at a speed not to exceed 10 miles per hour, or less if the situa-

RAIN MAY HELP CROPS THRIVE DURING AUGUST

Rains started in this area Thursday, July 26, adding moisture to the general rain in the area July 21. Farmers are hopeful that enough moisture will be stored in the land to make crops thrive during the usual long, hot month of August, one of the very critical months for cotton, grain sor-ghum and soybean crops.

Cautious optimism prevails in the area concerning the best prospects in many years for bumper cotton, grain and soy-bean crops. And, it is hoped that the possibility of high prices for these crops will materialize at harvest time.

Those who depend upon agriculture, and this includes the business people as well as the farmer, are fearful of getting their hopes too high at this stage of a crop year. We have learned in the past, and in the hard way, that a grain crop isn't made until it is in the elevators and a cotton crop isn't made until the bales roll

out of the presses at the gins.
Another thing we have learned the hard way is the fact that cotton can be irrigated too much in mid-to-late August. A lot of beautiful, but fruitless, cotton stalks have been raised in this area in the past due to irrigating it too late in August, especially if a wet September followed.

Joe Chambers, local weather observer, reported 1.67 inches of rain in Abernathy Monday night. This brings rainfall for July to between three and four inches. At news wrap-up time Tues-day morning, July 31, clouds were heavy, threatening more rain to close out the month.

Mouth-watering ears of ripening corn are tempting the palates of area folks but persons are warned to leave the golden ears alone. Most corn patches have been sprayed with pesticides and are unsafe for human or animal consumption.

Pesticides used to spray the corn which is being grown as a grain crop render the food and fodder unsafe for a period up to 40 days which will, of course, extend past the mature "roasting ear" stage.

Persons should not follow the years-old custom of "helping themselves to a mess of corn" without checking with owners to see if the corn patch as been
