## TRIBUTE TO VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE TEACHERS

JERRY ADAMS:

Jerry Adams graduated from Jim Ned High School at Tuscola, Texas in 1952. Received his Bachelor degree from Texas Tech University in 1956, then in 1968 received his Master Degree from there also. Before coming to Abernathy he taught Vocational Agriculture five years at Muleshoe, Texas. He has been at Abernathy since 1961. He holds an Honorary Chapter Farmer Degree and the Honorary State Farmer Degree.

Since coming to Abernathy, Abernathy has added two Pre-employment Laboratory Courses, Farm Power & Machinery and General Agricultural Mechanics. Mr. Adams helped write the course of study for the General Ag. Mechanics program now being initiated in the Public Schools of Texas. Abernathy was selected as one of the Pilot Schools to initiate this program into the schools of Texas.

Since 1961 the Vocational Agriculture program has grown from a one teacher department into a two teacher department. From 32 students to 100 students in Vocational Agriculture.

Mr. Adams has trained numerous Leadership Teams and Judging teams that has qualified and attended State contest. He has never had a State Leadership Team to place lower than 4th in the State Contest.

He wrote the Parliamentary Procedure Workbook that has been used state wide by Vocational Agriculture teachers in teaching parliamentary for several years.

Mr. Adams supervises all Vocational Agriculture students that have swine for their supervised farming programs. He and Mr. Cox work together in supervising the steer program. He assists Mr. Cox with the sheep program.

Jim Odom, an Abernathy farmer and owner of White Gold Gin, was named "Outstanding Conservation Farmer" at the Hale County Soil Fertility meeting last Tuesday (Feb. 18) at the Agriculture Center in Plainview.

In addition to his gin operation here, Odom works a 260-acre farm north of town. Since taking over the farm in 1973, he has installed terraces, waterways and diversions, which have helped stop soil erosion and loss of water. It was for these actions that Odom received the award.

This is Odom's first farming job, though he has pre-

viously been employed at the Quarter-Way Gin, has managed the Edmonson Co-operative Gin and has also managed the Bruegel Brothers Gin and Elevator in Dimmitt.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church here where he serves as director of the adult Sunday School program. He is a member of the Abernathy Young Farmers Chapter and is a former board member of the Abernathy Baseball Association.

## NEW CIVIL DEFENSE SIREN TO BE TESTED HERE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

The new Civil Defense siren for the City of Abernathy will be tested Friday, provided the weather is pretty (no threatening clouds, etc.), according to City Water Superintendent Nathan Hopson. Time of the test will be 2:00 p. m.

"This will be strictly an equipment test," Hopson stated, pointing out that it will not involve a "personnel exercise." This is just to check out the equipment to see that it's working properly.

The new Thunderbolt siren, mounted on the old pump station on the north side of the water tower, is strictly for Civil Defense headquarters in

the basement of the new fire station. If needed, the present tornado warning sirens will be used as a back-up system.

An ALERT blast on the siren is an even, double-tone blast, while the TAKE COVER signal is an up and down warbling effect.

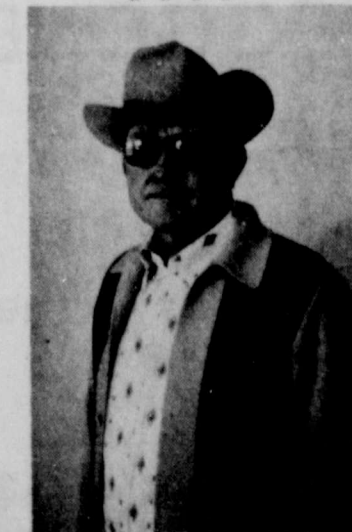
## Cotton Center Farmer, Henry Rieff Announces For County Commissioner

# 4-H, FFA Stock Show Rules

(Continued From Page 1)

Revised January 14, 1975

## I. Ownership

A. All Swine and Beef Cattle breeding stock shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year.

B. All Swine and Lambs shall be owned prior to January 1 of each year.

C. All Steers must be owned prior to Sept. 1 of each year.

D. Abernathy FFA & 4-H members only.

## II. Sifting:

The General Superintendent and the division superintendents shall have the authority to sift any undesirable or questionable animals entered in the show.

III. Classification: The superintendents of each division shall set up the classes in the manner that they wish, which will be for the betterment of the show.

IV. Loss or Injury To Exhibitor Or Animals: The Abernathy Project Show shall not be responsible for any injury or loss to exhibitor or his animal/animals or spectators, while incurred at the show.

## V. Weights:

Steers -- 800-1300 lbs.  
Barrows -- 180 lbs. to 240 lbs. with 10 lb. tolerance.

Lambs -- 75-120 lbs. with 5 lb. tolerance.  
Gilts -- 180-240 lbs. with 10 lb. tolerance.

VI. Judges: The Vocational Agriculture Teachers and County Agent shall select the judges and submit their names to the Board of Directors for their acceptance.

VII. Number of Entries: Steers -- no limit  
Lambs -- no limit  
Barrows -- 4 per exhibitor  
Breeding Gilts -- 5 per exhibitor

VIII. Prize Money: Steers -- 1st-\$15.00, 2nd-\$10.00, 3rd-\$5.00.  
Barrows -- 1st-\$5.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00.  
Lambs -- 1st-\$5.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00.  
Breeding Gilts -- 1st-\$5.00, 2nd-\$3.00, 3rd-\$2.00.

Each exhibitor will receive 1 silver dollar.

IX. Trophies: A trophy committee shall be set up to select trophies or plaques.

A. Beef Cattle Division: 1. Steers: Grand Champion Trophy; Reserve Grand Champion Trophy

B. Swine: 1. Barrows: Grand Champion Trophy; Reserve Grand Champion Trophy

2. Gilts: Grand Champion Gilt Trophy; Reserve Grand Champion Gilt Trophy

C. Sheep: 1. Breed Champion  
2. Reserve Breed Champion

X. Rosettes:

A. Beef Cattle: 1. Steers: Breed Champion  
Reserve Champion of Breed

B. Swine: 1. Barrows: Breed Champion; Reserve Champion of Breed  
2. Gilts: Breed Champion; Reserve Champion of Breed

C. Rabbits: Three rosettes, 10 ribbons, and one high point trophy.

D. Horses: Two rosettes, 10 ribbons, and one showmanship trophy.

XI. Ribbons: Ribbons shall be given to the top ten placing individuals in each class.

XII. Arrival Time: Weighing shall begin at 2:00 p. m., March 3 and all entries shall be in place not later than 7:00 p. m.

XIII. Tags: A. Beef Cattle - Steers shall wear tail tags.

B. Swine: 1. Barrow shall be ear tagged with white tags in right ear.  
2. Gilts shall be ear tagged with yellow tags in right ear.

C. Sheep - Lambs shall be ear tagged.

XIV. Contestant Numbers: Each contestant shall be assigned a number and shall wear it while exhibiting their animal.

XV. Showmanship Awards: Showmanship awards shall be given to the outstanding showman in the following divisions:

A. Beef Cattle  
B. Swine  
C. Sheep  
D. One CowBell Award in Steer Division.

E. Purina - two trophies-one 4-H and one-FFA.

F. One Lovelace Livestock Award - all round.

XVI. Chris Benn Awards: The Chris Benn award shall be awarded by the Lion's Club President immediately following the presentation of the showmanship awards.

XVII. Time of Judging: Judging shall begin at 1:00 p. m. on March 4th in the following order:

A. Horses  
B. Gilts  
C. Barrows  
D. Lambs  
E. Steers  
F. Rabbits

XVIII. Washing of Animals: All washing of animals shall be concluded 1 hour before judging starts.

XIX. Removal of Feed Troughs, Buckets, etc.: All feed troughs, feed buckets, etc., must be removed from alley ways thirty minutes before judging.

XX. Insurance on Exhibit Barn: To be discussed U.S.D.A. Health Regulations

1. All lambs and steers must be checked and given health papers before they can be put in the barn. This must be done by a veterinarian.

2. All pigs must be checked by a licensed veterinarian, temperatured, and given health papers before they can be unloaded from your trailer.

Note: We plan to have a veterinarian here on the day of the show to check and issue these health papers. Pigs will have to be checked again before the Plainview Show.

New Business: Horses, rabbits.

Horses - 2 classes (halter) Jr. & Sr. 6 mos. ownership - immediate family. No stallions.

Rabbits - 3 classes (doe, buck, fryer)  
1. New Zealand  
2. Cross  
3. Rex

Ownership - 1 month prior  
Weights - 3-6 pounds

Ollie Liner, Hale County Agricultural agent, is a very busy man, not only with his job but as a volunteer worker, as well.

As chairman of the Hale County Extension service, his primary responsibility is adult education in the latest agricultural research findings. He adapts the research from experiment stations across the state to the farms of this county.

Also, he supervises all county 4-H activities. He travels with the groups who go to area stock shows and has served as judge for junior and adult stock shows in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Nebraska.

For his work in stock shows he has received many honors.

In 1970 the livestock officials dedicated the Southwest Junior Livestock Show to him. He was named the assistant general superintendent of the Panhandle South Plains Fair Association in 1969.

On two occasions he coached the Texas livestock judging team at the American Royal Livestock Show.

Liner serves as general superintendent of the Plainview Stock Show each year and for the past ten years has served as general chairman of the Soil Fertility Day activities.

Awards for outstanding work as county agent have come frequently for Liner. In 1956, other Texas agents honored him as the "Distinguished Service Award" winner. He was given the "Texas Superior Award" by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service in 1968.

In 1971 he was made an honorary member of the Alpha Zeta fraternity, an agricultural organization on college campuses.

He recently was elected a director of the Plainview Chamber of Commerce. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club,

the Farm Bureau and the Texas Agents Association, where he has served as a director.

He has been Hale County Agent since 1950 and served as assistant agent here prior to 1947. He is an animal science graduate of Texas Tech University with a minor in vocational agriculture.

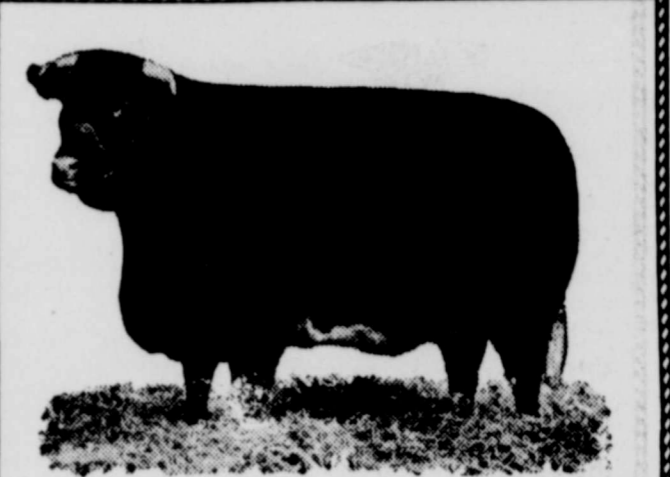

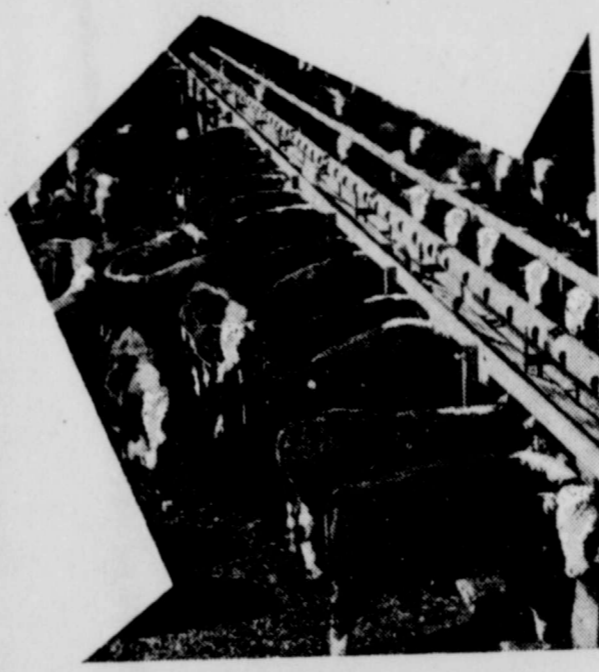
## TEXAS TALK

by Harold Thompson

**COTTON PLANTING** - Temperatures, even when considerably above freezing, severely limit the growth of cotton. This is especially true for planting time. It is generally agreed that cotton emerges faster and grows better when the seeds are not planted until the soil temperature 8 inches below the surface stays above 60 degrees fahrenheit for at least ten days. Depending on who is running the figures, average planting time for cotton on the Plains of Texas is either May 3rd or 4th.

**MAJOR GROUPS** - Formal designation of the three major cotton groups is described by authorities as: Asiatic Diploid, American Diploid and American Amphidiploid. Polynesian hybrids are generally grouped with the American Amphidiploid. Diploid refers to the composition of the cotton cell. Hybrids are developed to improve staple qualities, shorten growing season and enhance drought resistance.

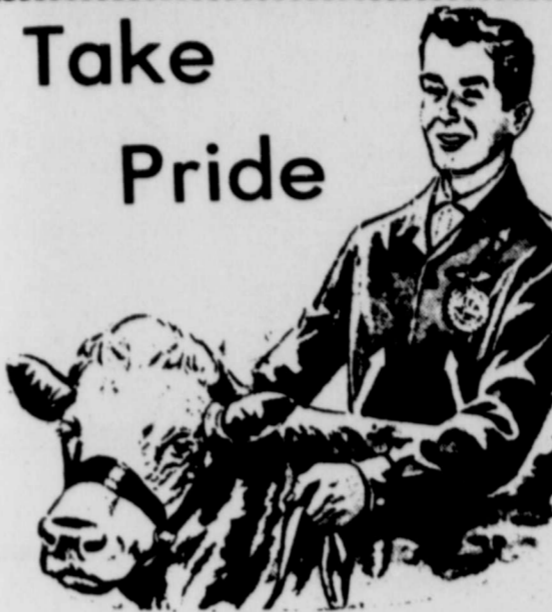

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**  
**SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975**

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)**  
 Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)**  
 Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."
