"Construction of the third generating unit will start durng the latter part of the five year period and will also us a coal fired boiler," Tolk

said. In September of this year, SPS announced its interest in taking a lead role in the construction of the nation's first nuclear power plant using a gas-cooled fast breader reactor. The company signed a letter of intent with the General Atomic Company of San Diego, California indicating that SPS would contribute \$100-million to such a

Transmission lines and transmission substations to be built during the five year program will represent an expenditure of more than \$50million. The lines will be 115,000 and 230,000 volt and will serve the major load areas in Southwestern's sys-

Construction will start in the near future on a 115,000 volt transmission line from Cunningham Station, near Hobbs, New Mexico, to Carlsbad, New Mexico. This new line will provide additional power for new and existing industrial loads.

"This region can avoid the recession which is gripping much of the nation if the people of the area will continue the planned development program for growth which utilizes all of our assets. Planning is the key word and our area development people are dedicated to helping every community that wants to work at planned progress. Finally, the whole region can count on adequate electric power being one of the assets at work", Tolk concluded.

#### NOTICE TO **VETERANS**

Some ve terans may fail to receive the full amount of retroactive disability pension benefits to which they are entitled if their claims are not filed with the Veterans Administration on or before December 31, 1974. According to Herbert Hardin, Veterans Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post 500, this retroactive benefit was provided by Public Law 93-177. enacted by the Congress December 6, 1973, and became effective January 1, 1974.

An honorably discharged veteran with 90 days or more wartime service may be eligible for VA pension if he is shown to be permanently and totally disabled or is 65 years of age or older, and if his annual income is within the limits prescribed by law. A single veteran is eligible if his annual income from all sources other than the VA is not more than \$2,600. The annual income limitation for a veteran with dependents is \$3,800. Prior to January 1, 1974, pension could be paid only from the date on which a veteran's claim was received by the VA. Public Law 93-177 provided that disability pension could be paid retroactively for up to one year prior to the date on which the claim is received, if the evidence shows eligibility. If a veteran files a claim prior to January 1, 1975, and is shown to meet all of the requirements of the law, pension may be paid from January 1, 1974. When a veteran

all of the requirements, pension may still be paid retroprior to the date on which the claim is received by the VA. Any veteran who feels that he might meet the requirements for disability pension should file his claim with the Veterans Administration. This may be accomplished by contacting the local Veterans Service Officer, who will be happy to assist in completing the necessary application forms. The Service Officer can also





The breeds of cattle, sheep, and chickens Turkish farmers use are different from many found on American farms. Brown Swiss, Holstein, and Simmental do frequently appear, however, and New Hampshire hens are quite common.

Ownership of a Holstein carries special significance

for many a farmer. On a farm near Amasya, there is a family of 14 people. The four men collectively make about 200,000 Turkish lira annually. This year they purchased three Holsteins at a total cost of 45,000 Turkish lira... almost the total annual salary for one of the men. Those Holsteins were greeted with smiles and ex-cited laughter. The tightest grain supply in recent history is forecast for the southwestern part of the United States in the spring and summer

That is the prediction of Grain Sorghum Producers Association Executive Director Elbert Harp "if the present rate of consumption continues."

Harp points out that, although

the number of cattle on feed is

down, the number of cattle currently on feed is higher in relation to the feed supply a year The USDA cattle on feed report

for November, 1974, showed the cattle on feed number about 71 percent of the level of the previous year. The total 1974 production of corn and grain sorghum for the

Southwestern United States is

only 68 percent of 1973. With the

heavier weight cattle going into

the feedlots, the average daily consumption may be higher. adding additional stress to the

The exports of grain sorghum for the last six months of 1974 are running about 86 percent of 1973. In comparison to the production of 1974 the export market is using a larger percentage. The exports for the last six months of 1973 were 3.75 percent of the crop that

year. The relationship was 4.95 percent for 1974.

"Under present consumption

trends, it appears that grain will trends, it appears that grain will have to be shipped into the southwestern feedlots from the corn belt by late spring and summer," Harp predicted. "We encourage all cattle feeders to study these figures while grain is still available, in order to avoid the additional freight expenses."
