Ice Cream Supper Slated Tonight At School Cafeteria

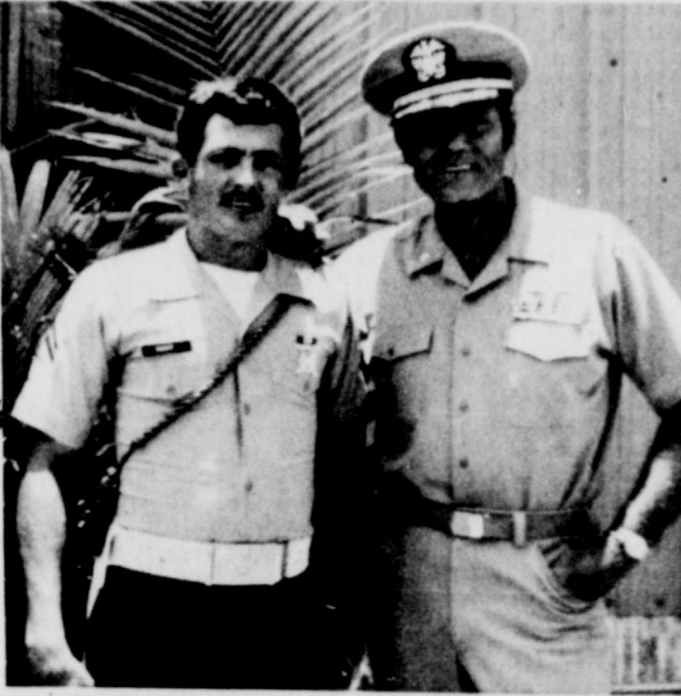
Abernathy High School football players and bandmen and their parents will be guests tonight, (August 14) at the school cafeteria for an annual ice-cream supper.

Auditorium Gets "Face-Lift"

October 1 is the projected completion date for a massive renovation project now underway at the Abernathy school auditorium.

The face-lift project, at a cost of \$98,600, will include enlarging the present stage area by 12 feet in length and 7 1/2 feet in width; a complete new lighting system for both the stage and auditorium area, and the installation of a new forced-air heating and air conditioning system.

Other changes in the structure will include the conversion of what was formerly a 'cry room' into an extension of the ladies powder-room; the addition of a new sound system, with approximately 20 speakers scattered at strategic intervals throughout the auditorium; and the carpeting of auditorium aisles.

In addition, the contract, which was let by the school board on June 17 to C.B. Thompson General Contractors of Lubbock, calls for the re-painting of the lobby area and exterior doors and the addition of new curtains for the stage area.

The new auditorium interior will be modernistic in design, featuring recessed lighting in the ceiling; and the present window sills will be bricked in and replaced with decorative panels. Existing seats will be retained, but with new coverings. Decor of the new interior will center on earth-colors such as rust and deep burnt orange.

Work on the project was begun on July 1, with completion set at 90 days from that date.

Cost of the renovation will be absorbed through various sources, including interest from a 1972 Bond issue, sale of county land in Bailey County, and tax collections which have exceeded budget estimates in the past few years.

School board members at the time of the building's construction in 1949 included Morris Stevens, Hugh Vaughn, Ted Watts, R.D. Dyer, L.B. Young, Frank Lovelace, and G.W. Blackmon, who voted unanimously to let bids for the construction of a school auditorium.

The contract for base construction of the structure was let to the Joe Telford Construction company at a cost of \$98,350, with the American Seating Company named to provide seating at a cost of \$14,600.00. With the addition of plumbing, electricity and sheet metal, the cost figure for the structure rose to \$114,455.00, not including seating.

Dedicated upon its completion to Abernathy veterans of World War II, the building is the oldest structure on the local school campus, with the exception of the old gymnasium. The present project is

the only major renovation in building's history, though a second sound system was added in 1964, and evaporative air conditioning was initiated in 1970.

It was reported that the current renovation project was undertaken in view of the existing facility's inadequacy in meeting the growing needs of the school system and community, and the generally poor condition of the structure itself, which would have necessitated major and extensive repairs in a short time.

ELBERT HARP RAPS MOVE TO HALT GRAIN EXPORTS

Imagine headlines proclaiming "U.S. CATTLE FEEDERS DEMAND IMPORT OF 11 MILLION HEAD OF CATTLE. BEEF PRICES PLUNGE TO 15 CENTS A POUND."

Cattle feeders would never do that, but they are doing the same thing when they seek an embargo on U.S. grain exports, claims Elbert Harp, executive director of the national Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board.

Harp, who also chairs the U.S. Feed Grains Council, Washington, D.C., said that the grain which was exported last year would have added beef equivalent to 11 million head of cattle, had the campaign to halt grain exports been successful.

He pointed out that between October 1, 1974, and July 4, 1975, U.S. exports of corn and sorghum totaled 1 billion, 97 million bushels. Assuming that each steer weighing 600 pounds required 40 bushels of grain to fatten it to a weight of 1,000 pounds, the exported grain would have fattened 27 million more cattle than were already fattened. The additional gains would have totaled 11 billion pounds of live beef, or the equivalent of 11 million head of new cattle.

"Since beef markets were already saturated and the cattle industry in serious trouble, more cattle would have made an intolerable situation even worse," Harp said.

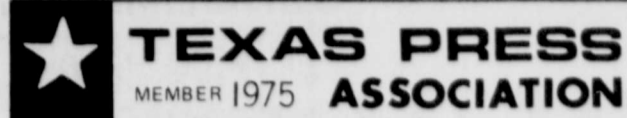

Outdoors in Texas

Crappie Fishing

What do you call him? Papermouth, white perch, or calico bass, the crappie is perhaps the most popular fish in Texas. Waters in this state have two types, white and black, and since colors vary, the only real way is count the spines in the dorsal fin. The whites have five or six, the black seven or more. Many white crappie can weigh 5 pounds, with the record being 4 lbs. and 9 oz. Texas fishermen take crappie on several small lures, but the live minnow is still the most popular. Crappie fishing is perhaps the least expensive pastime, with a cane pole, a section of line, a 2/0 wire hook, a float, and some split shot about 8 to 10 inches above the hook makes a fine rig. Fish the channels, ledges, and brush piles for the crappie, and mark the line where you catch the first one. They are schooling fish, and stay together at the same level. **Tip of the Week:** Start crappie fishing deep, and gradually raise the bait until that first fish is caught. Crappie will not raise more than a foot to take the bait, and they will never dive to feed.

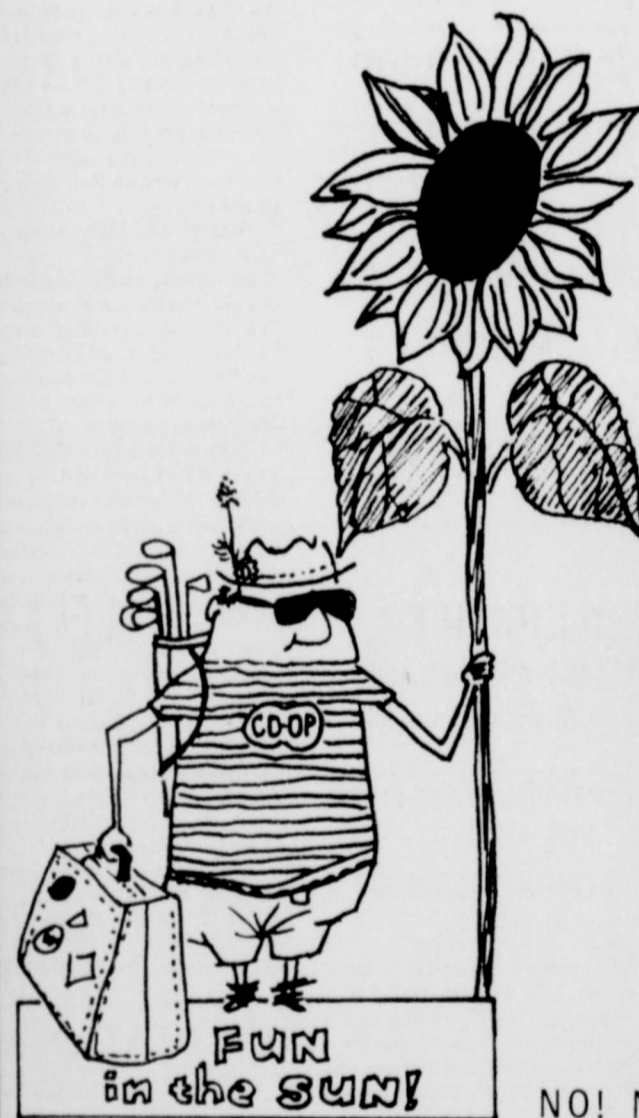

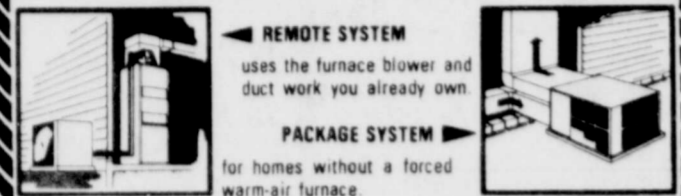

Another Federal Agency is moving closer to the farm. This time it's the Environmental Protection Agency. EPA officials are now sifting through the chemical analysis of nearly 35-thousand pesticides to decide which ones will require a government restriction. Those chemicals classed as restricted may be applied only by persons certified. Although the starting date for the certification requirement is more than a year away (October, 1976), many farm operators are all ready checking the requirements for certification. The establishment of two levels of certification will make things easier for most ag producers. To be certified as a private applicator (applying pesticides on your own land) boils down basically to being able to read and follow instructions. Commercial certification will involve passing a written test which will cover chemical formulas, equipment specifications and EPA rules and regulations.

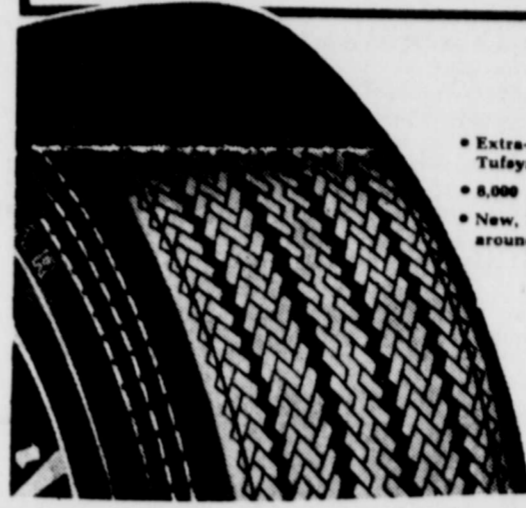
