Blue Ribbon Animals Ready For Stock Show

(By Sam Hunley)

A general meeting was held at Graham's Restaurant on January 29, 1974, to organize the annual Abernathy Livestock Show to be held March 4 and 5.

The event has produced a great deal of enthusiasm throughout the South Plains area and continues to grow larger and better as each year rolls around.

Administration heads and committee members are as follows: Judge, Mac Heald; Superintendent of the show, Harvey Lutrick; Assistant Superintendent, Lewis Lutrick; Swine superintendent, Pee-Wee Myatt; Sheep superintendent, Len Shadden; Beef superintendent, Don McKenzie; Bam superintendent, Jerry Oswalt; Finance chairman, Larry Griffin; Trophy chairman, Leland Phillips; Publicity chairman, Steve Hill.

Rules and regulations concerning all phases of the show have been set up by the various committee members to enable both owner and animal to have a fair and equal participation in the events to be held. Following is a list of these rules.

SHOW RULES
(A vet will be available to check all animals before unloading, and health papers will be issued at this time.)

I. OWNERSHIP
A. All Swine and Beef Cattle breeding stock shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year, and exhibited by 4-H and FFA members of Abernathy public schools.
B. All Swine and Lambs shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year.
C. All Steers must be owned prior to September 1 of each year.

II. SIFTING: The General Superintendent and the division superintendents shall have the authority to sift any undesirable or questionable animals entered in the show.
III. CLASSIFICATION: The superintendents of each division shall set up the classes in the manner that they wish, which will be for the betterment of the show.

IV. LOSS OR INJURY TO EXHIBITOR OF ANIMALS: The Abernathy Project Show shall not be responsible for any injury or loss to exhibitor or his animal/animals or spectators, while incurred at the show.

V. WEIGHTS: Steers--750 to 1200 lbs.; Barrows--180 to 240 lbs. with 10 lb. tolerance; Lambs--75-120 lbs. with 5 lb. tolerance; Gilts--180-240 lbs. with 10 lb. tolerance.

VI. NUMBER OF ENTRIES: Steers--no limit; Lambs--no limit; Barrows--4 per exhibitor; Breeding Gilts--5 per exhibitor.

VII. PRIZE MONEY: (listed 1st, 2nd and 3rd place) Steers--\$15, \$10, \$5; Barrows--\$5, \$3, \$2; Lambs--\$5, \$3, \$2; Breeding Gilts--\$5, \$3, \$2.

VIII. ARRIVAL TIME: Weighing shall begin at 2:00 p.m., March 4th and all entries shall be in place not later than 7:00 p.m.

IX. TAGS:
A. Beef Cattle--Steers shall wear tail tags.
B. Swine--1. Barrow shall be ear tagged with white tags in right ear. 2. Gilts shall be tagged with yellow tags in right ear.

X. CONTESTANT NUMBERS: Each contestant shall be assigned a number and shall wear it while exhibiting their animal.
XI. SHOWMANSHIP AWARDS: Showmanship awards shall be given to the outstanding showman in the following divisions:
A. Beef Cattle
B. Swine
C. Sheep
D. Purina Award--4-H, FFA Outstanding Youth, sponsored by Plains Grain.

XII. CHRIS BENN AWARD: The Chris Benn award shall be awarded by the Lion's Club President immediately following the presentation of the showmanship awards.
XIII. TIME OF JUDGING: Judging shall begin at 2:00 p.m. on March 5th in the following order:
A. Gilts
B. Barrows
C. Lambs
D. Steers

The Abernathy Antelopes finished their 1973-74 season with a second place showing in the district race and a 19-9 season record. Early expectations of another district championship fell short by a mere handful of points as the Lockney Longhorns defeated the Antelopes twice to win the title.

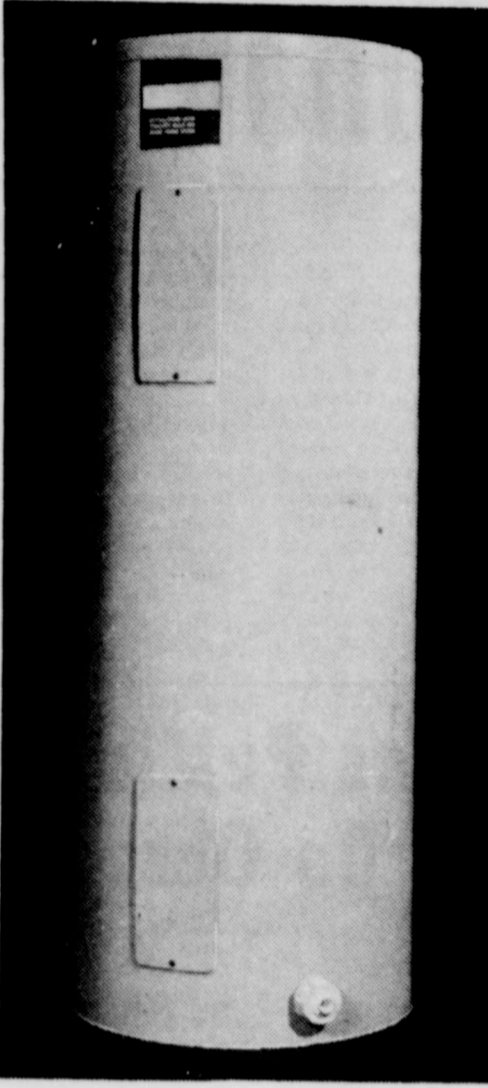

MITZI J. WEST IS HONORED

MITZI WEST IS FAMILY LEADER OF TOMORROW

Mitzi J. West has been named Abernathy High School's 1974 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow. Miss West won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors here and throughout the country Dec. 4. She will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living and also remains eligible for state and national honors.

From the ranks of all school winners in the state, A State Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America", a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with a faculty advisor, will gather in Washington, D. C., in April, for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city and Minneapolis, Minn. During the tour, personal observations and interviews are added to state level judging which results in the selection of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The test, personal observations and interviews are all prepared and conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

This year 703,074 students from 14,463 schools were enrolled in the program. Approximately nine million students have taken part in the program since its inception in the 1954-55 school year and, with this year's grants, total scholarship awards will exceed \$2 million.

FUNDS FOR CENTER ARE PROVIDED

Grant processing for the state was performed by the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, a division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.



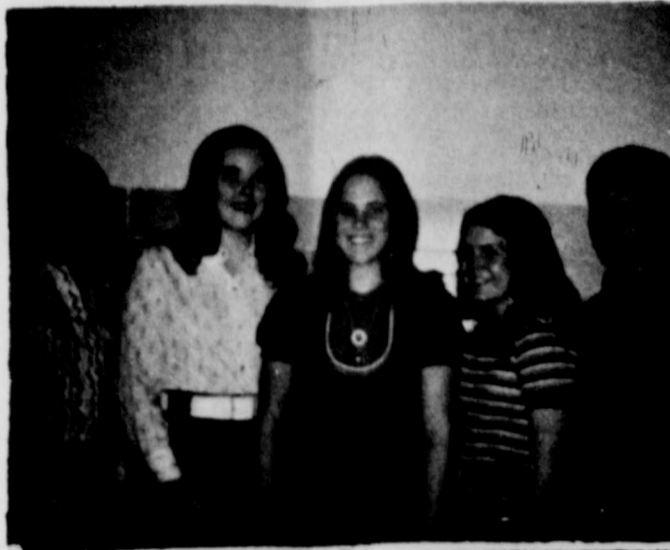

HALE TOP RYE PRODUCER IN TEXAS

AUSTIN -- Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced that Hale County was the state's leading county in rye production in 1973.

Rye production in the county increased significantly from 26,000 bushels in 1972 to a record 82,000 bushels in 1973. This was an increase of 56,000 bushels. Farmers in Hale County harvested 3,000 acres of rye and averaged 27.3 bushels per acre. In 1972 the average yield was 26.0 bushels.

Commissioner White said that total rye production for the state was 648,000 bushels. "Rye is an important crop, and we are proud that Texas ranked in the top ten rye producing states," White said. Texas farmers harvested 35,000 acres of rye and averaged 18.5 bushels per acre.

TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF H. E. RICHTER

(The following tribute to the memory of H. E. Richter, who died last November, was written by his granddaughter, Susanne Langley Wall, daughter of Earnest and Helen Langley of Hereford.)

H. E. RICHTER--FIFTY YEARS IN ABERNATHY

H. E. Richter and I walked hand in hand together through the fields of cotton. We looked after the cattle and as they drank from the windmill tank, we took a cool drink from the dipper. At home again, I followed him around the garden as we looked for the okra that was ready to pick. "You can't be Boppa's girl unless you like okra," he would say. "Look Boppa, I found some asparagus," I exclaimed in reply. Then, to my delight he found some ripe strawberries to share with me before he began hoeing. I had learned to wait for him outside the chicken coop while he gathered the eggs. Often, when I was very small I accompanied Boppa into the pen to feed the bull. There was never a need to fear as long as I was with him.

One of the most important men in my life was H. E. Richter. Some of my most precious memories are those I shared with him. As his eldest grandchild I gave him the name, Boppa, when I was very small. Thus, he became affectionately known as Boppa to nine grandchildren and the rest of the family as well. In fact, he would pretend not to hear if we called him granddaddy. We all loved the stories he told and the songs he taught us. As I grew older I began to appreciate them even more.

Some of Boppa's favorite tales were about the earlier days when he spent farming and ranching in the Texas Hill Country. Boppa's father, Hermann Richter, was five years old when he made the journey with his parents from Germany to Texas in 1855. They bought land in Burnet County five years later, where Hermann Richter grew into manhood and raised his own family. Boppa's mother, Marie Giesecke, was also German. Thus, this German heritage remained a strong

influence throughout my grandfather's life. The Richter place, where he was born on December 13, 1855, is still standing on Richter property near Marble Falls. At that time the Richter homestead was part of the Double Horn community, which had its own post office and a one room school house. Boppa attended school there until the 5th grade, when he began riding on horseback to school in Marble Falls. He loved to tell how he finished second in his class--of three students!

When he was quite a young man, Boppa made several trips to the Panhandle. In 1902 he came by rail, sleeping in a boxcar with furniture and cattle he was taking to Plainview for a relative. The train took him to Canyon and from there he made the four-day trip across the plains by horseback to Plainview. Boppa rode one horse with a calf thrown over the saddle, lead another horse and drove the remaining cattle. One of the things that impressed him was the hospitality of the people when he needed to stop for food and drink. Several years later he again made the journey. This time he rode in a horse-drawn wagon. His observation about Lubbock, after camping for the night on what is now the Texas Tech site, was that, "Lubbock was too small to be stopping for!"

On January 25, 1914, my grandfather married Helene Klappenbach, at the Johnson City ranch home of her parents, Richard and Eva Klappenbach. For most of the next ten years the young couple farmed and ranched on the Richter place, where they bought part of the old ranch with his brother, Walter Richter. Boppa's pride and joy there was his pecan orchard, where he successfully grafted paper shell to the wild pecan. The birth of four children and their rapid growth to school age soon began to worry their parents, the school house being a great distance from home. The land also yielded little and these considerations resulted in the Richters' long move to the Panhandle.

Boppa moved his family to Abernathy December 19, 1923. Here he was able to continue many of his farming activities, including raising cattle. He and his brother,

Bill, also formed an insurance business, together with an arm of the Federal Farm Loan Association; and for a brief period they owned the Abernathy Review. He also held the offices of City Secretary and Justice of the Peace. His memberships include being a Mason for over 50 years, a charter member of the Abernathy Lions Club, and a member of the Methodist Church.

While all of these activities may have contributed to a fulfilling life for him, some of my grandfather's greatest joy was found in just being with people. The house on Ave. K would often be filled with piano music, children, grandchildren and many others. His sister, Manna, often provided the music while we all sang. Then Boppa would lead the activity by dancing with me, my sisters and cousins -- and anyone else who wanted to join the fun! Boppa was always especially happy to hear a German greeting come his way. This would inevitably be followed by a lively conversation "auf Deutsch". Singing German songs was also a favorite pastime, much to the delight of his grandchildren! The Lions Club will remember how he loved singing "O, Du Lieber Augustin!" at the meetings.

The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held in Abernathy City Hall within the boundaries of the above named City and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State Holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this City Council will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. The City Secretary of the City of Abernathy shall forthwith issue a notice of said election by posting copies of this order within the boundaries of said City, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date of said election.
