New Deal Man Included In NATO Program

Airman First Class Noe Guerra, son of Mr. and Mrs. Regino Guerra of New Deal, Tex., recently took part in "Crested Cap 75," a North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) training exercise in Germany.

Airman Guerra is an aircraft maintenance specialist at Holloman AFB, N.M., with the dual based 49th Tactical Fighter Wing whose units deployed to the European continent for the month-long maneuvers.

Flying non-stop from Holloman, 96 NATO-committed F-4 Phantom fighter-bombers were refueled en route by Strategic Air Command KC-135 Stratotankers. Airlift of maintenance and support specialists was provided by Military Airlift Command C-130 Hercules and C-141 Starlifter aircraft.

The exercise was designed to maintain aircrew proficiency in instrument flying and radar bombing in support of allied forces in Europe.

ANTELOPES FALL TO TULIA HORNETS 34 - 6 IN 1975 FOOTBALL SEASON FINALE

 The Tulia Hornets stung the Abernathy Antelopes Friday night for 34 points, to end the 1975 season on a dismal note.

A small but enthusiastic crowd saw the Antelopes fight the Hornets tooth and nail during the first half. The Hornets managed only one score, coming with 1:59 remaining in the first quarter.

Ralph Esquibel recovered a fumble on the 37 yard line in the second quarter to stop

another Tulia TD. The offense was unable to capitalize on the opportunity and Tulia again found themselves knocking on the Lopes door. The defense came to the front again and held. The Hornets on downs inside the 15 yard line, stopping another Hornet drive. The half ended with the Lopes still in the game 7-0.

Tulia took control of the game early in the 3rd quarter putting 2 quick touchdowns on the score board. One on a 30 yard run with 8:41 left on the clock, and the other on a 75 yard run with 7:29 remaining in the third stanza.

The Antelopes came alive mid-way through the third quarter, as Wayne Riley hit Robby Shipman with a 30 yard TD pass. Robby made a leaping catch in the endzone for the score. The third quarter ended 21-6 in favor of Tulia.

Turnovers plagued the Lopes offensive units throughout the last half. The Lopes lost the ball four times (2 fumbles, 2 pass interceptions) giving the Hornets excellent field position each time.

Stanley Hornford picked off a Tulia pass late in the third quarter on the 15 yard line stopping another Hornet touchdown. The offense lost the ball on a fumble and with 11:18 remaining in the final quarter, Tulia scored on the turnover. The score read 28-6.

The offense desperate for points once again gave up the football on an interception.

Tulia drove the ball to the 7 yard line, but an inspired

defense stopped them on downs with 6:24 left to play. The Hornets managed to get on the score board again despite the fine defensive effort of the Lopes. The score came with 2:14 left in the contest, and the game ended 34-6.

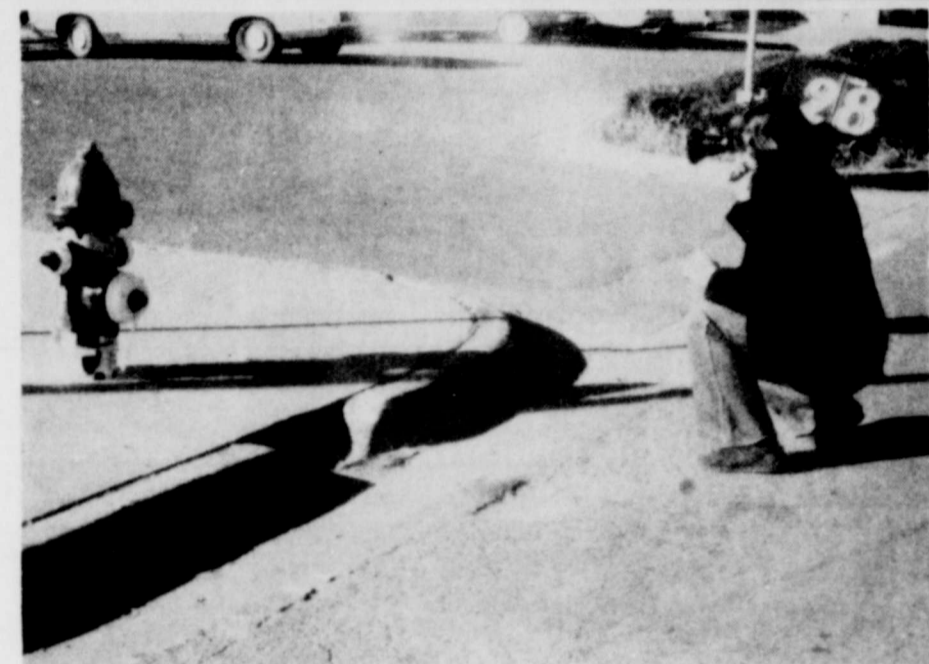
Burial was in West Lawn Memorial Park under direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

NEW WEST TEXAS HOSPITAL FACILITY TO OPEN SUNDAY

Sunday, the South Plains will witness the opening of a new form for West Texas Hospital at the corner of 9th Street and Avenue M in Lubbock. West Texas Hospital, which opened in 1922, will now be serving Lubbock and the surrounding area in an \$8.5 million four-story investor-owned medical facility which will provide the area with 165 beds. Expansion plans call for the addition of a 25,000 square foot professional building. The hospital,

largest of the redevelopment facilities in Lubbock's downtown Civic Center, almost doubles the size of the former hospital.

All brick, with extensive landscaping, the new hospital is owned and will be operated by American Medical International, Inc., pioneers in the field of proprietary hospital management. It has been built and will be maintained without the use of federal funding.

Designed and built by Keeper Company of Houston, the project extends recovery, intensive and coronary care. Uniquely sophisticated equipment has been incorporated into ancillary support areas, radiology, laboratory, special surgical procedures, pharmacy and therapy.

Citizens from Lubbock and throughout West Texas are expected to attend the grand opening of the hospital Sunday at 2:00 P. M. It's estimated that 25 percent of patients served by the new medical facility will live outside the City of Lubbock.

HOMEMAKING ADVISORY COUNCIL HEARS REPORT ON SCHOOL HOMEMAKING PROGRAM

The Advisory Council for Vocational Homemaking met November 10 in the Antelope Inn. After a buffet dinner the group was welcomed by Jan Montgomery. Mrs. Marilyn Stone presented the council with an overview of the total Vocational Homemaking (Useful) program in Abenathy High School. There are 158 students enrolled in several of the classes offered. These classes include Homemaking I, II, and III, Family Living, Child Development, Summer Phase, and adult education.

In discussing the sequence courses, Homemaking I, II, and III, Mrs. Stone explained that students must have learning experiences in six major subject areas. Clothing & Textiles and Housing; Food and Nutrition and Home Management and Consumer Education; and Child Development and Family Living.

Throughout the state of Texas the six subject areas are taught in the same groups of two. This is done so that if students move to other towns they will not have to repeat something they have already studied.

The new developments in Homemaking across the country were also discussed by Mrs. Stone. There are increasing numbers of young men in homemaking classes. This development is considered to be most important because men are part of a home, they are involved in relationships with family and they become parents. They should have the opportunity to learn about these things. All homemaking classes are open to young men. They may enroll in the sequence courses or the quarter courses such as Family Living and Child Development. Young men in high school may enroll for only one quarter of the sequence courses if they wish. This is what Mrs. Stone and Mrs. McAlexander are promoting.

At the present about half of the 57 students in Family Living are young men.

Christy Waters, president of the Abenathy Chapter of the Future Homemakers of America presented the slate of events, programs and services of this year. The local chapter is composed of 106 members. Social highlights of the year will be the "Best Beau Banquet" in February and hayrides in October and December. The money making project for the year will be a Bake Sale on November 22.

Service projects include the March of Dimes drive and the "Secret Grandparent" project. Programs include studies of Nutrition, Christmas Projects, Careers, and Understanding Your Ethnic Heritage.

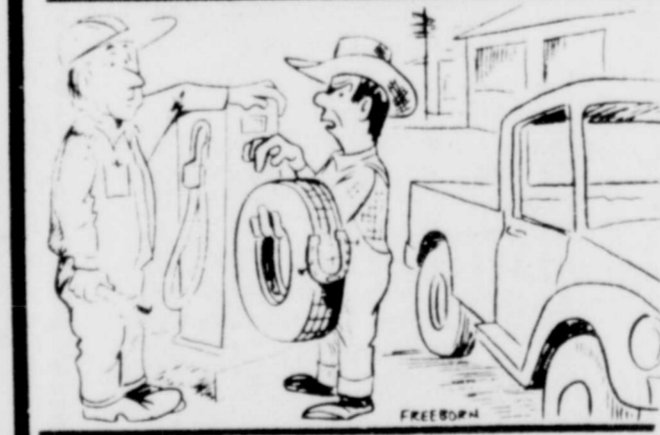
