



Expansion plans call for the addition of a 25,000 square foot profeslargest of the redevelopment facilities in Lubbock's downtown Civic Center, almost doubles the size of the former hospital.

All brick, with extensive landscaping, the new hospital is owned and will be operated by American Medical International, Inc., pioneers in the field of proprietary hospital management. It has beenbuilt and will be maintained without the use of federal funding.




