ANTELOPES HOST OLD RIVALS, THE HC OWLS, FRIDAY Lose To

Tahoka

A friendly rivalry which began before the AHS Antelopes had a sodded field on which to play football will be renewed Friday night when the Hale Center Owls come to Abernathy. The longtime rivals will play on Antelope Field starting at 8 p.m.

The Abernathy Antelopes took on a revenge-minded Tahoka Bulldog team Friday night and found them to be a little mad before the evening was over.

Abernathy got things rolling by kicking off to Tahoka. For the early part of the first quar-ter the ball exchanged hands without success to either side. With 7:25 left in the first quarter, Tahoka recovered an Antelope fumble on the forty yard line and moved the rest of the way on their first play from scrimmage. Extra point was no good and Tahoka took an early

The Antelopes didn't take the Tahoka touchdown sitting down. They immediately be-gan to move the ball and, with a number of good plays, ad-vanced the ball to the "forbidden country" for the Ante-lopes--the Tahoka one yard line. Ray Martin kept his cool and pushed the ball over for six points with 11:56 left in the second quarter. Rodriguez kicked the extra point, and Abernathy was back in the game 7-6.

Disaster struck the Antelopes late in the second quarter. After stopping the Bulldogs and forcing them to punt, the Antelopes took over on their own 15 yard line. The ball was fumbled and Tahoka recovered, paydirt staring them in the face. Three plays later on a pass in the end zone, the Bulldogs were out in front again

The Antelopes came fighting back and advanced the ball deep in Tahoka territory, but were unable to push it over for a score. Tahoka took over. The first half ended with the Lopes behind 13-7.

SECOND HALF The 'Lopes opened up with the ball but were unable to move against the Tahoka defense. They punted to the Bulldogs. Taking full advan-tage of the situation, Tahoka pushed the ball over from the one yard line midway through the third quarter. The score read 19-7 in favor of the Bull-

The Antelopes were unable to generate any fire under the offense and gave up the foot-ball on a fumble. The defense dug in and held the Bulldogs causing them to punt the ball back to the 'Lopes.

The ball changed hands a number of times during the early part of the fourth quarter with neither team generating a sizeable offensive punch. It wasn't until the final two minutes of the game that the Antelopes, one might say, got the last laugh. David McClendon scored from the four yard line, extra point was good, and the Antelopes moved to withing five points of the Bulldogs. Time ran out and the final score read Tahoka 19 Aber-

nathy 14. The Antelopes will once again face a revenge-filled team this Friday night. The Hale Center Owls will come to town in hopes of making up for the defeat suffered them last year. The 'Lopes will have to continue to improve as they have been doing the last two down the season schedule, things will continue to get rougher. One bright side seems to be coming up for the team. 

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by

the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days; Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular

session or special session; Provide that no appro-priation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial

estimates. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

'The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the mem-bers of the legislature, effective in January,
