


"Soil Stewardship Week


This year's theme, "A Different Place", emphasizes how the many changes now occuring in the nation affect our continuing responsibility to be good stewards of the

ments affecting the use of American's natural resources. "We hope," said Calhoun, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, millions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and use of the Lord's earth. "

Nineteen - seventy - four will be the 19th consecutive year that the Hale County S.W. C. D., along with almost 3,000 similar districts throughout the nation, has sponsored soil stewardship week. The custom of setting special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began nore than 1,500 years ago in France, when French peasants prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

### FIREWORKS WARNING GIVEN

A reminder on the explosion of fireworks:

With the memorial day holiday coming up we must remind the citizens of Abernathy that it is illegal to explode fireworks within the city limits. This illegality is created by our ordinance number 76. There are several impor-

tant reasons why the explosion of fireworks has been made against the law. Basically those reasons are excessive noise, fire hazards, and the danger involved to persons exploding fireworks and/or other persons.

We must remember the ill, the elderly, and persons who need peace and quiet. We must consider the fire hazards and the safety of individuals.


The danger of exploding fireworks, as related to individuals, range from simple cases of burned fingers to the loss of eyesight, life or limb. We offer in example, the case in California where a young man who had just recently been drafted to play pro football lost both legs in a fireworks accident.

We must ask that you refrain from the practice of exploding fireworks during the upcoming holiday (both the traditional date and the revised date).

Since the patrolman on duty cannot be in all parts of the city at all times, we suggest that, should neighbors disturb you by exploding fireworks, you call the police department and the person violating the ordinance will be contacted.

## We Should Speak Out For Beef

Americans were boycotting beef - indignant at the higher prices we were being forced to pay. During this period housewives refused to purchase beef in an effort to halt the spiraling prices. And it was, in fact, "Housewives Boycott" that finally started the downward trend in beef prices.

The layman might find it difficult to understand why beef prices rose so high in the first It all begins with the feeder. Let's take an isolated example. Suppose, we bought one steer cattle last autumn, weighing about 400 pounds. We'd have paid about 70 cents a pound or \$280,000. This calf would have then been pastured all winter on rented ground, gaining about 200 pounds and running up a pasture bill of \$24.00 So now we have invested \$304.00 in our steer.

Last week the best offer for the steer would have been 44 cents a pound or \$264.00. Had we sold, we would have lost \$40.00.

Now suppose, we didn't sell, but instead we took our steer to a feedlot. During the next five months, the steer will eat about \$200.00 in corn and at the end of that time will weigh about 1000 pounds. If conditions remain the same we would only receive about \$410.00 for our steer - which means we lost \$94.00.

If you multiply that figure

by three or four thousand, you can see why the Kansas cattle-man is taking a big gamble; it a \$350,000 loss.

According to Professional Cattle Consultants of Weatherford, Oklahoma, studies show that as of March 1, steers fed in the High Plains lost an average of \$127.75 a head for their

owners. The cattle feeding industry has lost \$1,046,366,691 for the four-month period of October 1973 to January 1974. The

Of course, the feeder's prob-lems aren't the only factors to be taken into consideration. Ranchers have lost a large percentage of the calf crop to weather conditions and feedlots are having trouble getting capacity loads of steer.

We complain about the rising Beef costs - but the average price of a pound of Choice Beef has risen 50 percent since 1952. Compare that to hourly rate for non-supervisory workers on private - non-agricultural payrolls. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the figure has advanced 148.6 per-

### **Use Meat** Thermometer

### For Cooking

How do you like your roast beef -- rare, medium or well-done? A roast meat thermometer is a good guide to the doneness of the roast; it eliminates the guesswork. Insert the thermometer so the bulb reaches the center of the thickest part. Be sure it does not rest in fat or on bone in order to get an accurate reading of the internal temperature of the meat. This makes it possible to roast meat exactly as you choose. If you like rare beef, then remove the roast when the internal temperature reaches 140 degrees Fahrenheit. The thermometer should register 160 degrees Fahrenheit for a medium-done beef roast and 170 degrees Fahrenheit for a welldone beef roast. The doneness is indicated on the thermometer.

Are your breakfasts so tasty that no one ever wants to skip them? Or do you find your-self serving the same menu day after day, week after week? If so, then it's time for a change! We need to give thought to breakfast menus the same as dinner

Actually there's opportunity for a great deal of variety. Take breakfast meats for instance. You can serve chipped beef on toast or cubed steaks or cornec beef hash, perhaps topped with an egg. Ground beef patties are an increasinglypopular breakfast entree, too.

### Slow Cookery **Is The Rule**

"4-H provides youngsters an opportunity to learn something that will help them in everyday life--many practi-cal things, such as health, safety, conservation, leadership, citizenship and nutrition, as well as things that may lead to a fuller and richer life, such as knowing how to tune a small engine, how to grow vegetables, how to cook and sew, and how to raise and train an animal, to name only a few. "

And there's a uniqueness to 4-H, points out Mauk, that makes it a special type of

"4-H is something different to everybody because of the different backgrounds and experiences that each and every member has. Thus, 4-Hboys and girls learn from one another by sharing these experiences, plus they have additional experiences on their own through guidance from adult leaders and Extension Service profession-

"The Extension Service professional staff to back up the 4-H program -- that's another unique advantage of 4-H," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "In whatever area a voungster's interests lie, there is a knowledgeable specialist to provide background and training to guide the youth along the way.

"The 4-H program also involves the youth's family-it's a family affair. Many 4-H experiences happen at home, and this is where 4-Hers actually work with their projects. So the youth and their families work and learn together. Hopefully, these experiences will help family members communicate more openly and thus become more close-knit."

According to Mauk, "4-H provides an opportunity for youngsters to 'practice' for the real life experiences they will encounter in the future. Such training can only lead to a more complete and more meaningful life. "

The specialist encourages any youth or parents inte-rested in the 4-H program to contact their local county Extension office or the State 4-H office at Texas A&M University.
