

The club was organized in her home in 1939 with only six members. Under her influence the club has grown and flourished.


With love and respect, we humbly give this memorial to our beloved co-gardener and friend, the late Josephine

WIREWORMS COULD DAMAGE GRAIN SORGHUM

Farmers throughout the grain sorghum belt are cau-tioned to use planter box treatment against wireworms.

The wireworm warning came from Elbert Harp, executive director of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board and Grain Sorghum Producers Association at Lubbock, Texas.

Harp pointed out that wirevorms can devastate hundred of acres of grain sorghum when a farmer fails to use planter ox treatment on seeds.

Dr. George Teetes of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock said, "I think the only effective treatment against wireworms is Haptachlor." Dr. Teetes cautioned that farmers should carefully follow directions on the label when applying planter box treatment.







in Texas. Southwestern has had only two previous increases, 23 and 7 years ago, respectively. The 1967 increase was 7.62%. There have been 14 rate reductions since 1942, when the company took its present

Increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the rate increase request. Spokesmen said that a standard wooden pole had increased in price by 175 percent since the last rate change, with a 365% increase in the price of crossarms used on the poles.

Other increases in costs since 1967 include a 162% rise in the price of steel for substations; a 124% increase in copperwire; labor costs up nearly 54% and taxes going up by almost 57%. Interest paid on borrowed money has jumped up 68%.

The company pointed out such increases in other prices since 1967 as 108% for ground beef; 67% for coffee; 58% for milk: 28% for margarine; and 100% for lettuce as indications that its request for an average increase of 10% was reasonable.

For residential service in homes which are not electrically heated and do not have electric water heaters, the schedule is as follows:

The company has a fuelcost adjustment as a part of its approved rates. This allows it to pass on to customers increases in fuel costs. However, fuel is only about 20% of the total cost of providing service and there is no similar protection against the increases that have taken place in the other 80% of the costs

(When the commercial customers' demand -- the number of kilowatts the company must have to serve his load -- exceeds 10 kw, the 4.6 cents block of the rate is extended 38 kwh for each kw of demand above 10 kw. This demand feature affects only the larger customers.)

The company projects that the rate increase will produce annual revenues in Texas, where it serves the great majority of its customers, of \$6, 161, 000, 00. Of this mount, \$3,021,000 will go for additional taxes.

In the face of high interest costs that now range from 9 to 11 percent, the company's rate of return on its investment if 5.87 percent. If the proposed new rate had been in effect during 1973, it would have yielded a rate of return of 6.61 percent. Texas law allows as much as 8 percent rate of return for utility companies.
