ABERNATHY EMS AMBULANCE SYSTEM TO RECEIVE \$200 MONTHLY IN COUNTY AID BEGINNING MAR. 1st

Effective March 1, the Barrett Ambulance Service of Plainview will receive an additional \$350 per month subsidy from Hale County, bringing the total to \$450.

Also, the city of Abernathy (four-fifths of which is in Hale County) will begin getting \$200 a month in county aid.

Both decisions emerged from a three-hour called meeting of the Commissioners Court Thursday afternoon, and came after months of debate on the matters with Bill Barrett and Abernathy officials.

Commissioners, fearful that a county-operated ambulance service would result in roughly a 15 per cent tax hike if Barrett went out of business, unanimously agreed to provide him with better than half of the \$500 he requested.

Commissioners indicated that Plainview city officials would be asked to make up the difference.

The issue of aid to Abernathy, however, resulted in

several votes after Commissioner Jack Eason's motion for \$210 was defeated in a two-to-two tie with Eason and Commissioner Marvin Churchill in favor, County Judge Henry Heck and Commissioner Tom (Jigger) Wheeler against. Commissioner Lloyd Goldston was absent.

The \$200 figure was finally adopted on a 3-1 vote. Wheeler voted no, and indicated he felt \$150 was enough.

In commenting on the Barrett matter, Judge Heck said: "It would seem proper

for the hospital to help in some way."

Betty Crocker Award Winners Named

Students named 1976 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow at high schools here have been announced. They won the honor by scoring highest at their schools in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to seniors throughout the country last December 2.

Each will receive a certificate from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living, and become eligible for state and national honors.

From the ranks of all winners in the state, a State Family Leader of Tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume

reference work, to the state winner's school.

Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with their faculty advisors, will gather in Washington, D. C., in April, for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city.

During the tour, personal observations and interviews are conducted to select the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarship increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

The test, personal observations and interviews are all prepared and conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

Winner at Abernathy High School was Kim M. Pinson. Brenda G. Ford was the winner at New Deal High School.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

The National Park Service would appreciate your helping us notify all persons domiciled in the United States who are 62 years of age or older that they are entitled by law to a FREE Golden Age Passport which permits them and the persons with them in their private vehicle to admission without charge at any area of the National Parks system charging such fees.

The permittees who travel by bus, bicycle or foot are entitled to have their spouses and children also admitted free. The Golden Age Passport holder also is entitled to use any designated recreation

sites, facilities, equipment or services provided at any Federal outdoor recreation area by the Government at half-price. The fact that a husband or wife has a Golden Age Passport does not disqualify the other member of the marriage to his passport also.

The Golden Age Passport is honored not only by the National Park Service but by the following Federal agencies: Bureau of Land Management, Fish and Wildlife Service, Bureau of Reclamation, Forest Service, Army Corps of Engineers and Tennessee Valley Authority.

A lifetime affair, the Golden Age Passport is available in Fort Worth at the National Park Service office, Room 10-G-03, at the Federal Office Building at 819 Taylor Street or at any National Park area charging an admission fee.

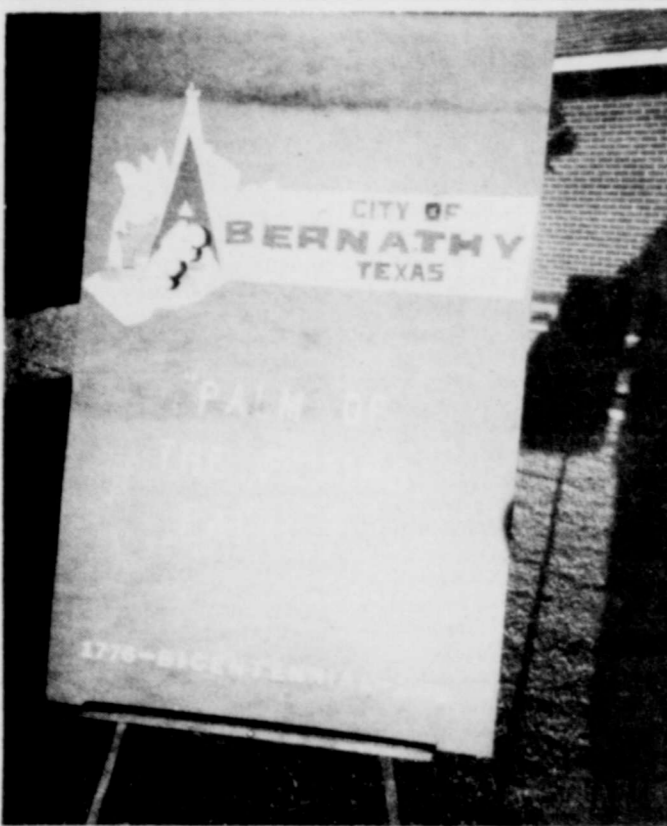

 Today (Feb. 19) marks the closing of Hale County's Draft Board, Local Board 45 in Plainview. All boards in the Nation's Selective Service System will be out of operation by Feb. 28. Brings back memories of the day men of this area registered for the draft in the old red brick school building. A Hale County resident at the time, my registration card was made out and signed by George W. Ragland, a Veteran of World War I. Local Board 45 has been in operation since the early days of World War II, or shortly before the U. S. entry Dec. 8, 1941. The

closest I ever got to the war was seeing it in news reels on a movie screen. The late Jack Hurst, who owned The Review and the Hale Center American, which was edited by Vic Lamb, volunteered for service in the Navy Sea Bees, and Vic and I were classified IV-A and left at home to run the respective newspapers. At a community meeting in the old school gym shortly after Dec. 8, 1941, Mr. Hurst announced that The Review would be sent free of charge to all of our men in the Armed Forces. That list grew to a peak of 500 copies being mailed to servicemen each week. Frequent changes of address made it necessary to type the addresses each week. Ruby Jo Merritt, who was employed in the office of Abernathy Motor Co. volunteered to type the addresses on the mailing wrappers every week. The Review went out on time to the men in service each week, thanks to Ruby Jo. And, thanks to Ruby Jo's boss, Wesley Harris, who was manager of Abernathy Motor Co. at that time. She typed the addresses along with her work in the office. Ruby Jo is now Mrs. Fendley and resides in Garland.

 In case you are wondering why the practice of mailing

The Review free to men in service terminated in later years after World War II. A Post Office Department ruling requires that newspapers mailed out at second class rate go only to paid subscribers. After a subscription expires, the newspaper has a certain time to take it off the mailing list. Some newspapers, not aware of these rulings, had their mailing list audited by postal inspectors and some had to pay as much as \$1,200.00 in back postage on the copies they mailed out free of charge.

 The Texas Water Development Board in Austin is the state department that issues, or withholds, authority to the firm that seeds clouds over a number of South Plains and South Panhandle counties to prevent hail. The Board conducted hearings in Plainview and Littlefield last week, and soon will issue its decision on whether or not to renew a permit for another period of cloud seeding. Those who oppose the seeding of clouds seemed to be in the majority at the two hearings. The hearings are not binding on the Board in making its decision. 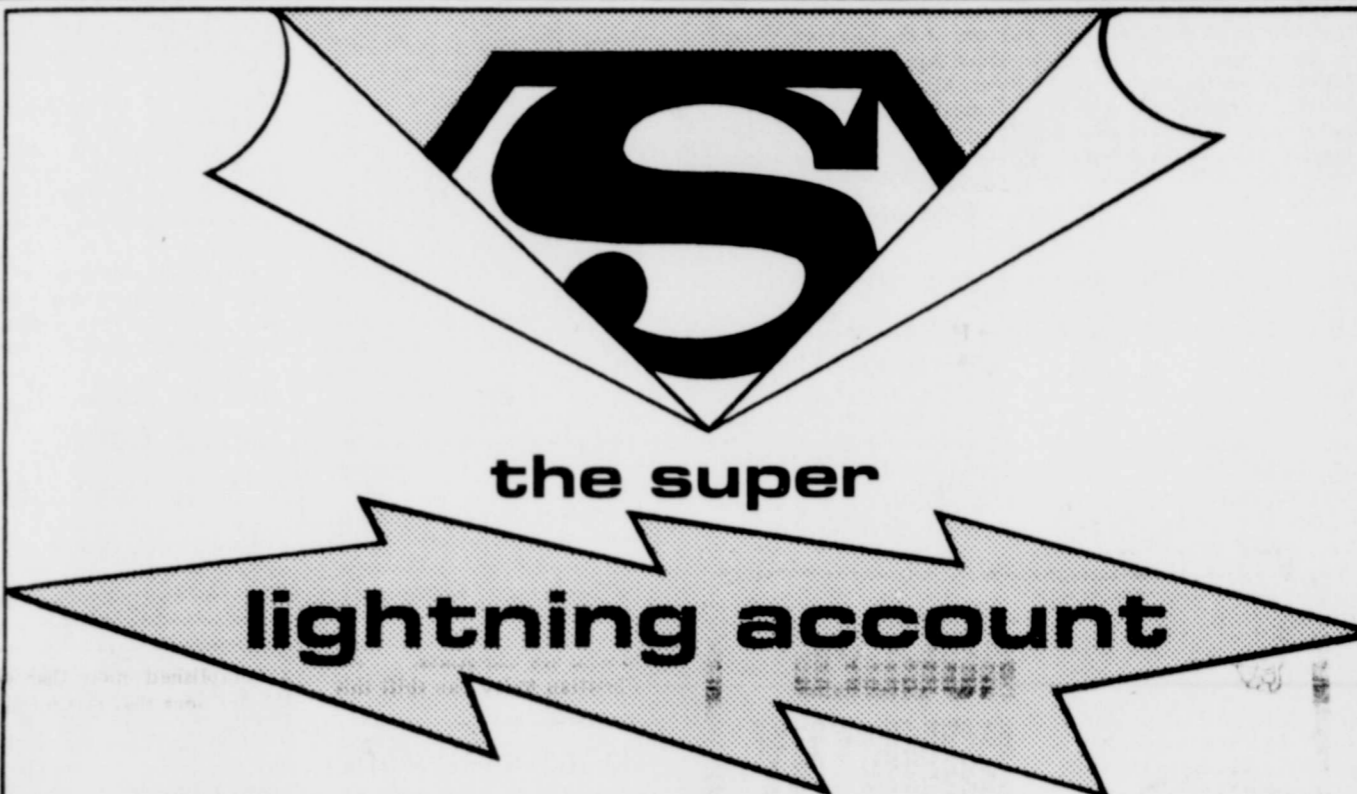

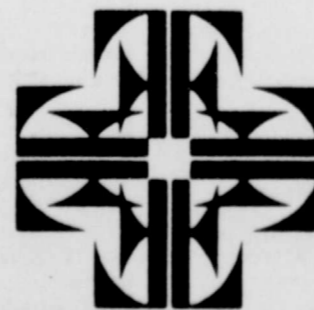

Poodle Named Amigo Finds Amigos In Incident at Navajo Mine


(This is an article as printed in the Farmington Daily Times newspaper in Farmington, New Mexico on Jan. 2, 1976)

A nearly blind French poodle from Texas caused a work stoppage at Utah International's cavernous Navajo Mine the other day. He also required a 50-ton crane and the services of five mine employees to rescue him when he became stranded on a shelf about 50 feet from the top of the ground and some 80 feet from the bottom of the open pit mine.

"Amigo" landed in his predicament when he was let out of a car, made a dash for the pit area, and disappeared over the ledge before anyone could stop him. He had been in the car with Mrs. D.L. Tucker and her daughters, Sherri and Anita, while their husband and father, a Lubbock, Texas truck driver, had been taking pictures.

When Tucker appealed to mine authorities for help, one of the mine's big cranes was moved to the site and swung over the area where "Amigo" was imprisoned. Then Ron Greenwood crawled up the boom to the ledge, gathered the frightened poodle in his arms, belted himself to the crane, and man and dog were both swung to safety.

About five hours elapsed, said a grateful Tucker, from the time Amigo tumbled onto the ledge until he was rescued. The tall Texan couldn't say enough kind words about the mine authorities and rescuers.

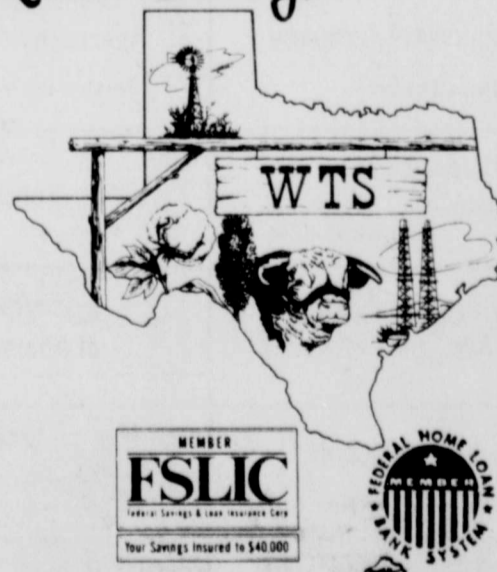

Lubbock County Tax Assessor Russell Hardin will have deputies from his office at Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy Friday, March 5 to sell 1976 vehicle license tabs to be affixed to the 1975 plates. The deputies will be at Thompson's from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. that day only. 1976 tabs for Hale County are sold at Abernathy Insurance Agency first door west of Abernathy Floral. The office is open from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday each week.

In the Dec. 18, 1975, annual meeting of stockholders, Abernathy First State Bank Capital was increased from \$250,000 to \$300,000 and the Certified Surplus was raised from \$250,000 to \$300,000. These increases will improve the bank's service to the community by reducing some of the loan limitations governed by law and based on the amount of the bank's capital and surplus designations.

The city could keep complete control of Ave. D, allowing angle parking, stop lights, etc., but would have to pay for all maintenance.
