



Indians Open Season Here Friday Night

"Lasso a wild Maverick" will be the cry of the fighting Haskell Indians as they take on the strong Eastland Mavericks in the season's opener, a non-conference battle at Indian Field tomorrow night, Friday, at 8:00 o'clock.

Sports fans may well remember that the Indians opened the season last year against the Mavericks at Eastland and were defeated by the score of 25-13, but Haskell never dropped another game until they were downed by one point, 14-13 against Iowa Park in the semi-finals at Coyote Stadium, Wichita Falls.

Eastland has a "well-oiled", strong team, and is favored to topple the Indians...but that remains to be seen...and Friday night's game is expected to be a thriller.

With that "do-or-die" spirit the Indians will be out to prove to their new head coach Tommy McAdams, that they have the spirit and stamina in this coming important opening tilt of the new 1971 season.

Although Friday night's game is a non-conference affair, and means nothing as far as standings in 7-AA, the Indians will be in there fighting just as if they were battling for district honors.

The stadium is expected to be filled to capacity to see the Indians in their "acid test" against the Mavericks.

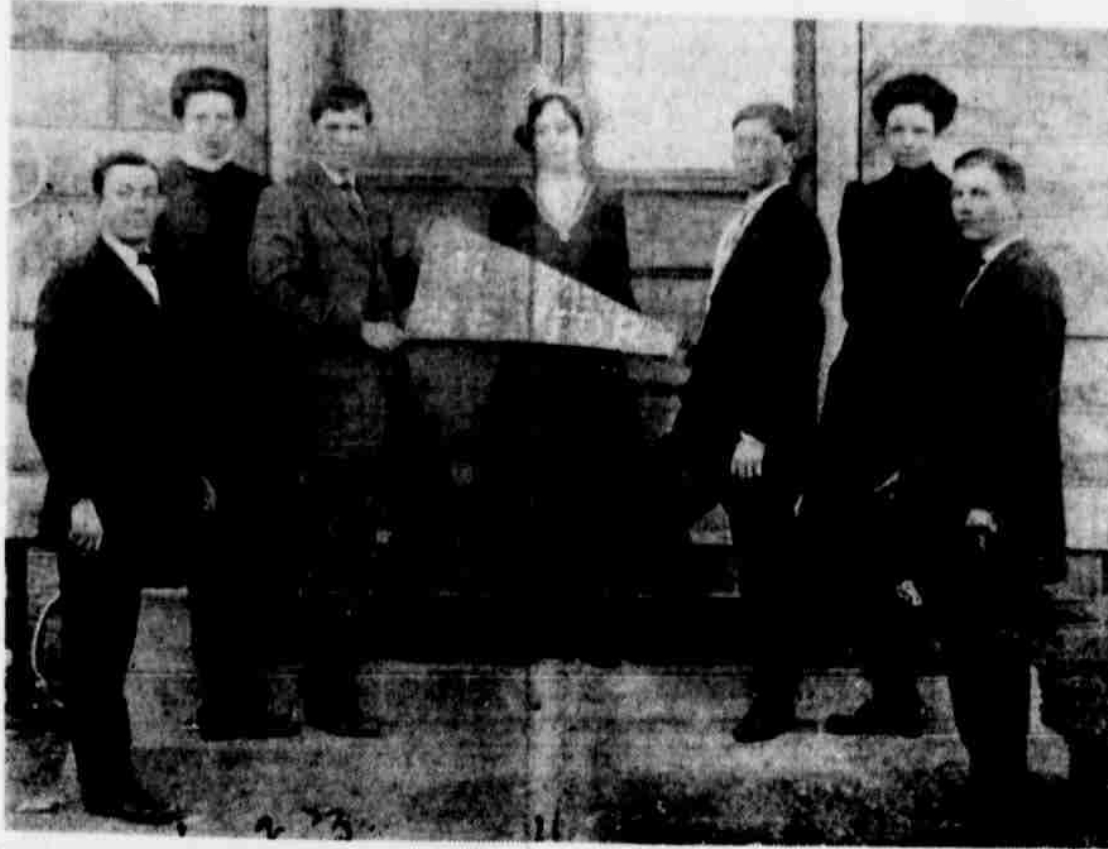
Scrimmage Colo. City

County Fair Dates Draw Near

From all outward appearances it might indicate to some folks that members of the Haskell County Fair Association are engaged in a game of "Blackjack" as it is only 21 days from today, Thursday, September 9, until the fourth annual county fair will kick off with a huge street parade at 5 p. m. The slogan, "Twenty one or bust" could easily be applicable as a bee hive of activity is taking place getting all phases of the fair ready for the opening day on September 30th.

The members of the fair association are going all out in their endeavor to "top" last year's fair which went in the record books as the "best ever from the standpoint of entries, crowds in attendance and entertainment."

Prior to the 1970 annual event, two fine new buildings were constructed at the grounds and by opening day

this year two new ones will be ready for use making a total of four added since the re-organization of the County Fair in 1968.

The Corral building, used each year for an exhibit hall, has had an addition of 60 feet by 48 feet adjoining on the west and will greatly enhance the available space for exhibits which to date have crowded the facilities.

The new metal building, white in color, blends in well with the old structure, and extends almost to the front gate entrance.

Under construction at the present time is a new building which will be used for rest rooms just north of the livestock show barn. It is of tile brick construction and will be ready by opening day of the fair.

From the entertainment angle, the appearance of the "chain gang band" at all three nights of the fair has been as-

sured and all citizens and visitors who were in attendance last year, can vouch for their ability as a crowd pleasing musical unit.

Parade entries are coming in almost daily with the last entry being the Maskat Shrine Clown unit of Wichita Falls who have notified fair officials there would be at least eight here for the parade which will make three consecutive years that this organization has appeared at the Haskell County fair.

Texas Agriculture Products will be well represented with their Agri-Business tour, a huge and beautiful float and also an impressive display in the exhibit hall.

Highways, Farm-to-Market Roads Improvement Includes Haskell Co.

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$1,500,000 for highway safety and betterment and improvement of state highways and farm-to-market roads in District 8 during 1972.

District Engineer J. C. Roberts, of Abilene, said that a total of 159.3 miles will be involved in the annual program.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm-to-Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Programs for 1972.

The types of work included in the program cover 135.6 miles of asphalt seal coats scattered over the district plus the additional surfacing of 1.8 miles of U.S. 277 in Haskell, 2.1 miles of U.S. 87 in Big Spring, 11.4 miles of U.S. 83 in Taylor County and 8.4 miles of Loop

243 in Abilene. This program also includes a safety lighting project in Merkel.

District Engineer Roberts said that among the projects included in the program, the following will take place in Haskell County:

Haskell, U.S. 277 in Haskell, fr. S.C.L. to St. 24, 0.8 add'l surf.

Haskell FM 000, Fr. Paint Creek School to Haskell 8.1 Seal Coat.

Haskell FM, Fr. 618, East 3.7 Seal Coat.

With this edition of The Haskell Free Press, Editor Al Hinds announces his retirement from a 43-year career in the newspaper business. He has been on the Free Press staff 12 years, and served as editor for the past 6½ years. He is a past president of Haskell Lions Club; a past director of Haskell Chamber of Commerce;

and is presently serving as publicity chairman of the Chamber.

He began his career as an after-school-hours employee of the Democrat-Voice in Coleman doing odd jobs. He later learned to run the linotype machine, and advanced to plant superintendent. From there he moved into the advertising and news field. He was with the Coleman newspaper from 1928 to 1944.

When Jetty Clare, his brother-in-law, bought the Paducah Post, he was associated with him there. Clare offered him an interest in the paper, and he became its publisher. He published the Paducah Post for 11 years before his eventual move to Haskell and employment at the Free Press.

Born in Coleman County May 8, 1908, he married the former

Verda Lee Davis. They have two children, a daughter, Mrs. Gary (Beverly) Allen of Hurst, and a son, Sp/4 Larry Hinds serving in the Army and stationed in Ft. Riley, Kansas; and two grandchildren, Scott Allen, 9, and Robyn Allen, 6.

In announcing his retirement, he ends a colorful and interesting career that has covered the western part of Texas. Always he has been active in his town's community and church affairs. He served on the official Board of the Methodist church at Coleman, Paducah and Haskell over 35 years; has taught and served as superintendent of the Sunday School department at Paducah, and has been active in the Haskell (Continued on Page 5, Sec. 1)

Haskell Group Protests Railway Closing Request

Rex Felker, Abe Turner, Bob Herren and Rev. H. O. Abbott from Haskell appeared at a hearing in Austin Thursday, September 2 to protest an application by the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company to close its agency in Haskell and change it to a pre-paid station.

Rev. Abbott flew the Haskell group to Austin.

Rex Felker, Chamber of Commerce Manager, said that when railway company officials learned of the protest, they withdrew the application without a hearing.

There were no protests to an application by the Fort Worth and Denver to close its agency in Seymour.

Railroad officials asked that the commission grant the company authority to convert its agency to a non-agency pre-paid station and to dismantle the station building. If the Seymour application is approved, railroad service would be handled through Fort Worth and Denver Agency office in Munday.

A decision will be made by the commission at a later date.

Mental Health Clinic To Become Tri-Co.

In a meeting held at the Mental Health Clinic last Thursday with Knox County Judge, Sam Clonts; Stonewall County Judge, Pat Mitchell; Haskell County Judge, B. O. Roberson; the clinic's services will now be offered in the three counties.

Haskell County Judge B. O. Roberson welcomed the two visiting judges. He said: "We are proud of this clinic. It has offered a much needed service this past year, and I welcome Knox County to join with Haskell and Stonewall Counties."

Stonewall County Judge, Pat Mitchell expressed his appreciation for the clinic and said, "I did not know there was such a place anywhere that offered the services this clinic offers. The clinic has offered a great service to our county this past year and we are proud to be a part."

A report was made by Aubrey Headstream, director of the clinic. He pointed out that the services and medications given this year in the three counties, if the people could have bought them, would have cost \$55,316.00; however, these services offered by the clinic are not available anywhere except the clinic in the three counties.

Services offered to solve the problems are diagnosis / evaluation; individual therapy; group therapy; family therapy; medication; vocational rehabilitation; social rehabilitation; psychiatrist; psychologist; social worker, volunteer; hospitalization.

Plans were made to enlarge the clinic building. Since a large number of children are served by the clinic, a play room was included in the plans. Painting and art and many games are very popular

among adults so a room for them was considered.

Attending the meeting were: Judges Mitchell, Clonts, Roberson, and Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Headstream; Miss Norma Burnett, clinic psychologist; Mr. Johnny Wilburn, alcohol and drugs, Vernon Center.

The clinic was organized in the Haskell County Courthouse in June 1970. Many people of Haskell County were a part of this first meeting. The clinic was then designed to meet the needs of Haskell County. In November of 1970 Stonewall county was added to the clinic; it is another milestone to add Knox county.

The clinic is an outreach service from the Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center, Vernon, Texas. Doctor Frankie Williams, Supt.; Hames Brittnacher, outreach co-ordinator; Miss Norma Burnett,

psychologist; Aubrey Headstream, director, and Mrs. Aubrey Headstream, secretary.

The Soil Conservation Service motion picture library is now located at the National Association of Conservation District's League City Office.

About 2,000 prints, and more than 100 subjects, have been recently transferred from the SCS film libraries throughout the nation to NACD's Service Department at League City. Thus, the character of the library changes from that of a free lending library operated by SCS, to that of a service offered by NACD through your local California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

NACD officials say that they plan to make this service as nearly self-supporting as possible. To cover personnel and other costs, there will be a use charge of \$3 for films up to 400 feet and \$5 for longer films. It is expected that local users will pay this charge. Also mailing costs are to be paid by the users.

LEGAL NOTICE

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "First-come" basis. The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

The filing fee for filing brands is \$2.00 each. The above law applies to all counties in the State of Texas.

"Industrial Prospect Looks Good" Philpot Reports At Chamber Meet

Officers and directors of the Chamber of Commerce met at Felker's Restaurant at 7 a. m. Tuesday, September 7th, in a regular board meeting with president Elbert Johnson presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayer by director Pat Hale, after which manager Rex Felker read minutes of the last meeting, and presented a financial statement for the month of August.

The president welcomed County Judge B. O. Roberson and County Commissioners Ray Perry, Slover Bledsoe and C. A. Thomas Jr. as guests.

Director Bob Philpot gave a report on the industrial prospect which the industrial committee of the chamber of commerce is working on. He stated that the company was definitely going to install another plant within the near future in Texas and that they would require approximately 100,000 square feet of floor space. A good indication has been given by the Executive Vice-President of the company that Haskell will be one of the Texas towns "looked over" in making a decision as to a site for the plant location.

Manager Rex Felker reported on the committee meeting in Austin on September 2nd with the Railroad Commission in regards to protesting the closing of the freight depot on the railroad here. Bob Herren, Abe Turner, H. O. Abbott and manager Felker flew to Austin for the hearing with the commission which was cancelled by attorneys for the railroad when they found out that Haskell intended to protest the action. In a negotiations session with Railroad Officials, a tentative plan to keep the Haskell office open a half day with a resident agent in charge and to also furnish a full time man during the peak harvest season of grain and cotton, was worked out.

County Judge B. O. Roberson advised those present that continued work North on Highway 277 was being done and that some work on new U. S. 380 was on the agenda but at the present time, State funds were low and the project would perhaps be delayed for a while.

Judge Roberson also informed the group that Haskell, Mae Beasley, of Rochester, was charged on two counts; one on D.W.I., and the other driving while license was suspended. She entered a plea of guilty on both counts. On the D.W.I. charge she was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail, and on driving while license was suspended, she was fined \$25.00 plus court costs of \$4.00.

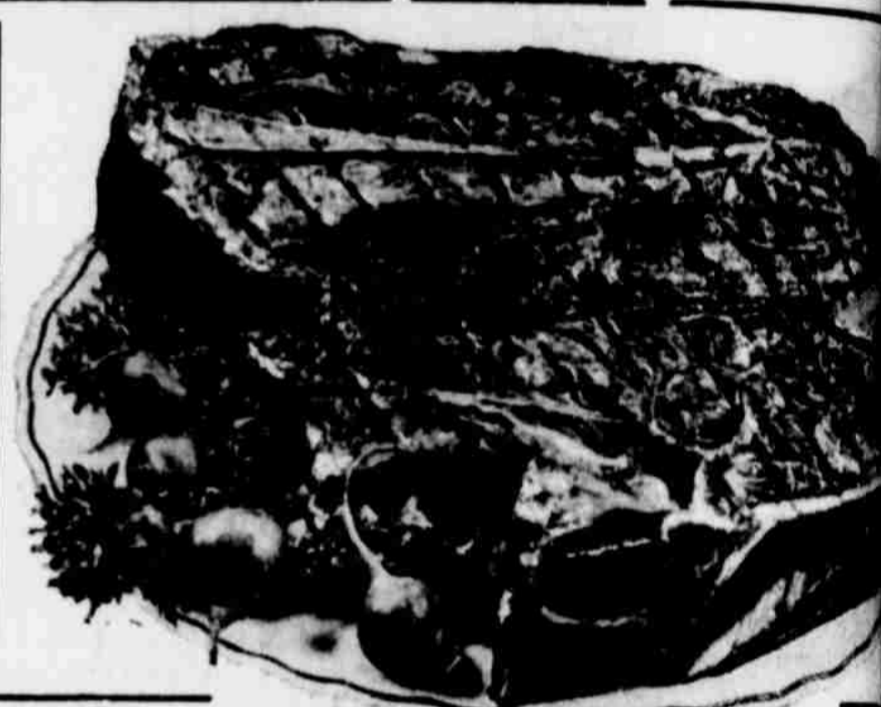

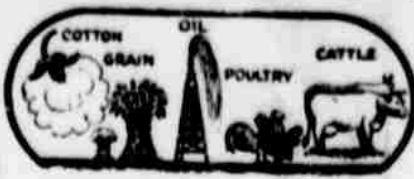

The session, sponsored by the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations got underway at 7:00 p. m. at the Starlite Motor Hotel.

Water system leaders from Haskell, Callahan, Coke, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor counties were given information on a new Water Utilities Training School for rural systems, being developed this summer at Texas A&M University, to be offered this fall in various sections of the state. The favorable results of efforts of TARC in the field of taxation was also explained.

Bill Lawson, former Haskell resident, who is Chief of Community Services of the State Offices of Farmers Home Administration in Temple, discussed future development of systems throughout the state
