The Hale County Historical Society is active in preserving the heritage of our area. Markers are being placed at points of importance to this heritage.

These activities along with other historical preservation efforts have made the Hale County group one of the most successful in the state. The society received its impetus to organize from a law passed by the legislature promoting such county-size aggregations.

endeavor. The City and the Santa Fe came to terms, and the first train reached here on Dec. 31, 1906. Regular service soon followed, and oldtimers rejoiced when train whistles heralded an end to isolation.

Once or twice a week, land agents arrived with trainloads of prospective settlers. Local builders constructed a courthouse, new schoolhouse, new city hall, an electric plant, an opera house, residences and business buildings. Soon the Wayland Literary and Technical Institution was under construction.





Even though independence had not yet been agreed to, Congress clearly saw the need for better military defense and the time when separation might actually occur. In the meantime residents in Spanish Texas were living at a more subsistence level. The Spanish settler, sometimes aided by Indian craftsmen, made or processed most of the necessities of life. When one realizes that cattle and sheep were basic to this existence the danger of Indian raids that endangered their herds and flocks can be more readily appreciated. The meat, hides, and wool

were utilized to the fullest by the Spaniard. Wool was a necessity for the cloth to make clothes while cowhides provided the leather needed for boots, harnesses, and other essential items. Obviously, the meat of cattle and sheep provided a basic part of the diet. In addition, the fat of the animals was used for shortening and candles.


