A report from West Texas Chamber of Commerce says Texas will provide approximately \$20,458,980,000 of the \$394.2 billion dollars of the Federal spending budget for the 1977 Federal fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, 1976. Texans pay 5.19 percent of all Federal taxes, amounting to \$1,735 for every man, woman and child. Texas' \$20 billion-plus Federal tax payment is 1 1/2 larger than the total dollar amount of all oil and gas production in the state and nearly 3 1/2 times larger than the total income from all farms and ranches in Texas for the year.

General Telephone Company of the Southwest is in negotiations with a number of towns in this part of the state asking for higher telephone rates. It is realistic to assume that, eventually, they'll get around to Abernathy. It talks with the company. Abernathy City Council should seek a change to the modern method of making long distance calls. There is a phone system that you do not have to go through an operator, verbally giving the number from which you are calling. The telephone number from which you are calling is electronically, or mechanically, recorded along with the amount of time of the long distance call. I'd suggest that everyone in Abernathy keep a record of their long distance calls. On the bill received last week, a 44-minute, \$3.12 telephone call was placed from Abernathy to a telephone number in East Lubbock and charged to my Abernathy telephone number. In September, a call was made to Dallas and charged to my number on the 17th, on a day our house was locked and Mrs. BFD and I were in Dallas. The hotel record showed that we were in Dallas from the 16th to the 19th of Sept. The General Telephone people willingly take such calls off your bill. The time and effort they take in investigating to see who made the call probably costs more than would the automatic timing and billing system that records the telephone number from which the call was made.

When Washington dipped into the highway gasoline tax trust fund to buy city buses for metropolitan areas, it killed any chances of federal funds either directly or indirectly for farm-to-market highways. So, if you are living in the country on a dirt road you just as well accept that as a permanent situation. That ruling also threw the Texas Highway Commission in a bind for funds to build more highways in the state. Projects like I-27 construction already approved may go forward... but slowly. When I-27 is completed from North Lubbock to New Deal, the segment from New Deal to Abernathy is supposed to be built, followed by the Abernathy-Hale Center segment. We'll be lucky if this happens.

The Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is feeling the effects of the ruling. Some department workers are being laid off. Last summer when you fussed about the right-of-way and between-lanes area growing up in weeds that was a necessary policy due to lack of money, saving some \$7,000,000 by mowing only twice, early in the season and late in the season.

What is the value of a child's soul? The same as that of an adult. The Lord says "The weight of the world." Children are our sacred trust and we will be held accountable for the way that they are taught or not taught. "Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones."

When a contractor builds a house he does not start with the roof but the foundation. Our children is America's foundation so let's start with them. That is the only way that we can still the enemy.

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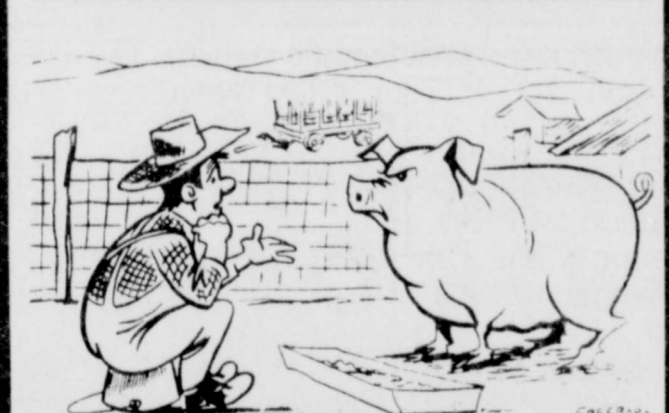


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NEWS AND NOTES FROM ABERNATHY HIGH SCHOOL

The Abernathy High School Academic Center is one of three high schools that have been selected as demonstration schools in individualized study courses. The other schools are L.B. Johnson High School in Austin and Skyline High School in Dallas. In Region XVII, the Lubbock Adult Learning Center was also selected.
In December, a nominating committee made up of representatives from colleges, universities, the Texas Education Agency, and area public schools visited the Academic Center. Out of the 1200 schools districts in Texas, forty-nine schools were nominated.
AHS is the only school west of Dallas that has an individual study program for grades 9-12 in all subjects. According to Dr. Delwin Webb this means more recognition and also many more visitors for the local school.
During March a booklet will be sent to all schools in Texas listing the forty-nine

schools that were nominated and it will give a brief resume of their outstanding programs for which they were nominated.
Schools that were selected will be recognized later in the year at a meeting.

east building formerly housed a barber shop and Abernathy Insurance Agency. The agency moved first door west of Abernathy Floral.

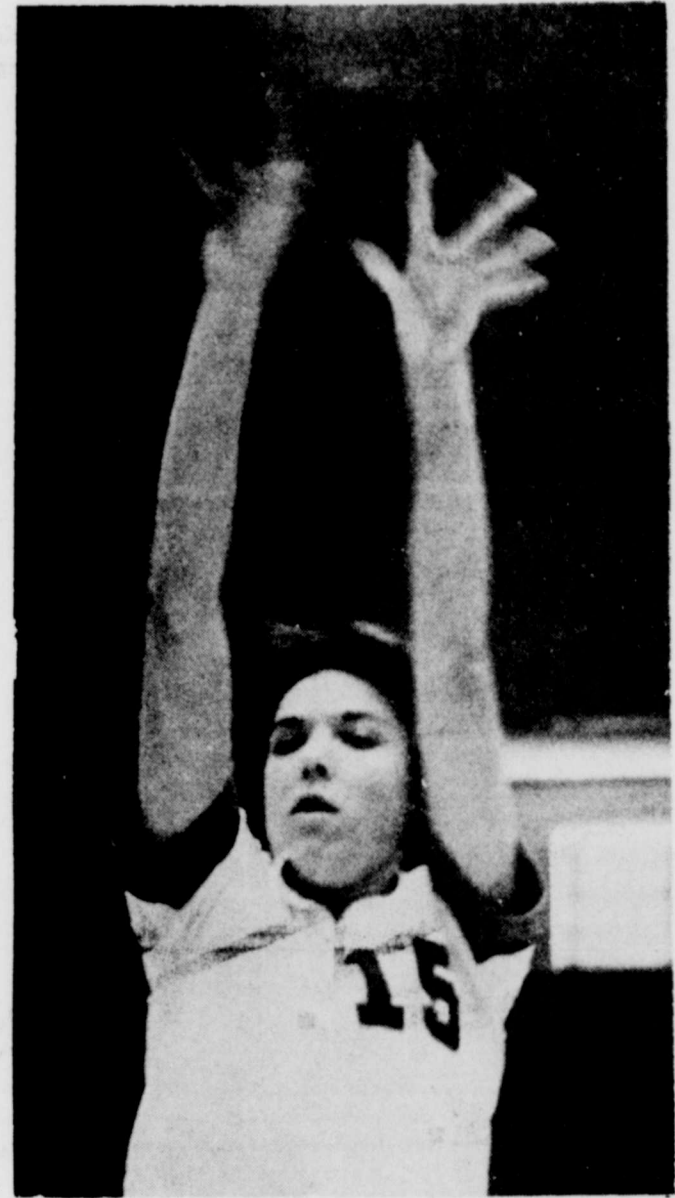

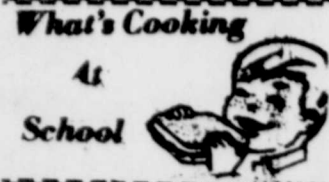

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Ambulance Service; Annual Banquet Are Topics On Chamber Agenda

 Topics ranging from the city's Emergency Medical Service to the annual chamber banquet were among those discussed on the agenda at last Thursday's Abernathy Chamber of Commerce Meeting.

City manager Larry Fields, in reporting on the progress of the Abernathy Volunteer Emergency Medical Service, told the chamber that six additional volunteers from the city began Emergency Medical Technician training last week in Lubbock. Upon completion of their training, he said, these six will join the twelve local volunteers already manning the city's ambulance team. He continued to report that the service had made about 14 runs since its inception in the city, and explained that with the use of pocket paging devices recently purchased by the city of Abernathy, on-call members of the team can now be reached from the

dispatcher's office in a matter of seconds. With the pagers, members of both the on-call and back-up teams are alerted through the use of a beeping tone, and receive information as to the location and nature of the emergency.

On a different topic, Fields continued to report that during the 1975 fiscal year the City of Abernathy had issued a total of 25 building permits in the local area. Thirteen of these represented remodeling of already existing structures for a total of \$99,490; two represented homes which were moved into the city, for a total of \$19,000; and ten were for the construction of new homes at a total of \$446,250. According to Fields these figures showed a trend toward growth in the city, since, with the construction of new homes, the replaced dwellings would be put on the market. He added that additional growth would be likely in the coming fiscal year.

In other business, Chamber president Dan Ward reported that Messrs. and Mmes. Leland Phillips, Paul Herchman, Hoppy Toler, Laurin Prather and Dr. Delwin Webb had been named to the program committee for the scheduled March 4 Chamber of Commerce banquet; and would be in charge of arrangements and decorations for the annual event. W. C. Newberry is the slated speaker for the banquet.

Those present at the meeting voted to contribute \$50 each to the local Boy and Girl Scout organizations at "the appropriate time."

At the close of the meeting, members of the Abernathy City Council, Bicentennial Committee and officers and directors of the Chamber posed for photographs to be shown in February or March as part of a Bicentennial feature presented by Lubbock's KMCC-TV, channel 28. The station, represented at the meeting by David Johnson and Travetta Holley, will present a

series of 30-second station-break messages in recognition of Bicentennial communities in the Lubbock area.

Guests at the meeting included Jerry Gutheitz, of Hale County Savings and Loan association in Plainview, Mmes. Dan Fondy and Cal Tucker, representing the local Bicentennial committee, Clayton Enger, Les McDowell, Jack Hicks, HB Coggin, David Johnson and Travetta Holley.

New Chamber of Commerce members introduced by Mrs. Jack Lane were Pat Leach, of Abernathy's Minit Mart convenience store; J. P. Barton; Jim Mills, of West Texas Pipe and Supply; and J. W. Parker of Kerr-Ince station number 14.

Chamber president Dan Ward also expressed his appreciation to Mr. Gutheitz and to Mrs. Lane, manager of the local offices of Hale County Savings and Loan Association, for the firm's offer to help with the Chamber's secretarial work.

VICTOR TREVINO RETURNS TO GALVESTON HOSPITAL FOR FURTHER TREATMENT

Victor Trevino, the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Trevino who was stricken last year with leukemia, has returned to a Galveston hospital for treatment in his continuing battle against the disease.

After returning home to Abernathy at about the first of December, the youth spent almost one month at home before tests showed a recurrence of the disease, and necessitated his return to the hospital, where it is reported that he must remain for an additional four to six weeks.

According to Victor's brother, Usbaldo Trevino, the recurrence of the disease showed up during Victor's monthly check-up, when, in a series of tests, the results of all but one were good. According to his brother, Victor is not in as much pain as when he first began his fight with the disease, and he is considered in better condition than he was during his first visit to the Galveston hospital.

According to Hoppy Toler, spokesman for the Abernathy Baseball Association, which headed the fund raising drive in late August and early September to benefit the youth, almost \$1,500 of the "Victor Trevino Fund" remains. The sum is the remainder of a total \$3,200 which was collected through local donations and tickets at a benefit flag football game stages by local men to benefit the youth.

The fund drive, which climaxed with the flag football game held September 8, 1975, was termed an "over-

whelming success" at the time, and mirrored the concern of Abernathy residents for the youth, one of several children in the Trevino family. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Trevino, have been long-time residents of the Abernathy area.

A lifelong resident of Abernathy, Victor was classified as a seventh grade student in Abernathy Junior High at the time his illness was discovered. He participated last season in the Abernathy Baseball Association's program for boys. A slight injury received while playing baseball revealed the

presence of the blood disease when it failed to heal properly. It was reported at that time that doctors felt the disease had been discovered at an early enough stage to make treatment possible, and according to Toler, the remaining \$1,500 of the Trevino fund will be used as necessary to meet hospital expenses in the youth's continued battle against the disease.

Underground Water Conservation District To Begin Annual Water Depth Measurement

Personnel of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 will begin the annual measurement of the depths to water in the more than 800 observation wells in the 15 counties comprising the District on January 5, 1976.

Purple and white identification tags will be placed on the well-head equipment of all observation wells measured in 1976. The water-level records obtained via the observation well program constitute the foundation for District's cost-in-water depletion, income-tax-allowance program.

The coordinated and systematic measurement of the depths to water in the observation wells located in Hale County constitutes the only method of determining changes in the volume of water

stored in the Ogallala aquifer beneath the land surface.

An observation well is a well that has been selected for inclusion in the annual water-level measuring program. All wells are privately owned--the District does not own any wells--and are measured with the permission of the well owners.

District personnel will measure wells in Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and Randall Counties.

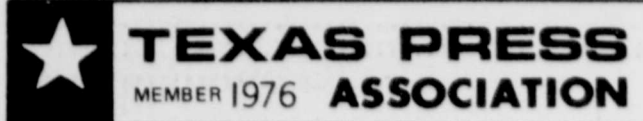
Every person of voting age should qualify to vote EVERY YEAR, and especially in this year of 1976, a presidential election year.

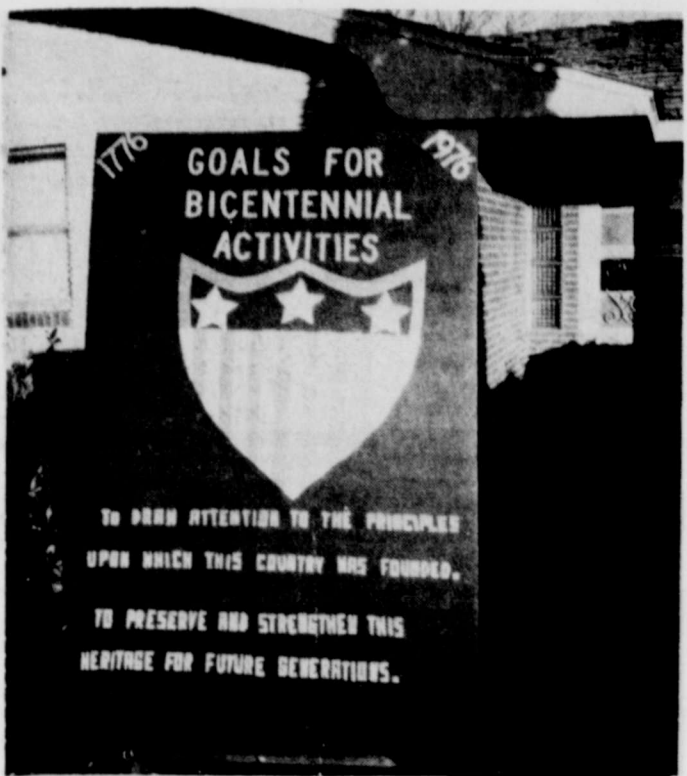

Environmentalists are giving England and France a bad time over their request to land their supersonic Concorde passenger plane at New York's JFK airport and Washington's Dulles. Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe has invited England and France to consider service to Dallas/Fort Worth Airport with its 1400-mile-an-hour Concorde. With some 17,000 acres in the D/FW airport complex, there are a few miles of noise buffer zones on all sides of the terminal and runways. The Concorde would use its 1400-mile-an-hour cruise potential over the ocean only. Flying over land, it would throttle back to subsonic speeds to reduce noise of the powerful jet engines. Flying from US East Coast airports, the Concorde can cross the Atlantic to Europe in 3 1/2 hours... in half the time now required by conventional jet passenger planes.

FSB To Assist Unemployment Claimants

Federal Supplemental Benefits (FSB), created by Congress to assist unemployment benefit claimants who have exhausted their regular benefits, came to an end in Texas January 3, 1976.

"This is not to be confused with the Texas Employment Commission's regular unemployment benefits program, which remains unchanged," says Henry Rothell, Administrator of the Commission.

Under Federal statute, the FSB program became inoperative after January 3, 1976 in any state whose rate of insured unemployment is less than 5 per cent. The insured unemployment rate in Texas for November was 1.7 per cent.

Those claimants who qualified for Federal Supplemental Benefits on or before January 3, 1976, can continue to draw these benefits on claims dated through April 10, 1976.

Those claimants who qualified for Federal Supplemental Benefits on or before January 3 and who have not drawn all of their benefits, will be notified in January of the April 10 deadline on claims.

No Federal Supplemental Benefits will be paid in Texas for claims dated after April 10, 1976.

"Super Mom" Is Apt Description For Local Mother Of Eleven

On visiting the home of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Kveton one might catch a glimpse of the kitchen, where, upon the refrigerator door hangs a small poster in a childish hand, colorfully proclaiming: "Super Mom Works Here!"

I pondered on this as I followed Mrs. Kveton down the hall to the playroom, where she had the makings for coffee, tea, cocoa and other hot winter beverages laid out on a long table.

Excusing herself to take a phone call in another room, she invited me to make myself comfortable, and, coffee in hand, I sat and reflected on the charming fact that children always considered their own mother to be the best Mom in the world.

However, as I began to chat with Mrs. Kveton, I realized that the term "Super Mom" was especially appropriate for her. She certainly is much more than "your everyday housewife."

had been involved in the addition four children.

Smiling, she told me, "We haven't had any problems. We were already a big family, and we frequently have a lot of guests in the house, so we were all 'geared' to having a lot of people around. The biggest change we had to make was moving into the playroom for meals, since we outgrew the kitchen."

In addition to the table upon which water was boiling for coffee, tea and other drinks, the room contained two banquet-sized tables surrounded by chairs.

"The family has been really good about making the four new kids feel welcome and at home," she continued. "They've helped out a lot."

According to Mrs. Kveton, the four newcomers brought not problems, but joy with them when they joined the family.

"There is very much satisfaction for us, in being able to keep the children together. It's fun for everyone, and they all seem to enjoy each other and help each other. Seeing them together and happy is the greatest satisfaction—and there is never a dull moment. Someone is always involved and excited about something, whether it's

sewing, (as with the two girls, Hue and Hoa), music, FFA, or basketball."

Another 'plus' according to Mrs. Kveton was the addition of two more boys, Ninh and Thanh, to the family group.

"John Jr., until now, was the only boy in the family," said his mother, "Having brothers has been good for him, in helping him to learn, and to share."

"Another happy thing that's happened," she continued, "is the reaction of John's dad. He has really taken over the role of grandfather for the children, and really cares for them." She added that her mother had a similar reaction to the four new children, pledging to be a grandmother to them as well as the other Kveton children.

Mrs. Kveton said that there would "definitely" be some changes in her own lifestyle with the addition of four more children.

"I have been involved in a lot of other activities which took me out of town frequently. I plan to cut down on some of that, which will give me more time to spend with the children."

"I really think that a lot of the work I've been doing

is worthwhile," she continued, "But in comparison to the direct satisfaction of taking care of a large family, it just doesn't measure up."

She added that her own family was instrumental in the decision to take on the added responsibility of four more children.

"When I first heard about the children, it was very sudden. There was an immediate need, so I discussed it with my husband, and he reacted very positively, but decided that we should contact our own children before making a commitment. Their reaction was immediate and also positive."

She explained that the Kveton's daughters, Kit and Ann, were both living in Lubbock at the time, but were home on weekends. All the Kveton children, according to their mother, were willing to share and give up some of their own conveniences for the newcomers.

She also commended the four Ho children for their equally positive reaction to their new home.

"After what they'd been through—having been forced to leave their home and family, and learning a new language; they were remarkable. They have adjusted and learned so easily. Their attitude and ability to adjust has been one of the main factors in making it all a success."

She added that one of her biggest rewards was in the Vietnamese children's com-

ments on their new home.

"They are so well able to adjust they say that they like it here. They've used to a large family, and when we have a large group, they've commented that it was 'more like home'. They say that they're happy here."

Another factor which Mrs. Kveton says emphasizes the Vietnamese youngsters' ability to adjust is the fact that they have made the move easily from a large, teeming Vietnamese city, Ho Chi Minh City, (or Saigon) to a rural area. They also have

had to adjust to the loss of their father, a Colonel in the South Vietnamese Army, about a year ago; and to leaving their mother, who still resides in Ho Chi Minh City with four younger children. (They are still able to correspond with her through an uncle who resides in France.)

"They're taking it all so well," said Mrs. Kveton. "They've been attending church with us," (the Kveton's attend St. Isidore's Catholic Church in Abernathy) "And they're very serious and ded-

icated about their school work. We asked them if they would prefer to attend Buddhist meetings, if we could find some people in this area who practiced that religion, but they said they were interested in Christianity and wanted to learn more about it."

The Super Mom summed it all up in her words at the beginning of our interview: "Seeing them all together and happy is the greatest satisfaction," she said, and then, later, "It is all VERY worthwhile."
