### Southwestern Public Service Reveals Future Improvements

### **SWPS Annual** Report Given

More than \$266,000,000 will be invested in new equipment and improvements during the next five years by Southwestern Public Service Company, Roy Tolk, chair-man and president of the electric company, announced

New generating facilities to be installed during the 5year period will increase the capability of the system by almost 1-million kilowatts. bringing the total capability to approximately 3-million kilowatts.

One of the new generating stations included in this 5year program is the addition to the Nichols Plant, northeast of Amarillo, Construction has just recently started and completion is scheduled for June of 1976. It will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as its primary fuel. Long-term con-tracts with the Atlantic Richfield Company have been negotiated for low-sulphur coal from Wyoming, thus assuring an entirely adequate

supply of this fuel.
Scheduled for completion in mid-1974 is a 256,000 kil-owatt unit at Jones Station near Lubbock. This will bring the total capability of this plant to 512,000 kilowatts and it will become the largest of Southwestern's ten interconnected generating sta-

"In the latter part of the 5-year period, projections call for another coal-fired generating unit to be built, probably in the north part of e company's service It will be in the 350-450 housand kilowatt range, deading on the load require-

nts at that time," Tolk "In order to assure a clean env ronment when using coal as the primary fuel, it is necessary to spend an additional 30-percent of the cost of the unit for equipment to prevent objectionable products of combustion from reaching the atmosphere. The installation of both electrostatic precipitators and stack gas scrubbers will insure that we equal or exceed applicable stack gasemmision standards," Tolk said.

"Southwestern's peak load for 1973 was 1,758,000 kilo-watts and that is expected to climb to 2,392,000 kilowatts by 1978. The addition of these new generating facilities will more than take care of that increase," Tolk added.

Conservation of the area's water supply will continue to be a prime consideration at Southwestern Public Service Company's electric generating stations. When the two units now under construction are completed, they will save, on the average day, 14,000,000 gallons of potable water through the use of sewage effluent. That's the equivalent of the daily water needs of a city of 100,000

people.
Another important construction project that is a part of the 5-year program and currently under way, is a 230,000 volt line for the interconnected transmission system and make the movement of power between major generating stations and the areas of greatest use more efficiant, reliable and eco-nomical. This project is also scheduled for completion in

mid-1974. Looking toward the future, Southwestern Public Service Company is continuing itsefforts to help make the generation of electricity by nuclear fusion a reality through its membership in the Texas atomic Energy Research Foundation. Also, the company is actively engaged in an experimental project with the Occidental Petroleum Corporation to produce oil from shale by in situ combustion. The test project 30 miles west of Rifle, Colorado, has succeeded in creating permeability in the forma-tion and thus obtaining an oil

flow.

#### CITY LEASES FARM PLOTS IT OWNS

The Abernathy City Council met in regular session Monday, December 10, 1973, at the City Hall. Bids were received and

awarded on the three city farms. The successful bidders were C. W. Tatum for the City Sewer Farm; Ronnie J. Myatt for the City Airport Farm; and Tommy Wages for the City Farm. All leases are three years beginning January
1, 1974, and expiring Decem-

ber 31, 1976.
Bids were also received on a new Civil Defense Warning System for the city which will replace the outdated and inadequate system now in use. The new system will provide advance warning should cir-cumstances warrant. Assistance was received from the Division of Defense & Disaster Relief; Texas Department of Public Safety in planning of a system which will provide warning of possible danger or disaster approaching the area. A matching funds grant has been awarded the city in the amount of \$2.555.00 from the state in obtaining and installation of this system. Three bids were received for the new warning system with Texas Distributors of Police Supplies submitting the low bid of \$4,156.64. Following a review of all bids for compliance with specifications a

bid will be accepted. No bids were received for the city gasoline supply for 1974 because of the present fuel situation. The city will secure gasoline from dealers as it is available. The city has adopted certain policies to help conserve the fuel.

Ordinance #195 was passed and approved by the council which provides for the placement of traffic control devices at intersections indicated by

the ordinance. Two proposed ordinances were tabled to allow further study and review. These ordinances pertain to a revision or the present ordinances regulating dogs and cats within the city, and adoption of City Code and Codification of City Code and Codification of City Ordinances which has been recently prepared. These will be reconsidered at the

next regular meeting. Attendance at the meeting included Mayor J. Pete Thompson, Mayor Pro-tem Billy Shipman, Councilmen J. L. Miller, M. S. Stevens, Clifton Newton, Bobby Cunningham, and City Manager Glen Metcalf.
