PRESIDENT FORD MEETS WITH WHEAT PRODUCERS; REAFFIRMS FULL - PRODUCTION PROGRAM

meeting with wheat organigation leaders in Vail. Colorado August 20, used the occasion to (1) reaffirm his program of full production for agriculture, (2) express expectation of further sales of wheat and other grains to ALL domestic and foreign customers -- likely on smaller periodic sales announce ment, (5) call for consumer, labor and producers to "cool it" and give him time to negotiate a settlement with labor which will assure that grain sold to ALL our customers will be loaded when Maritime interests get some of the things they are requesting -- a larger percentage of U. S. grain going to the USSR hauled on U. S. shipe at higher rates (U. S. subsidy) and imported oil hauled on U. S. ships at higher than competitive rates (U. S. subsidy).

While the meeting with the President did not develop any new information, gain any new direction or reach any definite solutions, it did serve to daunt the ire of wheat leaders-and their supporters back home on the tractor -- by the fact that one" with power to "act" who would listen to their facts, appeals and disclaimers relative to their two big marketing problems --- administrative export controls closing the gate on free markets after their response to the administration program of "full production" and embargoes by longshoremen of grain going to the Soviet Union, threatening a return

to surplusses. The meeting with the President came at the close of a regular scheduled meeting of Great Plains Wheat, Inc. a regional market development organization of

which Ken Kendrick of Stratford, was elected President at the meeting, and participated in by officers of Western Wheat Associates and the National Association of Wheat Growers -- all of which Texas Wheat Producers Board support through membership and contracts.

At a meeting of the Executive Board of the National Association of Wheat Growers in Denver following the close of the session in Vail, wheat leaders from all the major wheat producing states agreed to honor President Fords request to "cool it" until the next crop report comes out September 11, and give him the time requested to work out acceptable agreements with labor leaders regarding loading Russian-bound grain ships. While fully expecting favorable action as promised by the President, the group appointed committees to immediately begin research as to alternatives and development of approaches to further action by producers if sales barriors are not lifted and/orshipments are not being loaded. The groups were specifically requested to explore (1) legal action, (2) further administrative action, (3) legislative action, (4) further supply/demand documentation and (5) an emergency action fund and media education program.

Turkey Hunting ne of the most challenging nunts in Texas is not the javalina or whitetail, but th crafty old turkey . . . and the better you know this bird the better chance you hav for success. Game biole st n Texas have predicted a due to spring rains in prime turkey country. Wild turkeys were found in this country by early explorers, and were carried back to Europe. During the fall and winter, they feed mostly on winter grasses, acorns and pecans. Hunters will often spot white turkeys in the field, and these are not domestic birds gone wild, but wild turkeys ouched by a freak of nature. full grown Rio Grande urkey will weigh up to 18 ounds. Most hunters prefer shotgun for turkeys, with heavy loads such as No. 2 or 4 shot. Less than 10% of the urkeys in Texas are killed by nunters, and thousands perish annually by disease, weather, and predators.

Cattlemen are being outdone by prune producers. At least as far as product promotion is concerned. Paul Horn, writing of THE CATTLEMAN, cites the fact that the prune growers association of California spends more total dollars pushing prunes than the entire cattle industry does in promoting beef. This latest wrinkle comes as a part of the continuing push for the Beef Development Plan which could provide as much as 40 million dollars a year for the promotion and development of beef markets. Hold up on the operation still involves composition of the 68 member "Beef Board" and the mech anics of operating the "beef check off" system which would provide financing for the promotion by collecting three tenths of one percent of the sales price of slaughter cattle. If the still lingering problems are ironed out, collections could begin as early as next year.

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

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
