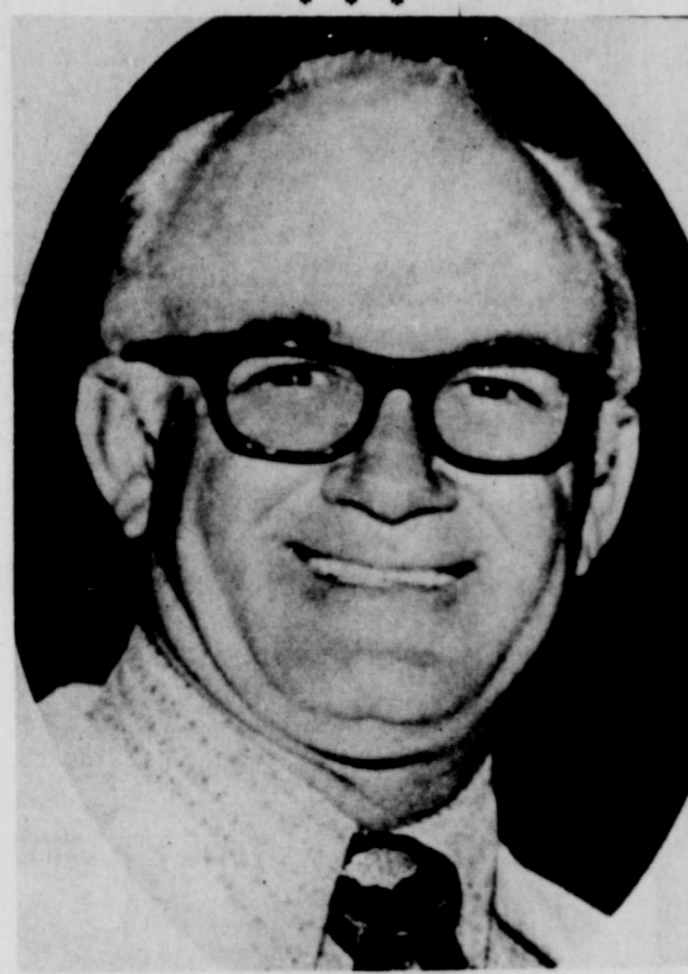

CHARLES W. JARVIS SLATED AS CHAMBER BANQUET SPEAKER

Introduced over the United States as the "finest pain killer on the platform circuit," and listed by the Associated Clubs, Inc., as America's number one humorous speaker, Charles W. Jarvis, DDS, has been named as speaker for Thursday night's Chamber of Commerce banquet, set for 8:00 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Dr. Jarvis is a dentist who has switched careers successfully several times... from Navy Deck Officer to Navy Carrier Pilot--to dentist--to speaker.

He started his speaking career in 1959 as a result of a Master of Ceremonies performance which received such approving notices that he was soon invited to many functions in the neighboring cities of San Antonio and Austin. Each of his presentations received such favorable recommendations that he turned professional in 1961.

A native Texan, Jarvis attended Brady, Texas public Schools, Texas A & M, and the University of Houston. He is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland and the University of Texas School of Dentistry at Houston. His professional affiliations include Omicron Kappa Upsilon, and the National Dental Honor Society.

He is a member of the San Marcos, Texas First Christian Church, and is past president of the San Marcos Kiwanis club.

As a veteran of World War II, he served on the aircraft carrier, U. S. S. Langley as assistant navigator and deck officer. After the war he entered flight training, graduated from the navy flight training program, then served as a carrier pilot until 1948 when he resigned his commission in the navy in order to study dentistry.

After practicing dentistry in San Marcos for 12 years, he hit the speaking circuit in 1972 he joined the faculty of the University of Texas Dental School at San Antonio as director of clinics.

Jarvis' format is what he thinks the audience wants to hear--85% humor and 15% message. He has had wide experience as a public speaker with the Associated Clubs of America, Inc., and uses humor to illustrate the serious points of his messages.

ABERNATHY CITY COUNCIL SWEARS IN NEW MEMBER

Mayor J. Pete Thompson presided over Monday evening's city council meeting in city hall, with all councilmen present with the exception of Alderman Bobby Cunningham.

First item of business on the council's agenda was the canvassing of April 5 election results, which were found in order by the council, as presented by election judge Dan Ward.

J. Pete Thompson was re-elected mayor with a vote of 181, running unopposed, with two write-in votes were listed for Leonard Cortez and Virgil Wade.

Alderman Clifton Newton retained his seat on the council with a vote of 147 and Waymon Jones was elected to place on the city council with 106 votes. Sammie Humley, also running for a seat on the council, received 75 votes, with write-in votes listed for Morris Kerr and Charles R. Hobgood.

Election results were found in order by the council, and aldermen Clifton Newton and Waymon Jones were sworn into office by justice of the Peace Jeanne Marx.

The 1975 Board of Equalization was also approved by the council, with Don McKenzie, Ralph Wolf, and Leland Phillips retained as committee members. Irving Rhodes was listed as first alternate, and Morris Stevens as second alternate.

In other business, the council granted permission to let bids for a seal-coat on approximately 24 blocks of streets in the city, and granted a contract to Marlan U. V. Air Spray Inc., for pesticide spraying. The contract was renewed due to what was termed satisfactory service in the past two years.

The commission also agreed to enter into a work agreement with the state highway department for the erection and maintenance of flashing signs at the crosswalk at the intersection of Main Street and Ave. D.

Other business included an agreement by councilmen to participate in federal flood insurance programs in order to remain eligible for federal grants, and the appointment of Waymon Jones as council representative to the Hale County Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs committee. Jones will replace Bobby Cunningham in this capacity.

Also approved by the council were rules and regulations governing the meeting room at the new fire station.

City manager Larry Fields was instructed by the mayor to set up a meeting for Hale County commissioners to discuss money paid to the local fire department for fire calls, and an increase in money paid to the fire department for maintenance was agreed upon, with the new sum set at \$200, a \$75 increase over the previous sum.

With no further business on the agenda, the meeting was adjourned.

Farmers Insurance Group of companies selected Milt Pope to attend a school for career agents at the organization's Austin Regional Office last week.

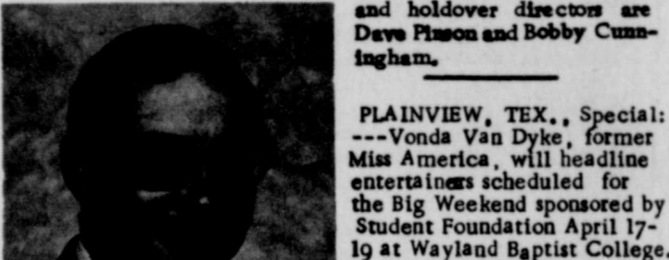
Harold Roulette, regional manager, said candidates for this school must meet a highest of standards to qualify for training.

Kenneth Phillips underwent surgery Monday in St. Mary's Hospital, Lubbock.

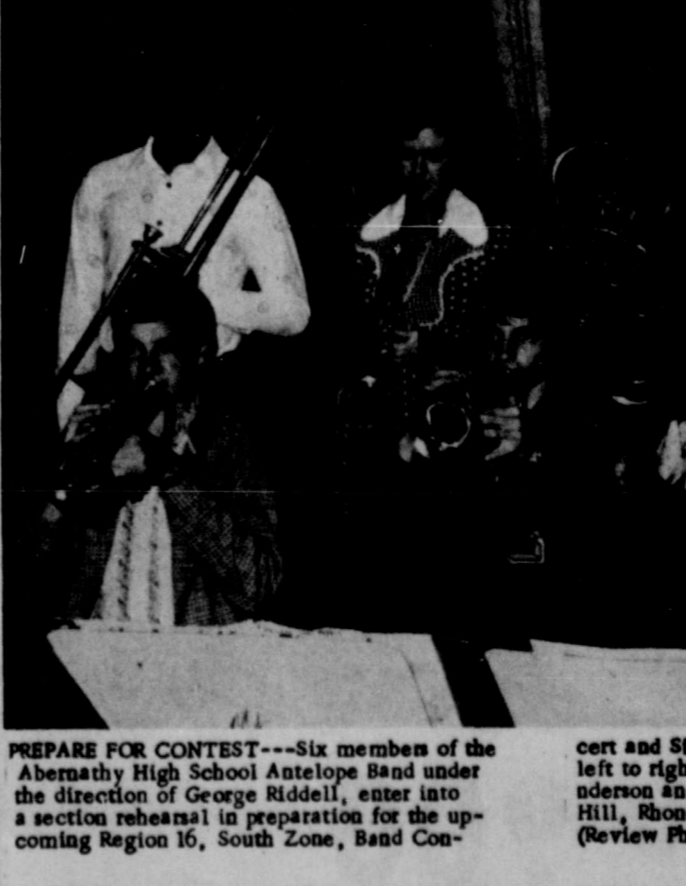
TWO ARRESTED IN RAID HERE THURSDAY

Two local men were released on bond by Hale County officials Saturday following their arrests Thursday by state drug enforcement officers, local police and Hale County sheriff's deputies.

Arrested were Joe Perez, 63 and Roland Perez, 21, both of 1600 Ave. B, in Abernathy. The two were transferred into the custody of Hale County officials Friday, pending arraignment.

The pair was arrested at about 10:00 p.m. Thursday when police, working under authority of a search warrant issued by Abernathy Justice of the Peace Jeanne Marx, discovered a substantial amount of a substance believed to be marijuana at the Perez residence.

Bond was set at \$15,000 for the younger man and at \$10,000 for the elder. The two were released Saturday when bond was posted in Plainview.

Morning services throughout the week will begin at 10:00 a.m., with evening services set at 8:00 p.m.

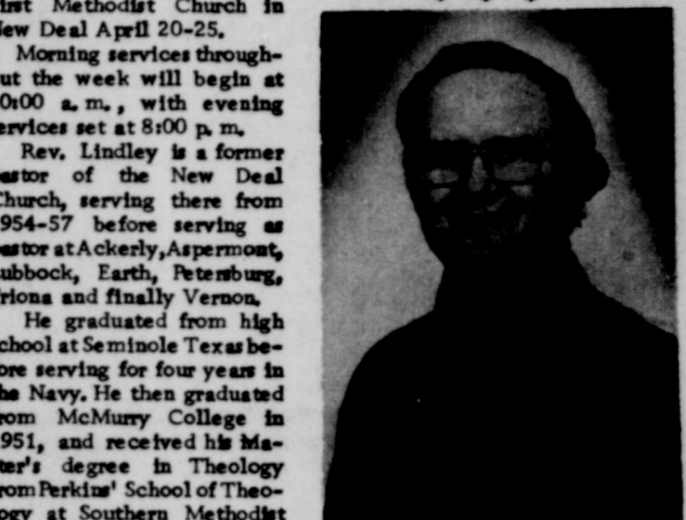

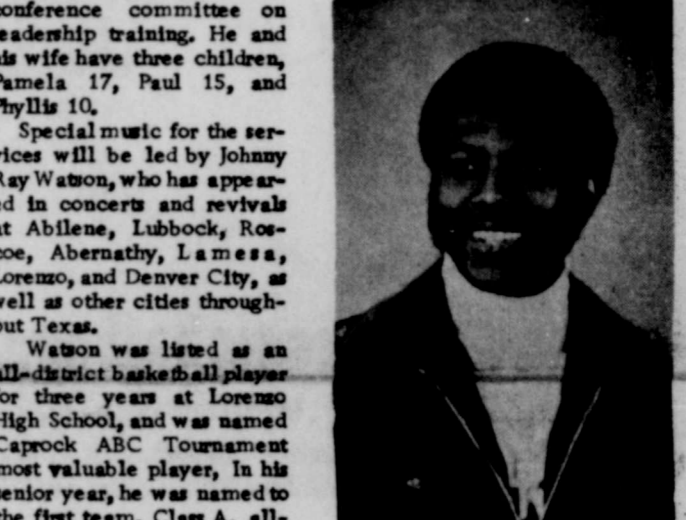

TEXAS TALK

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CO-OP SPONSORS PROGRAM FOR RURAL YOUTH CAREERS

Realizing that the greatest need for rural America today is to keep its young people interested in the benefits of rural life, Producers Grain Corporation has indicated their support for an educational program to aid rural youth in choosing a career.

The educational program is called "Careers in Cooperatives." It is designed to generate interest, provide placement, and training for youth seeking a local cooperative career in the exciting field of agribusiness. "Our approach in the past

has been to seek out and hire well-qualified employees after they finish school. Today the competition for personnel is greater, and we must interest young people in a cooperative career, before they finish high school or enter college," a cooperative representative stated.

"We are cooperating with our area junior colleges and universities in a career curriculum which will help solve our man power needs. We are working with high school guidance counselors and the directors of curriculum for our junior colleges and universities, and are emphasizing to each youth that we talk to that at any point in his or her schooling, there is a place for that person in our local cooperative. At the high school level, we are encouraging students to follow a general business curriculum. If that youth does not want to continue his or her schooling past high school, he or she can begin a cooperative career."

At the junior college or university level, a student may follow the cooperative careers curriculum for one or two years or more. Following the first year a student will take a field study in a local cooperative under the supervision of their school and regional cooperative.

"This will give both on-the-job training for co-op development and also help the student determine whether he or she wants to continue his co-op program. The same situation occurs at the end of the second year. In

addition to earning college credits, the student will be earning funds to support his or her education. At the conclusion of the two years, the student may elect to enter his co-op career or continue to a four-year college for further education."

The curriculum being stressed at the junior college level is a general agribusiness one. The first year it consists of 34 hours of credit including agribusiness math, principles of plant science, chemistry, economics, business communications, writing, personal finance, principles of animal science, accounting, and soils and fertilizer. The second year's courses include agribusiness marketing, human relations, speech, business control, ag chemicals, principles of livestock nutrition, elevator and feed mill technology, cooperative grain marketing, business organizations, and agribusiness law.

"After two years of post high school study, we think we will have students who will be qualified to be branch managers, office managers, and the like. They will have shown their interest in going to work for a co-op. We think that this program has a tremendous potential for assisting youth from our rural areas to have a good career in our town. In doing so they will support the local economy and be of assistance to a great segment of our state, namely agriculture. 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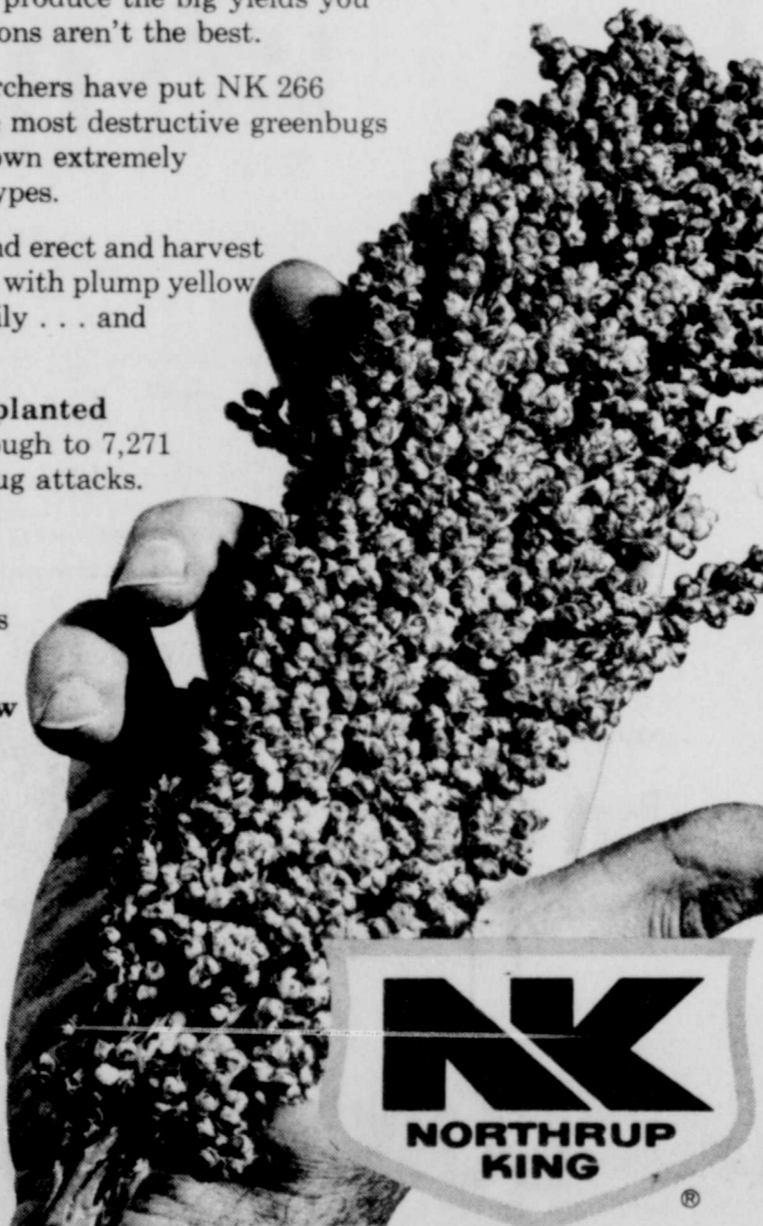

The City Garden Club met Thursday, April 10, at 3:00 p.m. in the city club room.

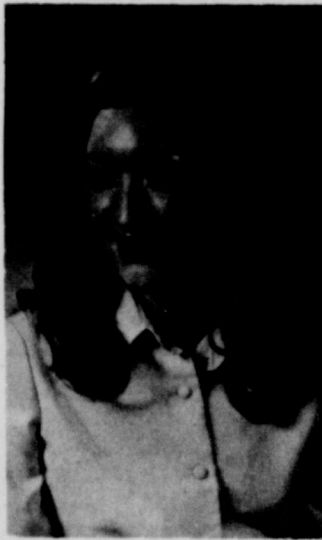

 - 4 tablespoons brown sugar
 - 1 cinnamon
- Cake:
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 2 sticks butter
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 cup sour cream
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Cream butter and sugar, add eggs, vanilla, sour cream. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt, and add gently to cream mixture.
- Grease tube pan and dust with half of the nut mixture, then pour one-half of the batter into the pan. Top with remaining 1/2 of mixture and add remainder of batter. Bake at 350 degrees.
