ABERNATHY SEVENTH-GRADE CINDERMEN ARE WINNERS OF DISTRICT TITLE

For the fourth time this year, the seventh grade boys' track team was team champion in their track meet. A total of 180 points was good enough to outdistance second place Floydada by 49 points.

The field events once again proved strong for the yearlings when the young tracksters scored 59 points before the running events began.

Gilbert Cuevas and Ralph Flores started the day off by each jumping eight feet to tie for first place in the pole vault.

Toby Barrick's leap of four feet, eight inches was good for sixth place in the high jump which was won with a

jump of five feet, two inches.

Ignacio Ruiz and Mike Flores placed second and sixth respectively in the long jump. Ruiz sailed 16 feet, five and one-half inches for his second-place ribbon.

Ruben Olguin heaved the shotput over 36 feet to garner top honors in his specialty, with Gilbert Cuevas following closely for second. Gilbert's toss of 110 feet, three and one-fourth inches added yet another blue ribbon to his collection for the district, and Ruben added points with a fourth-place finish.

The 440 yard relay team of Roger Lindsey, Ignacio Ruiz, Mike Flores, and Johnny Ray Johnson held off a strong challenge by Floydada to take first place honors with a time of 52.2 seconds.

Ruiz, Rudy Martinez, and Dean McGuire produced the most points for a single event by placing first, second and fourth, respectively in the 660 yard run for a total of 22 points.

Ralph Flores could manage only a third place finish in the 60-yard high hurdles, but with a fifth place finish by Toby Barrick, the two competitors added eight more points to the growing total.

Mike Flores' time of 11.8 seconds was excellent in the 100 yard dash but was good for second place.

Mike came back in the following event, which was the 330 yard dash, and matched his second place finish but was followed closely by Cuevas and Martinez who placed fourth and fifth.

The 210 yard low hurdles also provided an abundance of points when Roger Lindsey won the event and Ralph Flores and Barrick took third and fifth places respectively. Ralph Flores finished his long day by winning the

1320 yard run in a time of 4:02.9. This gave him a total of 31 points.

The 1320 yard relay team remained unbeaten for the year by beating the second place Floydada team by nearly five seconds. Gilbert Cuevas, Roger Lindsey, Rudy Martinez and Ignacio Ruiz make up the team.

The boys added the district championship to their already impressive collection of trophies for the season.

W. B. Criswell of Idalou, a cotton farmer with a distinguished record of cotton production and community service, was elected President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at the organization's board meeting in Lubbock, April 17.

The 44-year old Lubbock County producer succeeds Don Marble of South Plains, who becomes Chairman of the Board. Following his election, Criswell expressed his appreciation to the board for their confidence and pledged his best efforts to "continue the organization's traditional role of providing worthwhile benefits to the membership."

The PCG board also moved Lloyd Cline of Lamesa, a director since 1966 and Chairman of the PCG Finance

Committee, from the office of Secretary-Treasurer to Vice President, Joe D. Unfred of New Home was elected Secretary-Treasurer. Unfred is a member of the PCG Executive Committee and has been the Lynn County producer director to PCG since 1965.

The board meeting followed the organization's 18th Annual Membership Meeting, attended by over 400 people and dominated by an air of optimism for the intermediate and long-range future of cotton in general and High Plains cotton in particular.

In addition to annual reports from President Marble and PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, speakers included top executives of Cotton Incorporated (CI), the producer's national cotton research and marketing company.

LIONS CLUB HEARS REPORT ON NEW JUNIOR HIGH VOCATIONAL PROGRAM

Mrs. L. G. (Jan) Montgomery presented a very interesting program during the noon luncheon meeting of the Abernathy Lions Club Tuesday.

Mrs. Montgomery's presentation was centered around the vocational education program in the Abernathy Public Schools, primarily concerning the 12-member class of girls she teaches in a pre-employment program. Seeing a dream she had

12 years ago become a reality has given Mrs. Montgomery a sense of accomplishment from the standpoint of knowing there is now a program available in the school system to help prepare students for a vocation and even prepare them for part-time jobs while in school. This in itself helps alleviate the drop-out problem experienced in many schools.

The program here was started in 1970 as a pilot program under special educa-

tion, then in 1972 was placed under vocational education. Mrs. Montgomery's class is under Home Economics department, and Bill Corning's boys' class is under vocational agricultural department.

The program has been updated with commercial equipment, and Mrs. Montgomery stated that the class hopes to serve its first meal next week in the new commercial kitchen, located in the old elementary building. A dining room which will seat 24 people carries a Western theme. Meals will be served to groups on a reservation basis only.

In addition to working and training in food service, they also train in laundry service, clothing service, etc., and even do their own maintenance in the rooms. "We have even washed windows in a home... learning the various household skills," Mrs. Montgomery pointed out.

Mrs. Montgomery expressed her appreciation to the people of this community for having the foresight to help establish such a program in the school system.

Picnic Spaghetti--from the kitchen of ue Rhodes.
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 lb. hot sausage
1/2 cup chopped, green-peppers
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup olives, chopped
1/2 cup sliced canned mushrooms
1 cup tomato sauce
1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes
2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon worcestershire sauce
6 ounces spaghetti, (uncooked, vermicelli)
Brown beef and sausage in large pot. Add onion and green pepper, cook five minutes. Add remaining ingredients, except spaghetti, and stir well. Bring to boil and add spaghetti. Reduce heat to low, cover and simmer about 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serves six to eight.

Demand for quality cotton continues to increase. Not only is the use of natural fiber rebounding, but the by-product market is also expanding. Since average cottonseed meal is at least 41 percent protein, it is becoming increasingly important as a primary feed for cattle, sheep and horses.

Expeller, Hydraulic and Solvent are processes used to produce meal or cake from raw cottonseed. Expeller and Hydraulic processes leave about 5 percent fat content in processed meal while the Solvent process leaves less than 1-1/2 percent.

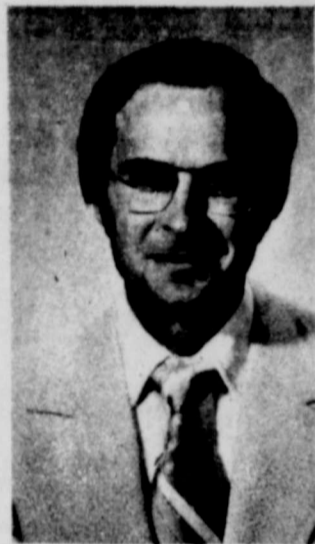
Research now underway may result in an economically feasible method of limiting Gossypol (a cottonseed toxin) content to low enough levels to make cottonseed meal a primary protein supplement for swine and poultry. Success could significantly increase this by-product demand.
