Williams Chairman

AMENDMENT NO. 1
The proposed amendment to Articles III, Section 24, increases the annual salary of members of the Texas Legislature from \$4,800 to \$8,100. No changes are made in the mileage or per diem allowances.

ARGUMENTS FOR—The legislator can no longer be considered a part-time official. Increasing complexity in the problems of state government and greater expenditure of time as a member of standing and special interim committees meeting between sessions leaves the legislator little time to devote to his private business or profession. The \$4,800 annual salary now provided in the constitution is scarcely adequate to meet present-day costs of living.

Many qualified persons do not become candidates for legislative seats because they are unable or unwilling to make the financial sacrifice involved in service at the present constitutional salary.

(Cont. from page 1, Sec. 1) increase for members of the legislature would further increase the costs of state government at a time when state finances are already overburdened in meeting the expanding needs of a growing population.

Under the constitution the legislature is required to meet in regular session not to exceed 140 days every two years. Thus the job of a legislator is not a full-time job and the official holding a seat in the house of representatives or in the senate should not receive a full-time salary.

AMENDMENT NO. 2
The proposed amendment to Article IX, Section 6, abolishes the Lamar County Hospital District and authorizes the commissioner court of Lamar County to provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District. Arguments for and against this proposed amendment have been omitted because of the purely local character of the amendment. This proposal was

40 YEARS AGO August 11, 1932

It is now possible for the property owners of Haskell to pay their delinquent taxes on the installment plan, without interest or penalty, and at the same time, if enough of the city taxes now delinquent can be collected on this plan, the city officials believe that it will be possible to omit the levy for next year.

Tag Trotlines Every 90 Days

Trotline fishermen had better start carrying three-month calendars around in their pockets. An angler who checks his lines after they have been set for 90 days and finds them missing shouldn't accuse his fishing buddy of pilfering.

As of July 22, Parks and Wildlife game management officers have the authority to remove all freshwater trotlines which have been in place for over 90 days and those which are undated.

Trotliners are required by law to tag their lines with name and address of the owner and the date the line was set and to redate them after 90 days.

The tags must be of a material at least as durable as the trotline itself.

Bentzen Sponsors Revenue Sharing Amendment
 Senator Lloyd Bentzen has urged the Senate Finance Committee to approve an amendment to the Revenue Sharing Bill that would remove the so-called state income tax inducement from the measure.
 Senator Bentzen is a co-sponsor of the amendment.
 "The state income tax inducement — which might more accurately be termed a 'coercion' — discriminates against Texas because it has no state income tax," Bentzen said in testimony submitted to the Committee.
 Bentzen pointed out that Texas ranks 50th in revenue to be shared with state government on a per capita basis, in the existing Revenue Sharing measure. "Yet, he pointed, "we rank 27 in total Federal tax contribution."
 The Senator also noted to members of the committee that the state income tax formula is harmful for other reasons, too.
 "The Congress should not use Revenue Sharing as a club to force states to adopt any particular means of taxation. By passing this bill as it stands, Congress would be making the judgement that the individual income tax is the best means of raising state revenues."
 "Revenue Sharing would provide needed funds to State and local governments in Texas," Bentzen said, "but, as it stands, it does not offer equitable treatment to Texas or to other states that have been able to avoid imposing a state income tax."

ROSSON TO STUDY PETROLEUM
 Texas House Speaker Raymond Price today named the House Interim Committee to study "Hold Harmless" Agreements in the Petroleum Industry.
 The committee will be chaired by Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood. Serving with Rep. Nabers will be Representatives Renal B. Rosson of Snyder; Joe Wyatt of Victoria; Bryan Poff Jr. of Amarillo; and Chas. Finnell of Holliday.
 Serving with this committee is a distinguished group with specialized knowledge in the field of oil well drilling and oil well servicing who will be serving as an advisory committee to the interim study committee. Repi Nabers has announced the following members of the advisory committee: Mr. Bill McIntyre of Dallas, President of RIMCO; Mr. D. L. McDonald of Abilene, President of McDonald Well Servicing; Mr. Bill Perryman of Athens; Mr. Joseph Shelton of Dallas, General Counsel for the International Association of Drilling Contractors; and Mr. Jack Hellinghausen of Dallas with Atlantic Richfield.
 The committee will make its findings and recommendations to the 63rd Legislature when it convenes in January, 1973.

STATE CAN'T PAY FOR PRIMARIES
 The few remaining dollars earmarked to pay for the 1972 primary elections were sent to county officials August 4, but not all of the primaries' expenses have been paid.
 That's the message today from Secretary of State Bob Bullock, the state's chief election official.
 "By August 5th we will have officially disbursed all the money that was originally appropriated to pay for the 1972 primary elections," said Bullock.
 "But, we have flat run out of money before all the costs have been paid," he added.
 "This has put many local county chairmen between a rock and a hard place. A lot of election workers, not to mention printers and other suppliers, have yet to be paid for their work."
 Bullock said about \$325,000 is needed to cover the remaining costs statewide.
 "We believe the only fair way to disburse the remaining monies is on a pro-rata basis. This means that each county chairman who still has an outstanding expense for the primaries will receive a disbursement which amounts to 26.66 per cent of their remaining bills." this time.

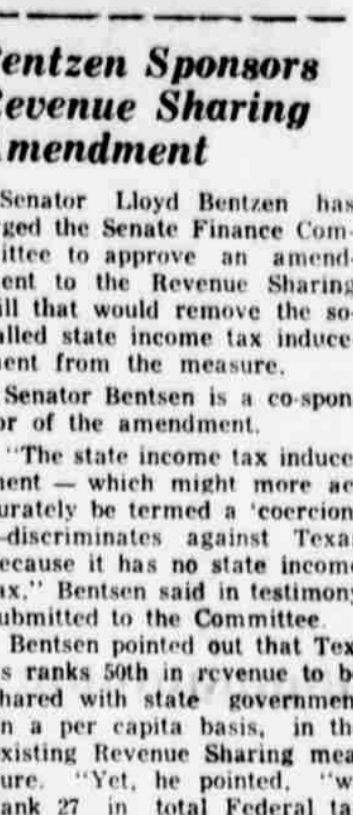

Calf Crop Highest Since 1924 Nationwide, the 1972 calf crop is expected to total 48,445,000. This is 3% more than 46,974,000 head produced in 1971. The 5,444,000 calves expected in Texas this year is more than twice the number expected in second ranking Missouri. Oklahoma is the third leading state in calf production. Sheep and lambs on feed in Texas as of July 1 is down 18% from a year ago. Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concen-

Wool Crop Highest Since 1924 The Texas wool crop this year is expected to be the highest since 1924. The Texas sheep and livestock service reports a wool crop of 5,444,000 pounds is expected this year. This compares with 5,286,000 pounds last year.

trates or on succulent pastures and expected within the next three months to produce a carcass that will grade good or better.

Screwworms continue to infest Texas livestock as well as wildlife and domesticated animals such as dogs. Little or no relief is expected from the screwworm infestations until cold weather sets in this fall and winter.

Livestock owners are urged to continue to check their livestock regularly and to treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control.

Less pollution from wind erosion has been noted this year compared to last year. Wind erosion in the Great Plains moved downward from damage totals a year ago.

Texas, with 1,145,150 acres, or about one-half of the total nationwide, reported the most wind erosion damage this season. Nationwide, land in condition to blow is reported at 3,269,069 acres this year compared to 6,693,695 acres for 1971.

Crops are continuing to make generally good progress throughout the state. Cotton is reported to be making excellent progress on the High Plains and Low Plains due to recent rains. The crop is doing nicely in the Blacklands and East

Texas except for insect problems. Harvest in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been delayed by rains.

Corn is making good growth in most areas of the state. Grain sorghum harvest is more than 20% complete. Yields have ranged from good to excellent in Blacklands and parts of south and south central Texas.

Soybeans and peanuts are making good to excellent progress. Rice harvest is making fair progress but rain has delayed harvest operations. Harvest for the state is nearing the 20% completion mark.

As for commercial fruit, peach harvest continues in most areas with Elberta varieties now in production. This year's pecan crop shows good potential with most trees having moderate heavy nut set.

Vaccinate now for control of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis (VEE) authorities recommend.

VEE is now about 699 miles from the Texas border. Several hundred head of horses have died from VEE in Mexico. VEE appears to be moving northward in a pattern similar to last year when the disease invaded Texas.

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\$1,739.75 Received In Fees In July

Lee McKelvain, County Clerk of Haskell County, received \$1,739.75 in fees during the month of July, according to a monthly report filed August 2. The Bill passed by the senate and which will soon be before the House of Representatives is more than just "child care." As described by the advocates it is "an activist's program intent upon perfecting the child's early environment." Dr. Reginald Lourie, President of the Commission on the Mental Health of Children, in testifying before the Senate Committee said "there is serious thinking among child researchers that we cannot trust the family alone to prepare young people for this new kind of world—not only are parents unnecessary, but they are too inept to rear their own children."

Well how do you do, Dr. Lourie!! — The "new kind of world" Dr. Lourie refers to must be that novelized by Huxley who foresaw test-tube children and regimented adults whose pleasure was dispensed in governmentally prescribed doses.

The assumption of those who promote and support these ideas seem to be that an institution, run by an impersonal-

ed staff, can substitute for parental love and care.

As Dr. Ernest Van Den Haag, New York University psychologist testified, "the assumption that social science has as yet produced a tested theory of child rearing is sheer fantasy. Only a few variables have been detected and they suggest that family care should be encouraged, not replaced."

No one argues that there is not a need for remedial services for disadvantaged and neglected children. There are programs already in effect for that purpose. The "Child Development Bill" as passed by the U. S. Senate and now to be considered is much, much more. The whole concept appears to be that the Government and its agents know how to provide "healthful and stimulating development" of children. Dr. Van Den Haag further testified: "If the Government has such knowledge it is a well kept secret of which the scientific community is quite unaware."

Mr. George Gilder in a recently published article had this to say: "When these havens (family and homes) are eliminated, where does one go to find love and individual affirmation—to be accepted for who one is, rather than for what one does or how much money one makes? Where can one find

Brush Control Planning

Aerial application of herbicides for the control of brush and weeds on extensive areas of rangeland is widely used by ranchmen. Major objectives of the research conducted in 1972 on over 15,000 acres of brush and weed infested rangeland centered around how to improve the effectiveness of herbicides, reduce the hazards of drift and lower the cost of overall treatment. These tests were conducted at 14 locations by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock and the Department of Range Science of Texas A&M University in cooperation with ranchmen, the University of Texas, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, chemical and petroleum companies and aerial applicators.

Information that will be obtained under a wide range of conditions includes the influence of different rates, volumes and carriers on the effectiveness of the treatments and the amount of herbicide deposited in the sprayed area. Other information that will be obtained includes the effect of moisture conditions, soil temperature, plant condition, soil type and the reaction of different species and growth forms of brush to herbicide applications.

The goal of the brush control team which includes C. E. Fisher, Cecil Meadors, John Brock, John P. Walter, Harold Wiedemann and Bobby Cross of the field unit at Lubbock and G. O. Hoffman and C. J. Scifres of the Department of Range Science at College Station is to determine the most effective, safest and most economical methods of controlling brush and weeds on rangeland. These studies have been made possible in part by grant-in-aid funds from the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association of Texas.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.P.)
General Election November 7, 1952

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows:
"Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically in conflict with the amendment shall be null and void upon its adoption."

In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether their district officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973."

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The fee for publication shall be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals. A brief explanatory statement of the nature of a proposed amendment, together with the date of the election and the wording of the proposition as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete copy of the proposed amendment or amendments to each county clerk who shall post the same in a public place in the courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the newspaper's published national rate for advertising per column inch. "The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of an amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the Governor."

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

The Legislature shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 62)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 2, of the Texas Constitution, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission. (b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. (c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the side until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature. (d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conjunction with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. (e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. (f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended by a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. (g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 9 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 70)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in the Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to Directors of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to serve as a Director of a Soil and Water Conservation District. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a nonselective State officer or employee may hold other nonselective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other office or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States."

PUBLIC NOTICE
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."
