



NEAR 800 SEE NEW FACILITY AT OPEN HOUSE

A total of 781 local and area citizens visited the open house at the Academic Center and Undergraduate Junior High School Sunday, April 21st. School officials estimated that the total visitors numbered over 900 counting those that did not register. Visitors were treated not only to a tour of the new facility but also saw an art exhibit done by local artists and a preview of the 8th grade U. L. L. One-Act Play, "The Clowd" which will be presented in competition on Thursday, April 24. Visitors were able to view the entire complex which includes a snack area for students where the building joins to the present high school building. The unique building is centered around a 13,000 square foot academic area. This area houses the junior and senior high school libraries and 200 student stations for individualized group instruction. The entire complex has excellent lighting, central heating and cooling and is carpeted. The building has brick, formica and colorful vinyl interior walls. Located within the complex are language, science, art and music laboratories.

A unique feature of the building is the mezzanine area in the academic center that contains offices and a professional study area for teachers. The underground junior high school contains 14 classrooms and an administrative office area. The 21,000 square feet underground area will also serve as community storm shelter in case of emergencies. From out-of-town, there were 127 visitors from the following cities: Hale Center, New Home, Lubbock, New Deal, Plains, Plainview, Amarillo, Petersburg, Brownfield, Childress, Canadian, Midland, Levelland, Littlefield, Cape Girardeau, Missouri, Idalou, Memphis, and Hobart, Okla.

STRIDERS STREAK TO VICTORY

The newly-formed Abernathy Striders Track Club ran its initial meet Saturday, April 20. The team, composed of 11-12 year old boys, traveled to Idalou to compete with other tracksters from Lubbock, Cooper, Idalou and Crosbyton. Running in the meet were boys and girls that ranged in age from 3-12. The events included competition for all levels with the bean-bag throw, broad jump, high jump, and softball throw. Running events covered distances from 20 yards to 220 yards. The divisions were set up so everyone ran against competition of the same age group.

The Abernathy delegation completely dominated the 11-12 division where they collected 21 out of a possible 24 ribbons. Ribbons were given for the first four places in each of the six events.

Ralph Flores and Wade Henderson led the way in the high jump by taking first and second places respectively.

In the next field event, which was the long jump, the Striders dominated the ribbons. Johnny Ray Johnson won the first of his three blue ribbons with a leap of 14' 4-1/2". Second, third, and fourth places were taken by Ignacio Ruiz, Gilbert Cuevas and Roger Lindsey.

Ignacio Ruiz came back in the softball throw to win with a toss of 165' and Cuevas was a close second with 163'3". Ralph Flores and Willie Betts won third and fourth places, respectively.

After the preliminaries in the 50, 100 and 220, the final heats were loaded with Abernathy jerseys.

Johnson won his second blue ribbon in the 50 yard dash when he crossed the finish line in 6.5 seconds. Close behind Johnny was Mike Flores and Roger Lindsey who were both timed in 6.6 seconds. Mike was awarded second place while Roger took third. Also making the finals were Gilbert Cuevas and Oscar Lopez.

After missing out on a fourth place ribbon in the 50 yard dash, Abernathy came back in the 100 yard dash with another sweep of the ribbons. Johnson took his third and final first place while Ignacio Ruiz placed second, Mike Flores took third and Roger Lindsey finished fourth. Gilbert Cuevas took fifth position although he didn't receive a ribbon.

Going into the last event of the day, the Striders had five of the six lanes occupied. Ruiz took the blue ribbon this time with Mike Flores, Gilbert Cuevas and Roger Lindsey making it a clean sweep once again.

The only girl competing for Abernathy was Elizabeth Lopez in the 5-6 year old division. Miss Lopez entered three events, getting ribbons in all three. She won the bean-bag toss, and placed second in both the 30 and 50 yard dashes.

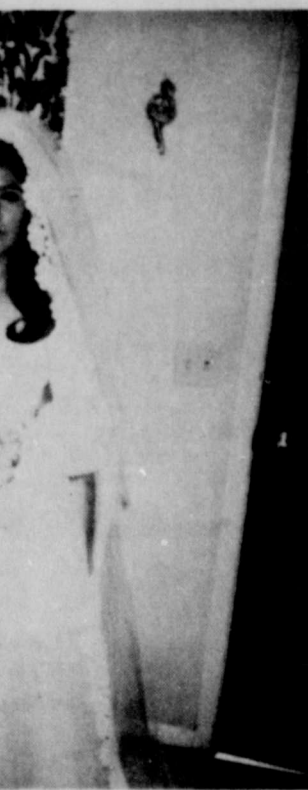

Miller graduated from Bethany High School in 1970. He attended the University of Oklahoma and is the owner of JM Construction Company in Bethany.

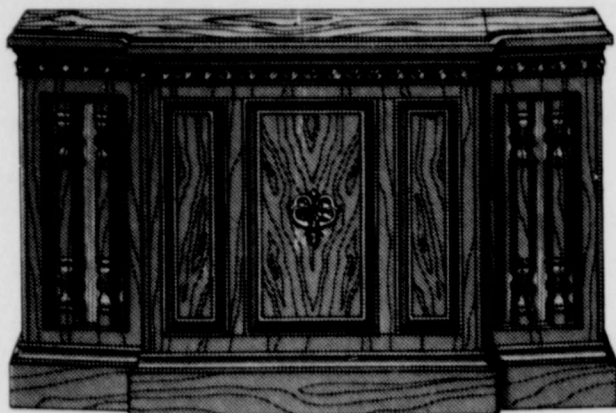
