### CLYDE TO SELL RESERVED SEATS BEGINNING AUGUST 6

CLYDE — For the first time in several years, Clyde Schools will sell reserve seats for the high school football games for the 1973 season.

Two sections of the west stands have been reserved. 570 seats between the 40-yard lines and included in the reserved sections. All seats are numbered in these sections and a reserved seat ticket will be necessary to secure one of these seats.

Tickets will go on sale August 6th at the office of the superintendent and will continue until September 6th. Reserved seat tickets not purchased prior to the first game will be sold at the gate for each individual game.

The price of the season reserved seat tickets will be the same as general admission tickets purchased at the gate, \$1.50 per game. Reserved seat tickets purchased at the gate will be \$1.75 and only those not sold in advance will be available.

An option to purchase the same seat tickets for subsequent seasons will be included in the first year sale.

### COUNTY PETROLEUM HELPS TO SATISFY DEMANDS

BAIRD — The petroleum industry in Callahan County has played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy to unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Callahan was one of 190 Texas 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The county ranked 138th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$3.4 million. The sale of crude oil brought \$3.1 million; natural gas \$300,000.

But despite this record year, due in large part to 9 months of production at 100-percent of the maximum efficient rate, the nation's largest producer of petroleum could not produce enough to satisfy demand.

"To further stimulate production, we need a restoration of the open market force," said Robert A. Buschman of San Antonio, president of the Association.

"This would produce two much needed effects: First, it would channel the state's petroleum

products to the most efficient and highest priority uses; second, it would help provide part of the capital needed so desperately to build refineries and superports and to carry on expensive exploration and production activities," Buschman added.

This study by the Association also shows that production last year in Callahan County resulted in the payment of \$427,000 to royalty owners.

The state of Texas received \$167,000 in production taxes from county wells; \$142,000 on crude oil output and \$25,000 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas producers and developers spent \$2.3 million drilling 103 wells in the county last year, with \$1 million of that figure lost in 61 dry holes.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 123 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1972 and shared a payroll of \$582,000.

Processing plant also added to the county's economy: Two natural gas processing plants with a total daily capacity of 10 million cubic feet, according to the Oil and Gas Journal.

## Clyde Civil Defense Coordinator Gives Tips For, Tornado Safety

CLYDE — Clyde Civil Defense Coordinator would like to remind the citizens of Clyde and the Clyde area that tornadoes can occur anytime and anywhere. Most tornadoes occur during the spring and summer months.

Tornadoes are spawned by severe thunderstorms and are only one of the thunderstorm's hazards. Lightning is the worst killer. Stay indoors and away from electrical appliances while the storm is in your area. Heavy thunderstorms can also cause flash flooding. Be careful where you take shelter.

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action can save your life. Plan your place of shelter in advance. If you are at home, take shelter in the basement or under heavy furniture near the center of your home. In schools, move to shelter areas or to the interior hallways always on the lowest floor.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. You may minimize damage by securing your trailer with cables anchored in a concrete footing or by steel bands across the top of the trailer, which are anchored in concrete.

Since we never know when or where a tornado will strike, we should observe these precautions. During the time of possible severe weather in our area the Clyde Civil Defense Volunteers will be out at predetermined observation points. If a tornado is sighted the warning will

be given on radio and television, also by warning of the fire siren, Remember the signals. One constant blast of three to five minutes would mean a tornado has been sighted in the area. A wavering, up and down, signal of three to five minutes would mean to take shelter immediately. You should stay tuned to radio or television and keep watch. Report any sighting immediately to the Fire Department. They will sound the warning and notify the National Weather Service who will broadcast the information on the local radio and television stations. When you call, give the location of the sighting and the direction of travel of the tornado.

Our community has increased in size considerably during the past few years. The Fire Department has added a considerable amount of new equipment and needs able-bodied volunteers to strengthen their force. The Fire Department coordinates its personnel with Civil Defense during time of disaster and severe weather. If you live in the Clyde community and are willing to help serve your community, contact Fire Chief Art Roady or any member of the Fire Department.

## Hay Crops Should Be Analyzed For Nutrients Content

BAIRD — Forage testing is one of the many tools farmers and ranchers can use to decrease winter feed costs. With the cost of protein and uncertain supplies of various protein sources, forage nutrients can be a big factor in feed costs.

All sorghums and other hay crops should be analyzed for nutrient content.

To insure an adequate protein content, hay should be harvested prior to maturity. If cutting is delayed to full heading, protein content of the hay can be decreased to as low as 2 to 3 percent. Sorghum and other hay crops when harvested prior to or just at the boot stage, could contain as much as 12 - 14 percent protein. As you can see from these figures, hay harvested at the right time can decrease your winter feed costs substantially.

Producers who rely on hay for winter feed can get their hay analyzed by sending a sample to the Texas A&M Forage Testing Laboratory. Form and mailing bags are available at the County Extension Office in the Courthouse in Baird.


