Mrs. Ralph Davis has been named again as chairman of the Cystic Fibrosis Spring Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Chuck Laurent, President of the Lone Star Chapter, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

This Spring, Mrs. Davis will again lead local volunteers to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "Childhood

emphysema". Cystic Fibrosis, an incura ble genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it. Current research funded by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research. many C/F patients are living longer and hoping for the future. This kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflications whose symptoms resemble those of C/F. 
Claimants who qualifed for Federal Supplemental Benefits on or before January 3, 1976, can continue to draw these benefits on claims dated through April 10, 1976.



In addition to their own children, the Kveton's are foster parents to Barbara Lofton, 21; and to four Vietnamese children; they are Hue, 18, (pronounced Way): Hoa, 16, (pronounced Wah), Ninh, 14; and Thanh, (rhymes with Tom).

Barbara has been with the Kveton's since her seventh grade year in school. The Hochildren came to the United States through the International Rescue Committee in May. They joined the Kveton family in Decem ber of 1975.

Unable to believe that one couple could cope with such a large family, I asked

Mrs. Kveton what problems

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had been involved in the addition four children.

Smiling, she told me, "We haven't had any problems. We were already a big family, and we frequently have a lot of guests in the house, so we were all 'geared' to having a lot of people around. The biggest change we had to make was moving into the playroom for meals, since we outgrew the kitchen.

In addition to the table upon whichwater was boiling for coffee, tea and other drinks, the room contained two banquets-sired tables surrounded by chairs.




