Abernathy youth, especially Carrie Lee Lutrick, dominated Tuesday night's steer judging at 41st annual Plainview Stock Show at Hale County Agriculture Center.
Miss Lutrick, an Abernathy 4-H Club member and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Lutrick, exhibited the Champion Angus, came back took Grand Champion honors and also was presented the coveted Showmanship Award.
Her overwhelming performance took some of the glitter away from several

other outstanding performances during first day's activities.
Another Abernathy 4-Her Cindy Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Davis, took runner-up honors to Miss Lutrick in the heavy weight Angus division and later in the evening took the Reserve Grand Champion Steer trophy.
IT WAS a turn of events from last year's judging when the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Steers were of the Hereford Breed.
This year's Hereford winners were Rick Mason, Edmonson 4-H member, champion

and Eddie Dulin, Hale Center 4-Her, exhibited the reserve champion Hereford.
In the lamb judging, like the steer judging, Abernathy youth led the exhibitors, capturing two of the four champion honors. Winning for the South Hale County community were Kevin Gregory, Abernathy FFA, Fine Wool-Heavy Weight; and Roger Graham, Abernathy FFA, Fine Wool Cross-Heavy Weight. Graham is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L.A. Johnson and Gregory is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth Gregory.
TAKING THE other lamb champion honors were Shaunda Blankenship,

Prairieview 4-H Club, in the Southdown Heavy-Weight class and Cotton Center FFA member Chris Sageser in the Medium Wool Heavy Weight.
Sageser is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Sageser while Miss Blankenship is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl White.
Plainview FFA member Mark Churchwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Churchwell, won the Showmanship Award.
Abernathy FFA member Brenda Bowen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bowen, exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow named Supercross, while the Reserve Grand Champion barrow also was shown by an Abernathy FFA student Todd Thompson. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Thompson.
Supercross, a cross between a Hampshire and a Chester, had won reserve grand champion in the Abernathy Stock Show and walked away with top honors in Wednesday's swine show.

In the Poland China group, Hale Center FFA member David Trotter had the champion while Abernathy 4-Her Micah Griffin had the reserve champion. Trotter is son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Trotter and Griffin is son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Griffin.
Like last year's show, there were large numbers of participants showing lambs. Lamb judge Joe Ed Wise of Seminole discussed the situation, "The lamb is popular, especially with the younger showmen, because they're so easy to exhibit."
"Also, there is less chance for a younger person to get physically hurt. I really think the lamb is as good of an animal there is to start a kid with," Wise added.

Nine Names To Appear On School Board Election Ballots

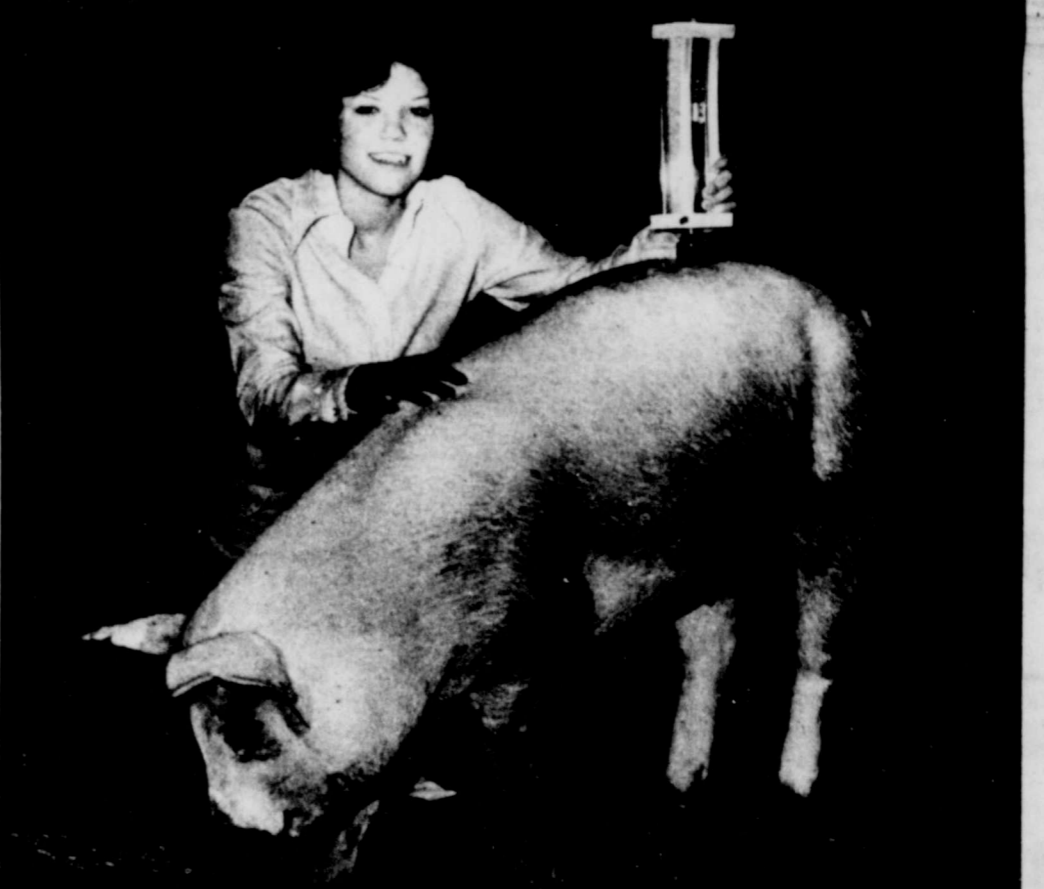

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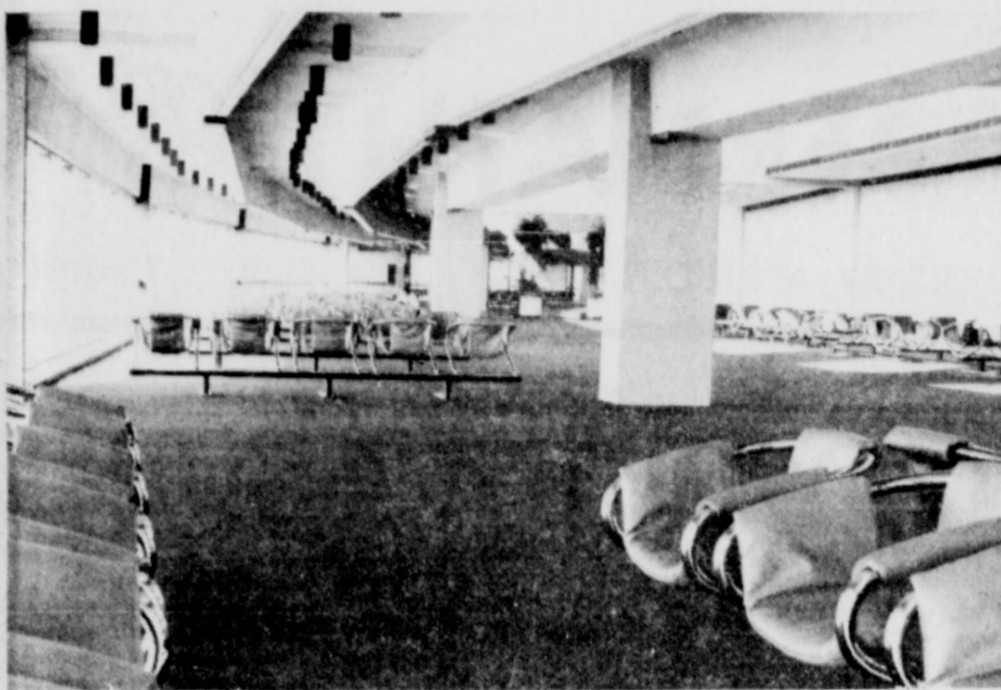

PATRICIA HAMMIT IS FIRST WOMAN IN AREA'S PREDOMINANTLY MALE AGRICULTURAL FIELD

Lubbock, Tex. -- Patricia Hammit, a senior from Plainview, will be the first woman vocational agriculture teacher qualified through the 41-year-old vocational agriculture education program at Texas Tech University.
Mrs. Hammit, who was also the first girl to join the Plainview High School Future Farmers of America chapter, said she hopes to find a teaching position within commuting distance of Lubbock. Her husband, Larry, a Baylor University graduate, is an accountant for Plains Coop Oil Mill in Lubbock.
Prospects may be slim for a woman wanting to teach agriculture in the public schools on the South Plains, reports Thomas L. Leach, chairman of the agriculture education department.
The chances for Mrs. Hammit landing a teaching job in a male-dominated field could be determined by where the jobs open this spring, she indicated. However, Mrs. Hammit will have other career opportunities in agriculture-related businesses, Leach said.
There are no women agriculture teachers in South Plains public schools, and there are only two women teaching agriculture in public schools in the state.
Although not permanent teaching jobs, Mrs. Hammit and 27 senior men will be student-teaching at 17 different schools across the South Plains from Monday, March 15, through May 7, as required in their program.
The vocational agriculture teaching program has existed at Texas Tech since 1934, Leach said, and has had excellent acceptance by area public schools.
Mrs. Hammit and Randall Lacey will spend their eight-week student-teaching requirements at Abertnathy, under supervising teachers Jerry Adams and Walter Cox and supervising Superintendent Delwin Webb and Principal Curtis Davenport.
"My greatest dilemma when I first came to Tech was deciding between vocal music and agriculture for my major," Mrs. Hammit said.
She was determined, however, and started her college work as an animal science major, later changing to ag education.
Reared on a farm-ranch, Mrs. Hammit first tried her academic hand at agriculture during her high school senior year--in coop ag as a part-time dairy worker. She also worked for a veterinarian while she attended high school. These experiences were enough to sway her to an agriculture career.

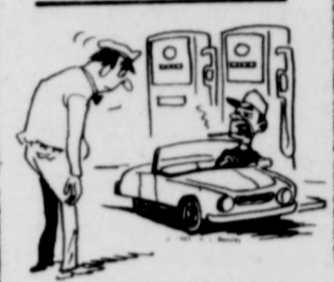


Herschel Wilson, Singing Disciples Hold Services

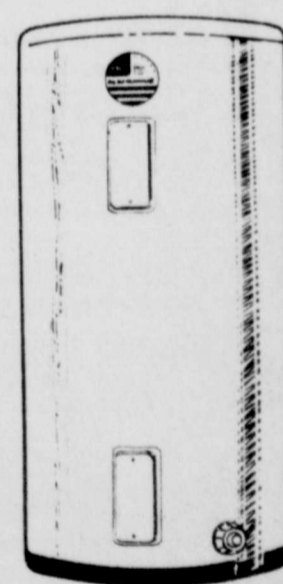

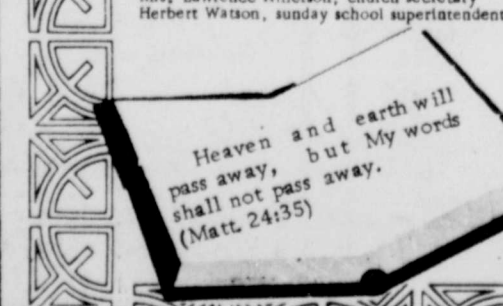

County Farms May Benefit From Conservation Program

Funds are available in Lubbock County for installation of conservation practices on area farms under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Bob Arhelger, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, reports landowners may enter into a cost sharing program on their farm with the Soil Conservation Service to conserve soil and moisture. It is one way a landowner can get financial assistance in installing expensive conservation measures that he could not afford on his own.

Arhelger describes a Great Plains contract as a planned conservation program that will cover a minimum period of 3 years

to a maximum period of 10 years. In this way, a landowner can tailor his conservation program to fit his financial capabilities.

141 Great Plains contracts have been carried out in Lubbock County with 18 more in effect at the present time. When a Great Plains contract is completed, the farm has had a complete conservation program applied.

Arhelger says Lubbock County farmers or landowners who are interested in the program or desire further information can check with the local Soil Conservation Service Field Office. Soil Conservation Service technicians will be glad to explain all phases of the program.
