4-H WEEK IS BEING OBSERVED

National 4-H Week is being observed October 6-12, with the theme: "4-H -- We Can Make It Happen", and this offers a good opportunity to take a look at the 4-H program in Texas during the past year.

According to Karen Miller, Assistant County Extension Agent, "4-Henrollment continues to make good strides. For 1973-74, a total of 124, 747 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 were active in 4-Hactivities. This is about an 8.75 per cent increase over the 1972-

73 period. Of the 4-H'ers, the biggest percentage live in towns under 10,000 population --33 per cent. About the same number live on farms and ranches as live in central cities -- 23 to 24 per cent. Some 16 per cent of the members live in towns and cities of more than 10,000

population. Mrs. Miller notes that there were a total of 3,433 different 4-H clubs or special groups, with at least one such club in each of the state's 254 counties.

The 4-H'ers were enrolled in nearly 200,000 different projects. Those concerning agriculture and related subjects totaled some 71,000 while those in home economics and related areas total about 66,000, Some 60,000 other projects were in a wide range of special interest

areas. "Almost 21,000 volunteer leaders were involved in 4-H programs and activities during the past year, up several hundred from the previous year," points out Stormer. Of this number, some 14,600 are adults while the remainder are junior and teen lead-

The 4-H Enrollment in Hale County is down from 1973-74. The current enrollment is 316, with approxi-

mately 90 adult leaders. Hale County 4-H members will be setting up a 4-H window exhibit in a store in their community. The windows will be judged, and the winning club will be awarded with a plaque at the November Achievement Program.

"So, 4-H is continuing to progress in Texas. Programs are providing more learning and leadership experiences for youth so that they will be better equipped to take their place in tomorrow's world. "4-H is indeed 'making it

happen," not only in Texas but throughout the nation." contends Stormer.



Mrs. Vandiver was introduced by Mrs. Martin, and gave as an introduction to the slides the history of the French and Indian people. Those attending were




