Dear Mr. Davenport:
The parimutuel gambling issue that will be on the May 4th election ballot is one issue that all citizens of Texas should be ready to vote against. Let me name four reasons why we should oppose it.

1. Parimutuel gambling preys upon the underprivileged people of the state. 80% or more of the bets placed are \$2 bets. The poor people who cannot afford to lose \$2 are the ones who are hurt.
2. It hurts the business men because of unpaid bills and lack of money to make necessary purchases. To argue for legalized gambling is to argue to allow the government to swindle the public.
3. Parimutuel gambling will corrupt the government officials of our state. Illegal gambling on the side attracts the organized crime people, who in turn will spend large sums of money to protect their illegal operations.
4. Parimutuel gambling is a deliberate attempt by the government leaders to peddle false information to the people of Texas in order to misinform them. The national average for revenue received by a state through legalized gambling is 1.4%. Some say that parimutuel gambling will bring in as much as thirty million dollars in state taxes. That sounds like a lot of money, but when you stop to think, it is less than 1% of our state needs. I believe it's 1% that we, in the State of Texas, can get along without.

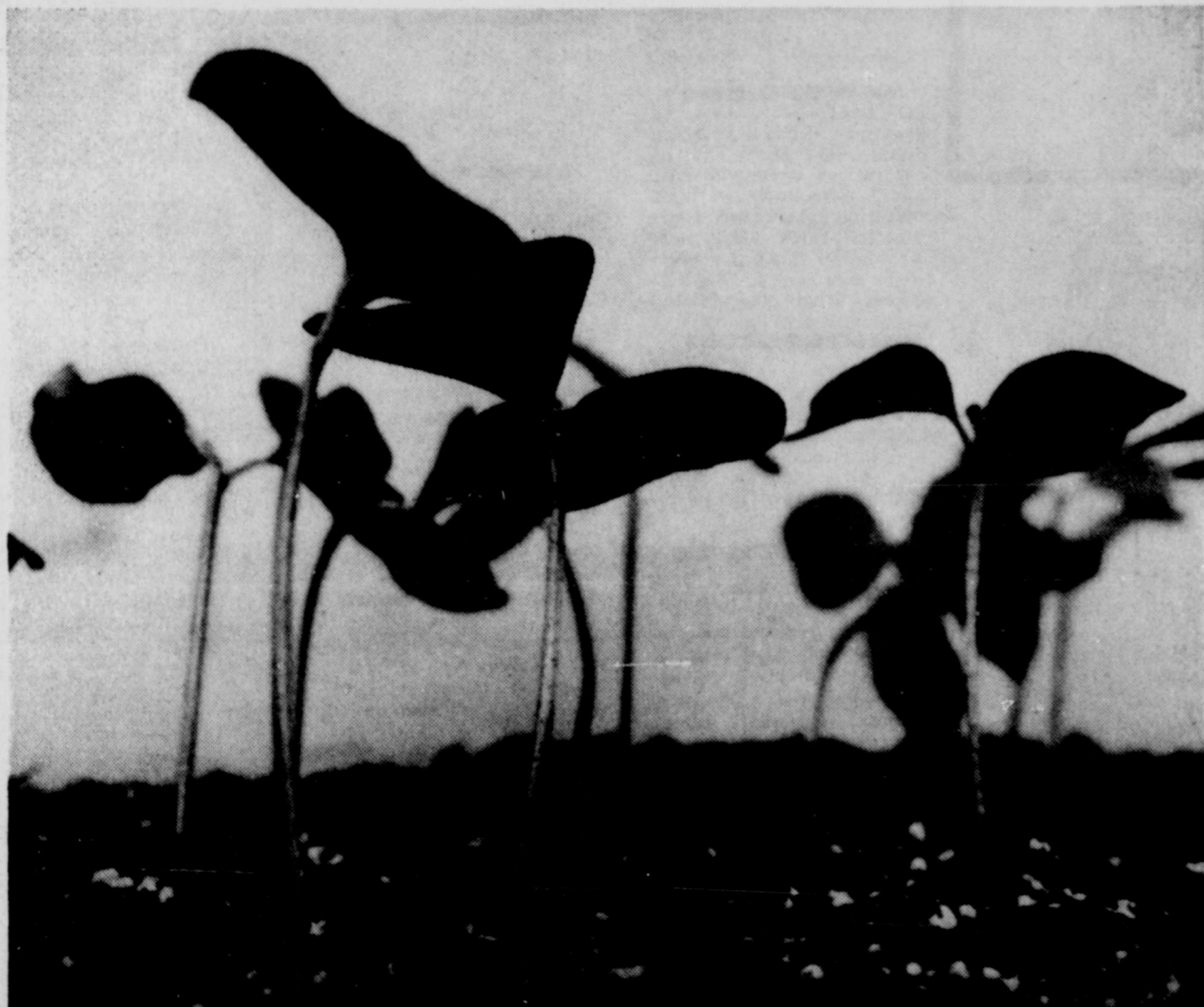

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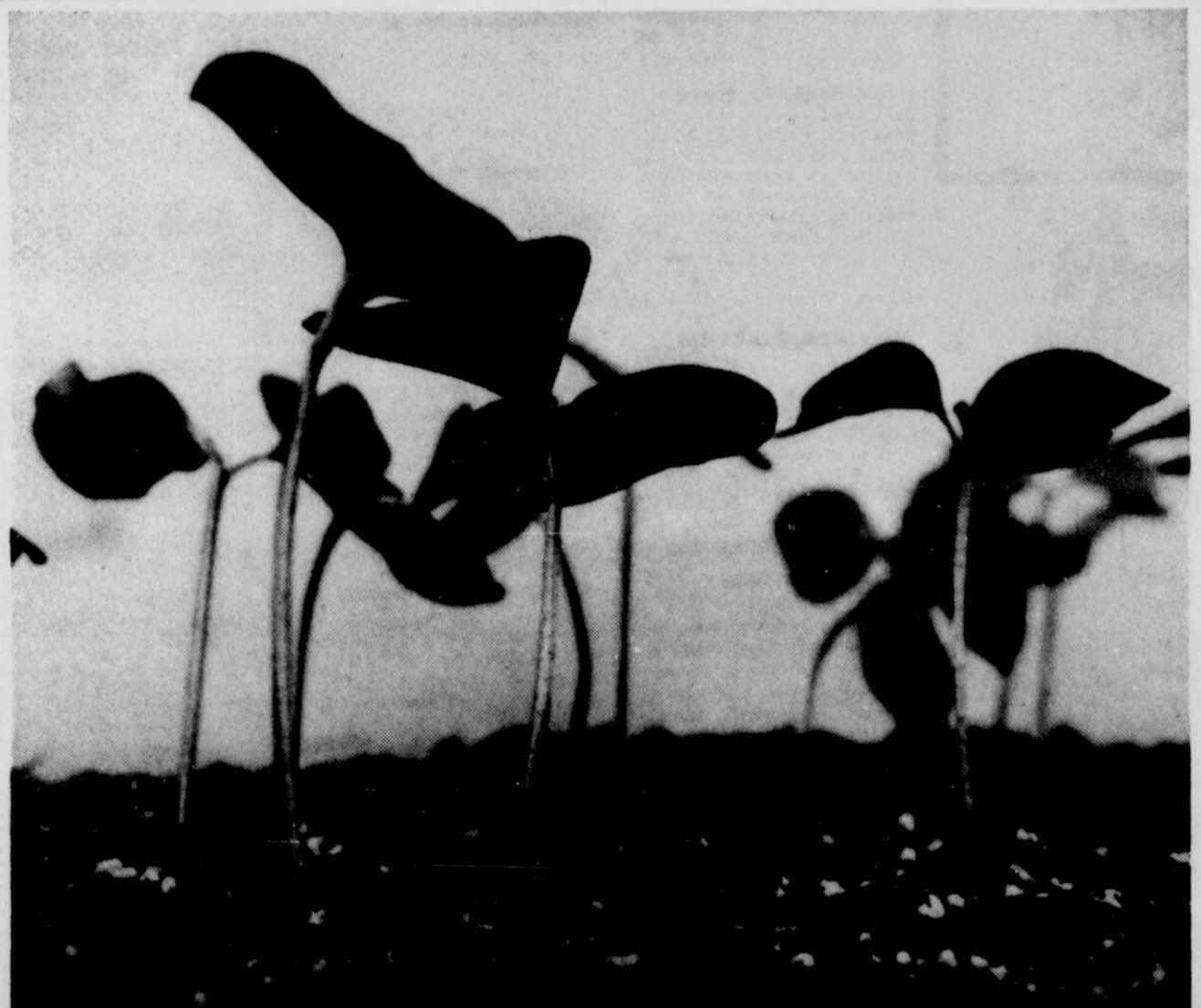
