





THE KEOGH ACT

or H. R. 10 (officially known as the Self-Employed Individuals Retirement Act), basically, allowed the self-employed (sole proprietors and partners) to set up taxsheltered pension plans. Now that law has been liberalized. Under previous law, the self-employed could set aside up to 10% or \$2,500 of net earnings annually, whichever was smaller, into an account and take a full deduction. The new law raises these limits to 15% of earned income or \$7,500, whichever is smaller, and with a limit of \$100,000 compensation for plan caluculation purposes.




