TRACK CLUB NEWS

Eight members of the Abernathy Track Club participated in the Region IX Texas Amateur Athletic Federation Track meet Saturday in Lubbock. Any participant who placed in the top three places qualified for the State TAAF meet to be run later this month in Ft. Worth. Six boys from the Abernathy delegation won births in the state meet.

The junior boys accounted for all but one of the qualifiers. The 440 yard relay team composed of Mike Flores, Gilbert Cuevas, Monty Jones, and Ignacio Ruiz, Jr. topped all competition with a time of 55.7 seconds.

Gilbert also qualified in the shot put, where he garnered second place and the long jump and 880 yard run.

Flores collected four fourth place finishes in the shot put, long jump, 100 yard dash, and 220 yard dash.

Ignacio Ruiz, finished the day with ribbons in the long jump, shot put, and 100 yard dash where he placed fifth, fifth, and sixth respectively.

Jones qualified for the state meet in the high jump with a leap of 4'8". This height was equal to the winning jump, but Monty was awarded third because he had more misses than the first and second place winners.

Wade Henderson placed third in the shot put to gain his spot in the state meet. He also took fourth in the high jump, and joined three boys from Slaton in a 440 yard relay to take second place.

Keith Robertson, competing in the midjet division, was the lone boy of his age group to place in one of the top three positions. He jumped 12'8 3/4" in the long jump to win second and gain his trip to Ft. Worth. Keith also teamed up with David Myatt and two Lubbock boys to take 6th place in the 440 yard relay.

Cletus Irlbeck was the only bantam boy to run from Abernathy. His ribbon came in a 440 yard relay, where he teamed with three boys from Lubbock to take fourth place.

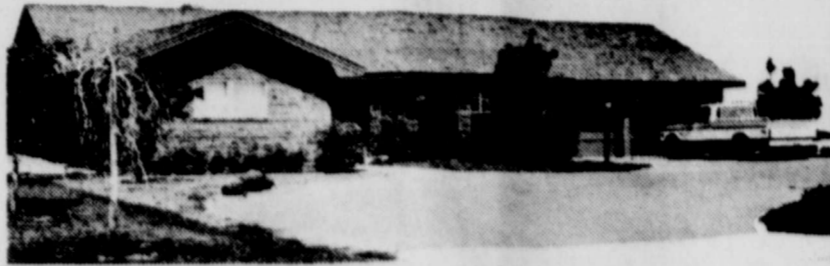
