#### AREA BOY SCOUT NEWS

The South Plains Council has appointed Lonnie Hollingsworth, Lubbock Businessman as the 1975 Sustaining Membership Chairman responsible for raising \$105, -000, Jack Baker, Council President announced.

Assisting Hollingsworth in the twenty county effort will be Ransom Galloway of Spur and Neal Ellis of Levelland.

The \$249,000 budget is financed by 15 United Funds who contribute \$130,000 plus earned income of \$14,000 leaving \$105,000 to be raised by Sustaining Members. A Sustaining Member is a person who has a financial interest in scouting, according to Baker.

The twenty county council is divided into seven districts Baker stated. Each of the seven district Finance Chairmen are currently recruiting their Community Chairmen. When fully organized the campaign will have over a thousand workers calling on 5,000 prospects in 35

communities. Levels of membership are \$5,000 level to the "Support
