## ANTELOPE BAND TAKES TOP HONORS FOR CLASS AA IN PANHANDLE SOUTH PLAINS FAIR PARADE COMPETITION MONDAY

"We're Number One!" was the victory cry heard early this week as members of the Antelope Band brought top honors back for their performance in Monday's Panhandle South Plains Fair.

The band, competing against five other Class AA bands from the area, won a first place trophy and \$150 in prize money for what judges termed an outstanding performance.

According to reports, contest judges cited the band's spirit, pride, and appearance

as major factors in their decision in the close contest. A margin of only one, or at most two, points separated the final scores of the six Class AA bands competing in the contest.

One judge was quoted as saying that the high spirit and obvious pride of the Antelope band during their marching performance won them their first place position, even though some of the other bands may have played their music a little better.

Second place winner in the Class AA competition was Lubbock Cooper, with Littlefield taking third place honors. Other bands in competition against the Antelopes in the contest included those representing schools in Denver City, Floydada, and Friendship.

Monday's victory marked the 20th for the Antelope band

in the history of the fair parade, and band director George Riddell urged the group Tuesday to keep working even harder to maintain the winning status of the band. The group began working Tuesday to shape up their performance for Friday's halftime performance during the Abernathy-Slaton football game.

Warm, clear Indian Summer weather was a much appreciated boon to this year's fair parade, in contrast to the rainy weather which necessitated the cancellation of last year's competition.

Although Junior High bands did not compete for awards in the parade, it was reported that the Abernathy Junior High band gave an "outstanding performance" as they marched through the Lubbock streets.

## REGISTRATION CLOSES OCTOBER THIRD FOR LOCAL PUNT, PASS, & KICK CONTEST

Registration for the local Punt, Pass and Kick Competition will be taken through next Friday, October 3 at Abernathy Motor Company. The Abernathy PPGK competition is scheduled for Saturday, October 4 at 9:30 a. m. at Antelope field.

In order to register for the competition, any youngster aged eight through 13 should fill out the form provided at the Ford dealer's showroom. Registrants must be accompanied by a parent or guardian, and there is no entry fee or change of any kind. This includes all six levels of the competition, up to and including the national finals.

Trophies will be awarded for first, second and third place in the local competition in each of six age groups. Each contestant competes only against others of the same age. There is no body contact, so an entrant's size is not as important as his ability to punt, pass and place-

kick for distance with accuracy. Winners can continue on up through the zone, district, area and division contests to the national finals, scheduled for January 18, 1976 at the Super Bowl in Miami.

### FOUR ATTEND DALLAS SCHOOL

Four from Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy last week attended a school conducted in Dallas by the John Deere Co. to acquaint dealers and employees with

the new parts ordering system, Dealer Parts Automatic Replenishment Transmission System (DPARTS) being put into operation in the USA and Canada. Attending from the local John Deere dealership were Harold Thompson, manager; Darvin Allen, manager of the parts department; Gary Phillips of the parts department and Mrs. Buford Davenport, bookkeeper. Also in Dallas with the group was Buford Davenport.

The DPARTS program is orientated to customer service by keeping dealer stocked with John Deere parts most called for and for parts occasionally called for. Part orders will be put into a TWX machine during the business day at the local John Deere firm. Sometime during the night John Deere headquarters in Moline, Illinois, will dial a connection with the machine in Abernathy. The machine will convey the parts order to Moline, where it will be computerized then transmitted to the John Deere part depot in Dallas the same night. Parts ordered will be shipped out of Dallas weekly or on a date indicated by the order.

The TWX machine is due to be installed at Thompson Implement early in October, and the DPARTS system is scheduled to go into operation at the John Deere dealership here before the end of the current year.

Roddy Shipman romped 55 yards around the left end for the touchdown. Extra point failed; the score was 27-7 in favor of Abernathy.

The Antelope defense having a great night continued to play havoc with the Owls offensive attack. Armando Ruiz knocked the ball loose from the Owls receiver and Stan-

ley Horsford came up with the football with 1:29 left in 3rd quarter.

Mixing the offense with a variety of plays, the Lopes moved the football into scoring position with 8:04 left in the contest fullback Pete Stracener scored from the 1 yard line. Extra point was good and the Lopes led 34-13.

## E. M. T. PERSONNEL TO TAKE DEFENSIVE DRIVING COURSE TO QUALIFY FOR AMBULANCE OPERATION

Abernathy volunteers engaged in Emergency Medical Training will take a defensive driving course next month, sponsored by Pope Insurance and Gulf Insurance Company as part of the National Safety Council's Driver Safety program.

The course will qualify EMT trainees for ambulance operation, and classes in the course will be held Tuesday, October 7 from 6:30 to 10:00 p. m., and Saturday, October 11 from 8:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon.

The defensive driving course is open to anyone interested, and will qualify drivers for discounts on insurance premiums, in addition to providing qualification for EMT trainees as ambulance drivers.

Fee for the course is \$7.00 per person, and anyone interested in taking the course

should contact Milt Pope at 298-4127 as soon as possible, as classes will be limited due to limitations in facilities. Classes in the course will meet at City Hall.

## Course Qualifies Drivers For Insurance Discounts

AUSTIN, Tex. --State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie Tuesday said 35,000 Texas drivers could forfeit automobile insurance discounts this fall.

Christie said drivers who completed the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course in the Fall of 1972 will lose their eligibility to a 10 percent discount on insurance premiums unless they re-take the course.

He said the discount program, established by the State Board of Insurance, is valid for a three-year period, but former DDC graduates can renew their eligibility for another 36 months by completing the 8-hour program.

"Over 400,000 Texas motorists have completed the course in the past three years and statistics show that DDC graduates have 32 percent fewer accidents. Fewer accidents mean lower rates," Christie said.

The Texas Safety Association, which administers the DDC program in Texas, reports that the DDC program has been revised, Christie said.

The new program contains many new films and visual aids, as well as new information on traffic laws, driving habits, road design and engineering innovations.

The State Board of Insurance has also extended the 10 percent premium discount to motorcycle operators who complete the DDC Motorcycle Supplement.

Under the Board's rules, cyclists who finish the regular 8-hour course and the 2-hour motorcycle supplement are eligible for a discount on both automobile and motorcycle insurance premiums.

The Hale County Extension Service in cooperation with the Hale County Health Department is sponsoring a Health Fair on Saturday, Oct. 4, 1975. The Health Fair is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m. at the Hale County Agriculture Center. The public is urged to attend and take advantage of all the free information and services that will be available during the stated hours.

To date approximately thirty five agencies are joining the Family Living Committee of the Extension Service and the County Health Department in staging the Health Fair.

Educational exhibits will be set up on aging, immunization, emergency medical services, veterinary public health, venereal disease, hypertension, smoking, dental, and environmental health.

A film festival will be included and will run continuously throughout the day. The Heart Association will conduct hypertension screening and the Texas State Department of Health will furnish materials to be used in tuberculosis screening. Screening will also be conducted in areas of vision, hearing,

height and weight, diabetes, and dental.

Other agencies cooperating with the Extension Service and the County Health Department are: March of Dimes, Central Plains General Hospital, Dairy Council, State Commission for the Blind, Heart Association, TOPS, Bureau of Vital Statistics, South Plains Health Provider Organization, Cancer Association, Mental Health & Mental Retardation, Arthritis Foundation, Texas State Department of Agriculture, Evening Lions Club Eye Bank Booth, Regional Occupation Center, Noon Lions Club Glaucoma information, Child Welfare, West Texas Home Health Agency, Nichols Hospital and Women's Division of Plainview Chamber of Commerce.

The Texas State Department of Health will furnish a live dog exhibit, states Mrs. Mayes, County Extension Agent. Never before have residents of Hale Co. and surrounding counties had an opportunity to take advantage of health screening and information as will be provided on Oct. 4, states Mrs. Mayes. We urge each person to be in attendance to gain first hand knowledge from all the participating agencies.

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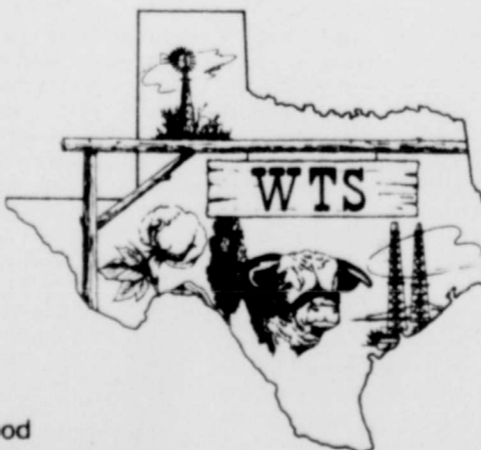
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**Law Program Aims To Reduce Theft**

The Plainview Police and the Hale County Sheriff's Department have announced a new program which is aimed at curtailing household burglaries. The program, Operation Identification, will begin about Oct. 1.

The law enforcement agencies will check out handheld engraving machines to individuals so that any household property of value can be marked with the serial numbers of the equipment and the owner's driver's license number, according to Detective Sergeant Gene Bass of the police department.

Along with engravers, individuals checking out an engraver will receive a form to be filled out with the same information engraved on the equipment as well as the location of the equipment. After the forms are filled out and returned to the law enforcement agency with the engraver, a permanent record of the information will be made on micro-film at the Plainview Police Department, said Bass.

Property Registration Detective Captain Gary Johnson of the sheriff's department said that his office will work primarily with the registration of property located in the county. Johnson said that anything that is "stealable" should be marked. In addition to the Operation Identification, officers from the two departments will hold another Citizens Band Round-up in an attempt to get as many CB radios marked as possible. Bass said that he was "semi-disappointed" at the turn out last Tuesday night.

Of about 2,000 CB radios in Plainview alone, only about 200 were marked for identification, said Bass. He felt that since the south doors of the Agriculture Center were used, many people traveling on U. S. 87 By-Pass may not have seen the operation. The second round-up will be held at the Agriculture Center next Tuesday from 3 p. m. to 11 p. m.

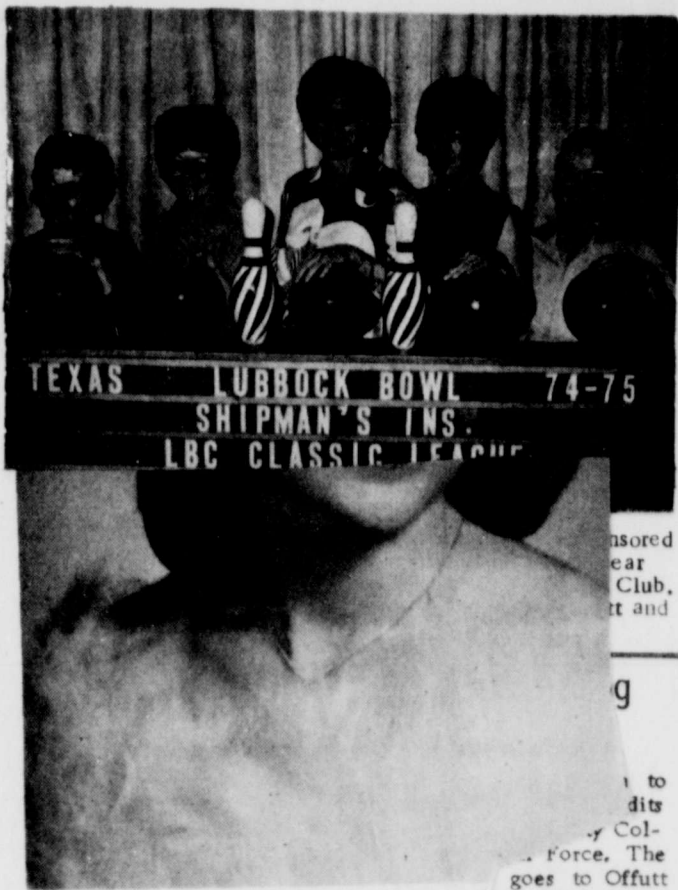

### TEXAS TALK

By Harold Thompson

Getting it together may be the secret for grain sorghum planting in the next few years. Results from agricultural experiment stations indicate work will probably be intensified toward a grain sorghum which will grow well in rows as narrow as ten inches. Soil fertility scientist Dr. Lawrence Morrill at the Oklahoma Experiment Station says major yield increases are possible with a hybrid developed for the narrow row. It would be a combination of a high plant population. In experiments with current varieties of sorghum, the extremely narrow (10 inch) rows showed consistently better yield with 40,000 plants per acre than with 80-thousand. The highest yields recorded in the test plots with non-irrigated sorghum involved planting 30-inch rows with 80,000 plants per acre and 120 pounds of applied nitrogen. Tests on irrigated sorghums are underway.
