## 4-H NEWS

Six Hale County 4-H'ers spent five days this week (Aug. 12-16) learning professional ways of riding and handling a horse.

The occasion was the first District 2 4-H Horsemanship Camp at the new livestock pavilion on the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds in Lubbock. It was the first event ever for the new fairgrounds facility, said County Extension Agent David Gibson.

Some 60 4-H'ers from across the South Plains participated. Skills were taught by a team of four Texas Agricultural Extension 4-H program assistants.

Subjects taught included western horsemanship, biting, reining, basic maneuvers, and specialized events such as barrel racing and pole bending.

Climax of the event was an instructional show conducted by the 4-H'ers themselves, said David Gibson.

Martha Montgomery said the Horsemanship Camp "really helped me to gain confidence in myself and my horse." Rusty Powell and Vicki Shadden agreed with Gary Nabors that the school was a "lot of fun and they learned a lot." Becky Albers said that "I appreciated the chance to go to the camp and learn more about horsemanship."

Cindy Davis said that Hale County took over the barrels in the instructional show with Gary Nabors winning a 1st, Cindy Davis 2nd and Vicki Shadden 3rd place. Others receiving ribbons were Martha Montgomery-2nd in showmanship; Vicki Shadden-2nd place, Becky Albers-3rd place, Rusty Powell-5th place in western pleasure; Rusty Powell-1st place, Becky Albers-3rd place, Gary Nabors-4th place, Martha Montgomery-6th place in western horsemanship.

The four college students from Texas A&M University who taught the five-day course were Pete Gibbs of Wichita Falls, Carol Swanson of Dallas, Jo An Snodgrass of San Angelo, and Barbara Nagel of Houston.

"These students have been trained to conduct educational programs," Ed Garnett added, "and have spent the entire summer traveling throughout the state."

"The idea of conducting horsemanship camps as a part of the 4-H program originated in Texas last year, and is believed to be the first such event in the nation," he said.

"Youths go back to their counties to share their learning experiences with younger 4-H'ers. In effect, the program serves to upgrade horsemanship skills, not only increasing the effectiveness of the 4-H program but providing a way to develop good training on the safe, proper ways to ride and handle horses."

Sponsor of the horsemanship camp was the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds, Steve Lewis, manager.

## HARP GOES TO WASHINGTON

GSPA OFFICIAL SPEAKS OUT AGAINST EXPORT CONTROLS

WASHINGTON--Restrictions on the export of U. S. agricultural products would have detrimental results "economically, morally and politically," according to Elbert Harp, executive director of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, headquartered in Lubbock, Tex.

Harp testified Aug. 15 before the Senate Agriculture Committee which is considering export restrictions after a severe drought throughout the High Plains reduced grain supplies.

The GSPA official acknowledged there will be a tight grain supply this year and that the livestock industry will curtail its feeding because of inadequate supplies. "But let me hasten to point out that within the U. S., Asia and Europe, there is a surplus of livestock. Because of this surplus, we don't believe there is or will soon be any real scarcity of food in this country," he said.

Harp added that to impose export controls on grain would "destroy the credibility of the United States to our trading partners around the world."

The GSPA, the U.S. Feed Grains Council (of which Harp is currently serving as chairman) and the U.S. government have been developing grain markets overseas for more than a decade.

"This market development has provided the U. S. farmer and the economy with one of its best sources of revenue. Agricultural products are the best balance of payment tools that we have today," he said, adding that income from grain export last year was more than \$2 billion.

In addition to economic reasons for avoiding export controls, Harp said there are moral and political considerations as well.

"We are committed to supplying the needs of the people throughout the world with whom we have been trading and whom we have been assuring a constant supply of food... And at a time when trust in the United States government is needing a boost instead of further setbacks, we feel that imposing an embargo on export of agricultural products would jeopardize political negotiations with other nations," he said.

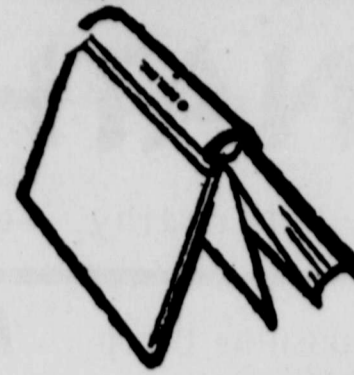

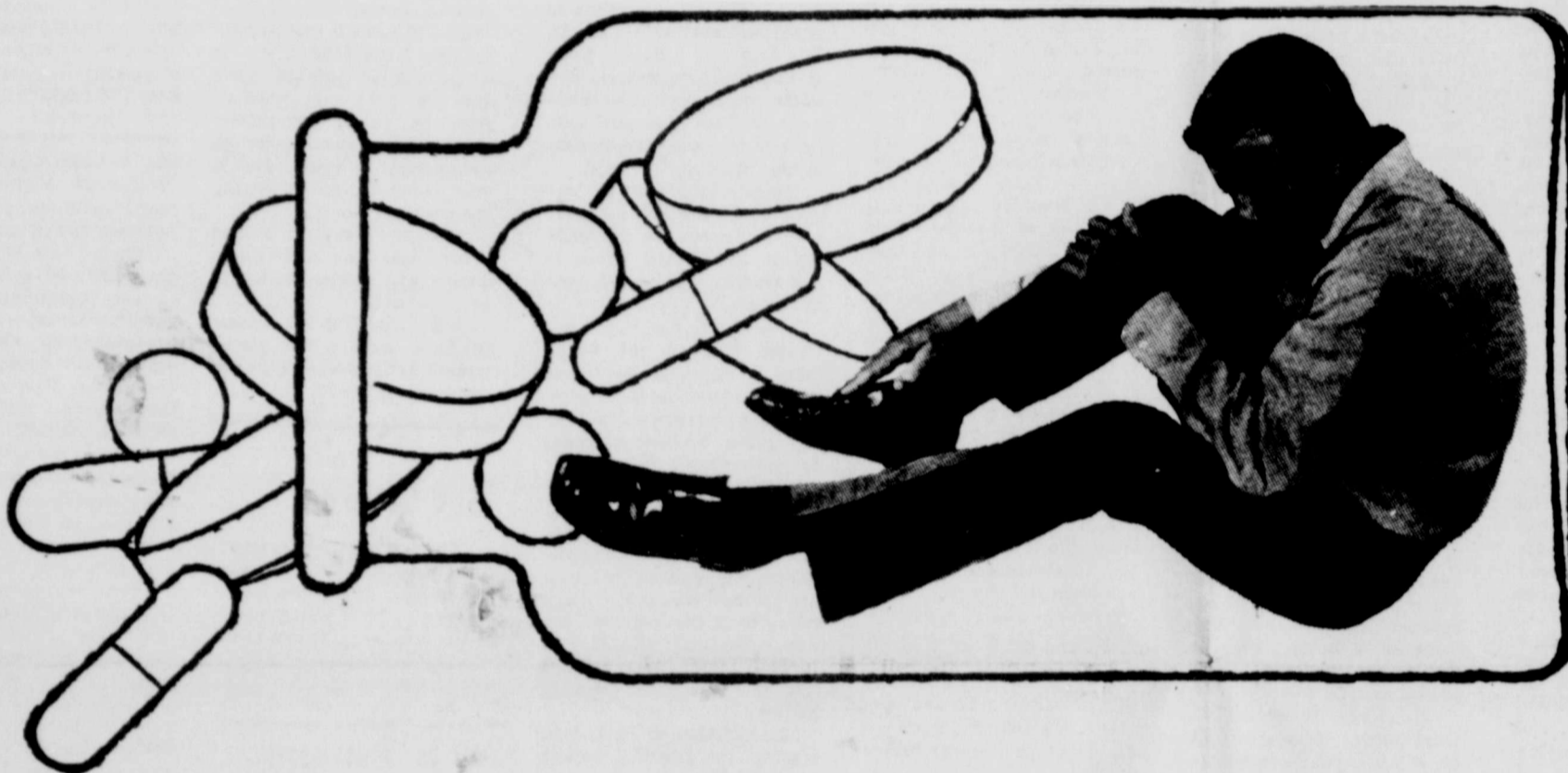
