Democratic primary voting in Lubbock County will include voting boxes at Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy; at the New Deal Clubhouse and at New Deal School. Balloting at Becton will be at Becton Gin Co., owned by Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Tudor. Polls in Lubbock County will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Election officials in Lubbock County also urge you to vote, and to vote early in the day.

Voting will range from offices of U. S. Representative, the Texas Governorship and other high state offices to the smallest geographical office area, that of Justice of the Peace.

Dolph Briscoe has strong opposition from Sissy Farenthold for the office of Governor. Mrs. Farenthold ran a pretty good race for that office in 1962. Her image, for some, has been enhanced since her first try for that office. In the Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach, Mrs. Farenthold was in the race for the vice presidential nomination, and did pretty well in the voting, considering that she is not a na-

tionally known figure. Two races in Hale County are holding the local spotlight. Four ladies (

) are seeking the office of District Clerk in Hale County. The incumbent, Eleanor Harris, is not a candidate for re-election. Ms. Harris, who has made a good District Clerk, plans to move to California after her term expires Dec. 31, 1974.

The other race that is drawing attention in Hale County is the one for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3, which includes the. Hale County portion of the City of Abemathy. The incumbent, Delbert Beaton, who has been IP here since Feb. 1, 1958, announced in The Review last week that he will not be a candidate for re-election. and that he will retire at the end of his current term, Dec. 31, 1974. Also reported in last week's Review was the fact that only one name will appear on the ballot for the JP office. The name is Mrs. Dayton (Jeanne) Marr. This week, Mrs. J. B. (Willie Ruth) Bradley announced as a write in candidate for the JP office in the May 4 election.







Moving a BILLION bushels of grain

in 20 months

Big moves are not unusual on the Santa Fe. Citrus, potash, coal, sulphur and various manufactured products move by the trainloads. But grain tops them all, especially wheat.

This year marks the one hundredth anniversary of Turkey Red Wheat in the United States. 
