Some 60 4-H'ers from across the South Plains participated. Skills were taught by a team of four Texas Agricultural Extension 4-H program assistants. Subjects taught included

western horsemanship, bitting, reining, basic maneuvers, and specialized events such as barrel racing and pole bending.
Climax of the event was

an instructional show conducted by the 4-H'ers themselves, said David Gibson.

Martha Montgomery said the Horsemanship Camp "really helped me to gain confidence in myself and my horse." WASHINGTON

GSPA OFFICIAL SPEAKS OUT AGAINST EXPORT CONTROLS

WASHINGTON--Restrictions on the export of U.S. agricultural products would have de trimental results "economically, morally and politically," according to Elbert Harp, executive di-rector of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, headquartered in Lubbock, Tex.

Harp testified Aug. 15 before the Senate Agriculture Committee which is considering export restrictions after a severe drouth throughout the High Plains reduced grain supplies.

The GSPA official acknowledged there will be a tight grain supply this year and that the livestock industry will curtail its feeding because of inadequate supplies. "But let me hasten to point out that within the U. S., Asia and Europe, there is a surplus of livestock. Because of this surplus, we don't believe there is or will soon be any real scarcity of food

in this country," he said. Harp added that to impose export controls on grain would "destroy the credibility of the United States to our trading partners around the world.

The GSPA, the U.S. Feed Grains Council (of which Harp is currently serving as chairman) and the U.S. government have been developing grain markets overseas for more than a decade.

"This market development has provided the U.S. farmer and the economy with one of its best sources of revenue. Agricultura! products are the best balance of payment tools that we have today," he said, adding that income from grain export last year was more than \$2 billion

In addition to economic reasons for avoiding export controls, Harp said there are moral and political considerations as well.

"We are committed to people throughout the world with whom we have been trading and whom we have been assuring a constant supply of food ... And at a time when trust in the United States government is needing aboost instead of further setbacks, we feel that imporing an embargo on export of agricultural products would jeopardize political negotiations with other nations, "he said.
