



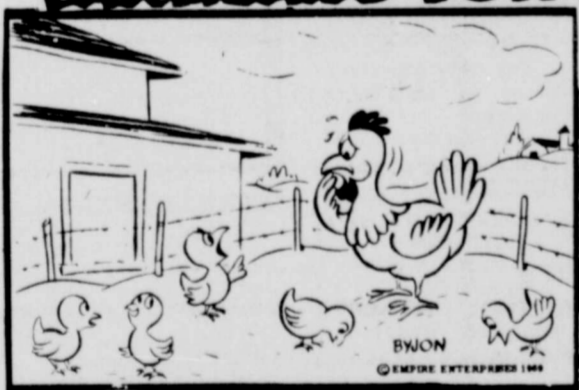

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 198

An ordinance regulating the keeping of dogs and cats in the City of Abernathy, requiring the licensing and vaccination of all dogs and cats kept in the City of Abernathy; providing for the impounding of dogs and cats found running at large; providing for the impounding of dogs and cats that are not licensed and vaccinated; establishing a city dog and cat pound; providing for fees for the redemption of dogs and cats so impounded; and the procedure for redeeming such dogs and cats; providing for the destruction of dogs and cats not so redeemed by the owner or purchaser at a sale by some person other than the City of Abernathy; prescribing the duties of the Chief of Police pertaining to the enforcement of this ordinance; providing for a dog and cat catcher; declaring barking dogs to be a nuisance; declaring it a nuisance and a misdemeanor to keep dogs and cats under certain conditions; providing for the killing of rabid or vicious dogs or cats; providing for the enforcement of this ordinance; providing for a severance clause; repealing all ordinances in conflict with this ordinance; and providing a penalty for the violation hereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Abernathy:

SECTION 25: PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Any person who violates or fails to comply with any provisions or provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00 and any person who shall aid, abet or assist in the violation of any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00.
