SIREN INSTALLED

Subject of this photo is slightly above the center of the picture. It is the Thunderbolt siren that was mounted last week. The siren topsout at 55 feet high. It was mounted above the brick utility building at the northeast leg of the city water tower on the city square. A ten-foot high extension of steel, topped-off by a steel platform on which the siren mechanism is mounted, was fabricated in the shop of Ace Welding, 1204 Ave. D, Abernathy. Ace Welding also fabricated the steel supports for the new pressbox being




