TOUCH FOOTBALL GAME TO BENEFIT VICTOR TREVINO

Coaches and sponsors of Abernathy's Little League organization will meet Monday, September 8 for a touch football game to benefit Victor Trevino, 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Trevino, who is currently under treatment for leukemia at the University of Texas Medical Center in Galveston.

Admission to the game will be a free-will donation.

The game will begin at 8:00 p. m. at the football field, and proceeds will supplement the approximate \$200,00 which has already been contributed to help with Victor's hospital expenses. In addition, a fire department vehicle will travel Abernathy streets prior to the game from 6:00 to 7:30 p. m. taking contributions from those who do not plan to attend the football game. In addition, jar for donations to the fund has been placed in a number of local businesses.

According to preliminary plans, both the Senior High and Junior High bands will present a halftime performance.

According to hospital spokesman A. L. Hartley, a social worker in charge of Victor's case at the medical center, the real need for funds lies in the expense of room and board for Victor's mother, who is staying with her son during his treatment in Galveston. This figure will total almost \$400,00 for the projected 42 days of the Trevino's stay at the center. In addition, after his release as a patient from the hospital, Victor will have to return to Galveston once or twice each month for treatment.

According to Hartley, doctors on the case have "real hope" for victory over the often fatal disease, because Victor's case was diagnosed at such an early stage. He also reported that Victor will receive instruction from a hospital staff tutor, enabling him to continue his school studies during his hospital stay.

PRESIDENT FORD MEETS WITH WHEAT PRODUCERS; REAFFIRMS FULL - PRODUCTION PROGRAM

President Gerald Ford, meeting with wheat organization leaders in Vail, Colorado August 20, used the occasion to (1) reaffirm his program of full production for agriculture, (2) express expectation of further sales of wheat and other grains to ALL domestic and foreign customers--likely on smaller periodic sales announcements, (3) call for consumer, labor and producers to "cool it" and give him time to negotiate a settlement with labor which will assure that grain sold to ALL our customers will be loaded when Maritime interests get some of the things they are requesting--a larger percentage of U. S. grain going to the USSR hauled on U. S. ships at higher rates (U. S. subsidy) and imported oil hauled on U. S. ships at higher than competitive rates (U. S. subsidy).

While the meeting with the President did not develop any new information, gain any new direction or reach any definite solutions, it did serve to daunt the ire of wheat leaders and their supporters back home on the tractor--by the fact that finally they had found "someone" with power to "act" who would listen to their facts, appeals and disclaimers relative to their two big marketing problems--administrative export controls closing the gate on free markets after their response to the administration program of "full production" and embargoes by longshoremen of grain going to the Soviet Union, threatening a return to surpluses.

The meeting with the President came at the close of a regular scheduled meeting of Great Plains Wheat, Inc., a regional market development organization of which Ken Kendrick of Stratford, was elected President at the meeting, and participated in by officers of Western Wheat Associates and the National Association of Wheat Growers--all of which Texas Wheat Producers Board support through membership and contracts.

At a meeting of the Executive Board of the National Association of Wheat Growers in Denver following the close of the session in Vail, wheat leaders from all the major wheat producing states agreed to honor President Ford's request to "cool it" until the next crop report comes out September 11, and give him the time requested to work out acceptable agreements with labor leaders regarding loading Russian-bound grain ships. While fully expecting favorable action as promised by the President, the group appointed committees to immediately begin research as to alternatives and development of approaches to further action by producers if sales barriers are not lifted and/or shipments are not being loaded. The groups were specifically requested to explore (1) legal action, (2) further administrative action, (3) legislative action, (4) further supply/demand documentation and (5) an emergency action fund and media education program.

Those participating from Texas other than Kendrick, were: Dwight Hamilton, Olney, Chairman, TWPB; C. L. Edwards, Panhandle, Vice Chairman TWPB; Leo Witkowski, Hereford, Association President; and Bill Nelson, Amarillo, the organizations executive vice president and administrative officer.

To me, it is an honor and a privilege to live in a community in which people will respond with tremendous teamwork in an effort to aid someone in need--regardless of race, color or creed.

When it was learned early last week that 12-year-old Victor Trevino was suffering from leukemia and was hospitalized in Galveston State University of Texas State Hospital, plans began to take shape in an effort to help the family with necessary expenses in relation to the emergency.

The Abernathy Baseball Association formulated plans for a touch football game, with admission being donations to the Victor Trevino Fund, and scheduled the game for next Monday night at Antelope Field at 8:00 o'clock.

Turkey Hunting One of the most challenging hunts in Texas is not the javalina or whitetail, but the crafty old turkey . . . and the better you know this bird, the better chance you have for success. Game biologists in Texas have predicted a decent crop of birds this fall, due to spring rains in prime turkey country. Wild turkeys were found in this country by early explorers, and were carried back to Europe. During the fall and winter, they feed mostly on winter grasses, acorns and pecans. Hunters will often spot white turkeys in the field, and these are not domestic birds gone wild, but wild turkeys touched by a freak of nature. A full grown Rio Grande turkey will weigh up to 18 pounds. Most hunters prefer a shotgun for turkeys, with heavy loads such as No. 2 or 4 shot. Less than 10% of the turkeys in Texas are killed by hunters, and thousands perish annually by disease, weather, and predators.

Prior to the game, contributions will be collected by volunteers canvassing the town on the local fire trucks.

A meeting of local men, including Latin American representatives, met last Thursday evening at James Graham's Restaurant to finalize plans for the benefit football game, and to inquire as to the immediate financial needs of the family as a result of Victor's illness.

Other organizations in town are also making plans for various money-raising activities.

Hoppy Toler, who is heading up the committee and administering the funds, related the following which took place Thursday.

A Lubbock man, who wishes not to be identified, was on his way to Amarillo and heard about Victor and the Trevino family's situation. He stopped in Abernathy, located Hoppy and told him he wanted to make a \$50.00 contribution to help out with the expenses.

Other people have called and also made donations to this cause.

I think it is important to note here that the Trevino family did not ask for any help, but help has been a spontaneous response since the need was made known.

And, according to reports, the Trevino's have been overwhelmed by the response of the community. And they are grateful.

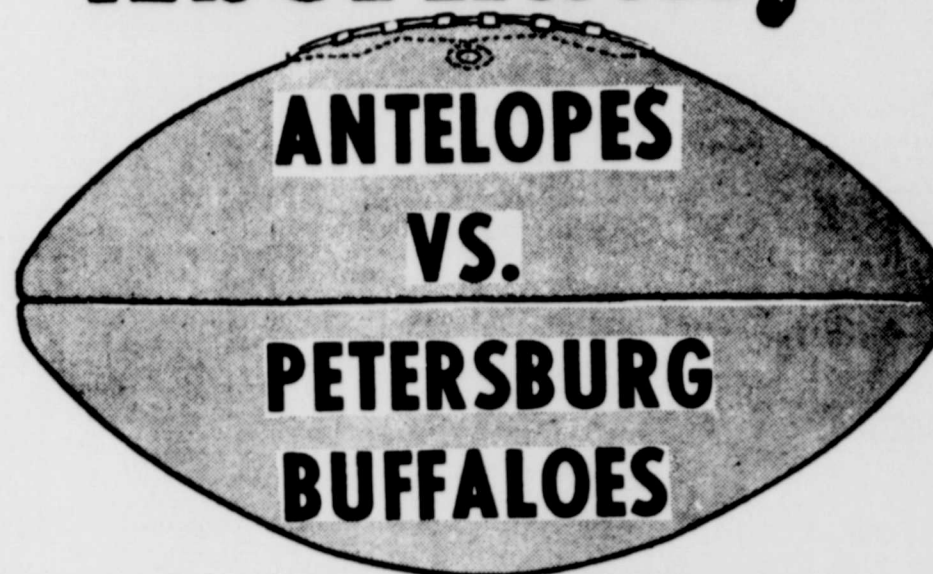
Cattlemen are being outdone by prune producers. At least as far as product promotion is concerned. Paul Horn, writing in one of this summer's issues of THE CATTLEMAN, cites the fact that the prune growers association of California spends more total dollars pushing prunes than the entire cattle industry does in promoting beef. This latest wrinkle comes as a part of the continuing push for the Beef Development Plan which could provide as much as 40 million dollars a year for the promotion and development of beef markets. Hold up on the operation still involves composition of the 68 member "Beef Board" and the mechanics of operating the "beef check-off" system which would provide financing for the promotion by collecting three-tenths of one percent of the sales price of slaughter cattle. If the still lingering problems are ironed out, collections could begin as early as next year.

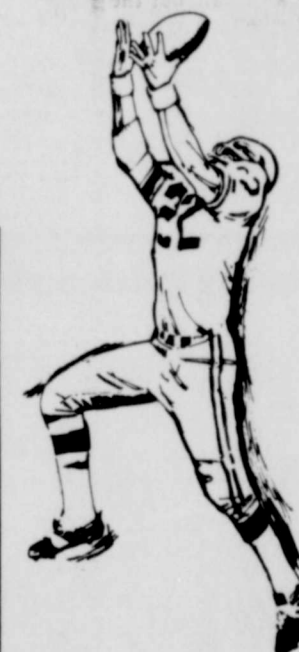
