FOURTH OF JULY CELEBRATION (by Sam Hunley)


Fourth of July plans are rapidly coming to a close and the result could be one of the most successful in the history of Abernathy.

To get things rolling on the Fourth, David Pinson will chairman what some have called the greatest bicycle races ever held in this part of the country. The races will start in front of Joe Thompson Implement Company on south Avenue D and run to Main Street -- ten blocks long. The entire course will be covered from start to finish with various local commentators adding wit to the tiresome and dangerous trek. Age limits for the races, which start promptly at 9:00 a. m., are five years to 95 years. If you have a grudge with your neighbor or friend, challenge him/her to a bicycle race; and let the results tell the tale.

9:30 will see the float judging and parade line up take shape. Kicking off at 10:00 a.m., this year's parade will have two main the mes -- patriotic and humorous. First (\$100), second (\$50) and third (\$25) place money will be aw arded in each category; so, build a float and take some money home. Prize money and trophies will be presented by Dave Cavitt.

10:40 will start the flagraising ceremonies and patriotic speech under the direction of local Boy Scouts and V. A. Dodson.

11:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon vill contain various events and challenging activities such as a pie and cake auction sponsored by the Girl Scouts. the Lions Club Ducking Board and horseshoe pitching under the direction of Steve Hill and Sam Hunley. A St. Isidore's Catholic Church group will handle a dart throwing contest under the supervision of Mike Valdez. The annual Ring Throw from the city water tower will take place at 11:30. \$125 in prizes will be given away to lucky ring catchers--if Dave Pinson is able to climb the water tower. The Bar-B-Q lunch will take place at noon in the school cafeteria under the excellent catership of James Graham. The cost will be \$2.50 per plate. The cafeteria will also be air conditioned. 1:00 p. m. will kick off the Old Fiddlers Contest; and, if it is anything like the one last year, success should be certain. Pete Thompson, Mayor, is chairman for the popular event. The fire department will cool off the hot afternoon with the ir annual Water Polo Contest under the (wet) leadership of Ed Crow. After everyone has had sufficient time to rest from the day's activities, the local Riding Club will round out the day with various rodeo events beginning at 7:30 and lasting until late. J. D. Vineyard and L. G. Montgomery will co-chairman the riding events. A schedule of events will be printed and distributed throughout the area in time for everyone to plan his or her Fourth of July celebration at home in Abernathy.
