But, as nature would have it, dogs bred and along comes a new supply to replace those that have vanished for one reason or another.

The papers are full of news concerning dogs attacking or mauling people, from adults down to very small babies; but, being human, we only relate to things that affect us personally. The thought of something terrible like a dog mauling or killing someone in Abernathy is taken lightly. After all, it will never happen here. But it has happened in Abernathy. Thanks to the quick action by two ladies who happened along at the right time, the life of a small boy was spared.

Tuesday afternoon Layton Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Johnson, was riding his bicycle in the north part of the city when he was attacked by two large German sheperds. Mrs. Lee Echols and Mrs. Roy Cannon just happeded to be in the right spot at the right time and managed to run off the dogs. The two ladies felt that the dogs would have killed the boy if no one had come by. Layton fortunately had the forethought to cover his face with his arms. Dr. Gregory said the boy required several

Layton was a very lucky individual in that he was not injured more seriously or even killed. The next child or adult may not be so lucky. Is it going to take a tragedy in Abernathy to prove that it can happen in our town. When are we as a community going to do something about the dog situation that has plagued us for some time.

Suggestions are a good thing and dog ordinances are necessary and in force. We can have a list one mile long on how to cure the dog problem, but if nothing is done or attempted the situation will remain the same.

No one person or group can be blamed for the dog situation. It is not the aim of this article to pick on anyone or any groups concerning dogs. The responsibility belongs to the entire community. Until the entire community does something, cross your fingers that some member of your family isn't killed or mauled by a dog.




