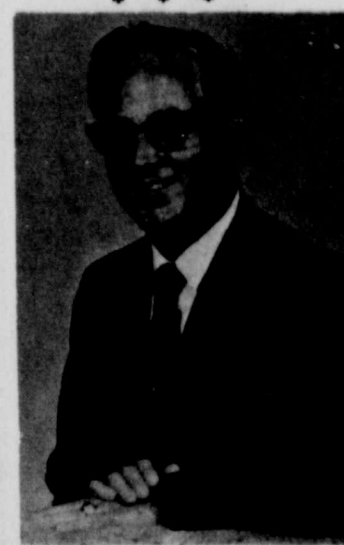

## Band To Play In Colorado Festival

The Abernathy High School Antelope band will be one of the area's representatives at the annual Blossom Festival in Canon City Colorado May 2-5.

The Antelope band earned the trip by receiving "1" ratings in their sightreading contests in Seagraves this month, and in their marching competitions held in November. They received a "2" rating for their concert performance in Seagraves.

The Abernathy band will be one of approximately 30 bands, representing schools in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas and Colorado, providing music and parades for the traditional Canon City festival.

Competing with bands from Springlake, Gruver, Sunray, Sanford Fritch and Muleshoe, as well as from other states, the Antelope band will be judged Saturday, May 3 on the field and parade marching. An added treat for the students will be the opportunity to see well-known recording artist Tom T. Hall in concert during their visit to the Canon City Jaycee-sponsored festival.

Third place winners in the literary contest included Gay Hobgood in seventh and eighth grade spelling and Gene McDonald in number sense.

## Students Receive Employment Training In New Vocational Program

Students in Mrs. Jan Montgomery's vocational education classes will receive pre-employment training in food service under the auspices of a new program now underway in rooms 3A and 3B in the elementary building here.

Students in the program will receive their training by actually preparing and serving food to local groups and organizations, and a faculty

breakfast will be their first assignment. The students are also making plans for a luncheon for their parents, to be served next week.

The two rooms are divided from both dining room and kitchen, and are furnished along the lines of a commercial restaurant.

The kitchen is arranged in work units, with the beverage unit fitted out with coffee maker, tea urn, water station and ice machine.

The cook unit includes range, char broiler, griddle, deep fryer, food warmer, infra-red food warmer, microwave oven, waffle maker, toaster and sandwich unit. Furnishings for the preparation unit include baker's table, food mixer, refrigerator and freezer, and a garbage disposal, dishwasher, pot sink, hand sink and clothes washer and dryer make up the furnishings for the clean-up unit.

The storage and book-keeping unit consists of shelves, closet, desk and filing cabinet. The western decor of the dining room is complimented by rustic paneling and beamed ceiling, wrought iron

chandeliers, and red and black chairs and tables to seat 24. Oenberg draperies made by the students drape one wall below a cornice made of the paneling and trimmed with red fringe.

Red and white checked table cloths, red napkins, white china and red glasses will complete the western atmosphere of the dining room.

Remodeling of the rooms has provided on-the-job training in carpentry for students of Bill Corning.

Arrangements for groups wishing to have meals in the facility may be made in advance through Mrs. Montgomery.

Other business on the agenda for the dinner meeting included the presentation of dividend checks for the past year, and an audit report by

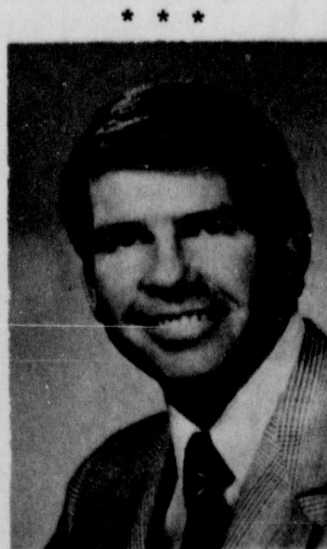
cooperative and tax advisor Moss of Lubbock.

### NATURAL IRRIGATION GAS HEARINGS MOVED TO SOUTHWEST

Hearings to determine the future of natural gas for irrigation will be held soon in three southwestern U. S. cities, although observers predict the issue will ultimately be decided by the Supreme Court.

The three sessions, each expected to last three days, will be held in Lubbock, Tex., Albuquerque, N.M., and Phoenix, Ariz.

There will be no curtailment of natural gas for irrigation until the hearings are over and the initial decision is reached by an administrative law judge, according to a spokesman in the Washington office of Sen. John Tower of Texas.

The future of natural gas as a farm fuel has been in question since the Federal Power Commission issued a ruling last December which lowered the use of natural gas for agriculture from second to third priority.

Although that decision applied only to customers of El Paso Natural Gas Company, observers believe the action will eventually result in curtailment of natural gas as a farm fuel throughout the United States.

Spokesman for agriculture feel such curtailment would have a devastating effect on production of food and fiber.

Officers and staff of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, headquartered in Lubbock, have worked full time since the December ruling to block the curtailment and have sought to move the hearings from Washington to the Southwest where farmers will be hardest hit by loss of natural gas.

Working with the High Plains Gas Users Association and Southwest Consumers Association, GSPA spokesmen have continually stressed the technical and economic impossibility of converting irrigation to alternate fuel sources.

GSPA vice president Mabry Foreman of Felt, Okla., and research director Jack King have met regularly with leg-

islators in Washington, personnel of the FPC, representatives of the Federal Energy Agency and U. S. Department of Agriculture, attempting to demonstrate the impossibility of converting commonly used automotive irrigation engines from natural gas to gasoline or propane.

A study by Dr. James Osborn of Texas Tech University indicates conversion to gasoline would increase hourly fuel costs 320 percent for 150 H. P. engine. Conversion to propane, according to the study, would increase hourly costs 282 percent.

The annual cost of a 3,000 hour irrigation season on the same 150 h. p. engine would jump from \$3,570 for natural gas to \$15,000 for gasoline and \$13,650 for propane, according to the study.

### AREA FARMERS TO RECEIVE CROP ACREAGE QUESTIONNAIRES LATER THIS MONTH

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry -- agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals.
