



Founded by George Emmett Green (1875-1960), whose work revolutionized Texas Agriculture. Mechanically-gifted, Green mastered water well development. worked as pattern maker and draftsman in pump factories, and operated a plant of his own in his native Missouri before moving here in 1909 with his wife Salome (Rich) and their children. In 1911 he dug Hale County's test irrigation well on the J. H. Slaton farm, reaching a commerical yield of 1400 gallons of water per minute.

This won him fame, as irrigation had long been con-sidered the missing ingred-ient in South Plains agriculture--the key factor that would enable this fertile area to produce foodstuffs and fibers to supply millions of

Once deep water was ound, Green tackled related problems and invented (1915) the hollow-shaft, right-angl gear drive for irrigation pumps, which made it poss-ible to use automotive-type

engines for irrigation power. With a goal of commerical pumps at moderate prices, Green established this factory in 1911, and reduced irrigation well installation costs to a figure that farmers could afford. His descendants still own and operate the bus-



HALE OIL, GAS PRODUCTION

Current higher prices for crude oil and natural gas produced in Hale County point to a significant jump in 1974 income for county land and royalty owners who last year received \$3 million as their share of the county's output, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

"With the average price of Texas crude oil now at about \$6.70 a barrel, comparwith the 1973 average of \$3.84 a barrel, and with

some newly discovered natural gas selling intrastate for more than \$1 per thousand cubic feet, the outlook for the economy of producing communities is encouraging if prices hold up, "according to Sherman Hunt, Dallas, Association president.


'Should price rollback schemes and other tax-andcontrol proposals now underway in Congress be successful, current economic gains will evaporate," Hunt said.

at \$23.8 million, ranking the county 61st in the state. Crude oil production of 6.1 million barrels was valued at \$23.3 million and 2.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas at \$503,021.

Statewide, crude oil prices for 1974 are estimated to be some 74 percent higher than 1973. This expectation has stimulated a revival of drilling in Texas, with well completions the first five months of 1974 at 4,013, a 19 percent jump over the same 1973 period.

From the county's 1973 output, the State of Texas collected \$1.1 million in oil production taxes and \$37,727 from natural gas.

Also adding to the dollar flow in the county last year were these factors: -- Drilling activities, on which producers spent \$2.4 million in drilling 33 wells, \$76,152 of which was lost in one dry hole. Successful completions amounted to 32 oil wells.

-- Payrolls, which a-mounted to \$235,452 paid to 60 workers, according to Texas Employment Commisstoff figures.

-- Operation of other oil and gas facilities, including one petrochemical plant.
