Only other runoff voting in Hale County offices will be in Precinct 1 for commi-Eigar Brown and Ronald Morris will be opponents. Both received more votes than did incumbent Marvin Churchwell.

Also on the ballot June 5 in Hale and Lubbock Counties will be runoff voting in some state offices. The only races in runoff

voting June 5 in the Hale County Lakeview box will be in state races.

Lubbock County races of interest in this area for the June 5 voting will be the runoff battle between incumbent Sheriff Choc Blanchard and challenger lackie Sullivan, and the Precinct 3 commissioner race. 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

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New Station Will Use Coal As Primary Fuel

Southwestern Public Service Company's new Harrington Station northeast of Amarillo, is nearing completion, and it will be the first SPS generating plant to use coal as its primary fuel.

The coal that will be used in the plant is low-sulphur western coal mined and brought in by unit train from Gillette, Wyoming. The trains have about 110 cars designed and built specifically to haul coal. Each unit train brings about 10,000 tons of coal to the plant on a twice-a-week

Southwestern's system chemistry laboratory has recently been enlarged and expanded to provide a complete facility for analyzing and testing coal.

The lab, located at the Nichols Station plant one mile south of the new Harrington Station, takes coal samples for testing and analyzing from two different

The first source is at the mine site where the coal is being loaded into the unit train. The purpose of the tests of this sample is to assure SPS that it is getting the kind of quality of coal for which it is paying. The lab analyzes the moisture content, the percent ash, the percent volatile and most important, the heat value or the BTU content of the coal.

While the price of coal is generally expressed in terms a BTU per ton basis. In other words, it's the amount of energy in the coal that determines it value.

The second source of samples of coal for testing is from the conveyorbelt at the power plant where the coal is being moved from the crusher house to the bunker or storage silo. This sample is primarly for operational control. Immediate results indicate the kind of coal that is being fed into the boiler at that particular time.

Testing and analysis of coal in the SPS system lab starts with the preparation of the coal sample. The coal is poured into a pulverizer and ground to a very fine powderike consistency.

The first analysis is to determine the heat value or the BTU content, This is done in a laboratory apparatus called a Adiabatic Calorimeter. It measures the rise in temperature of a water bath caused by the heat generated when the coal sample is burned in an atmosphere of pure oxygen. The rise in temperature is compared to the rise experienced when a material is burned that has a known BTU content or is considered a standard. This comparison gives the BTU content or heat value of the

The BTU content of the coal SPS is receiving from the mines in Wyoming will average about 8, 700 per ton. The test is computer

programmed and a digital thermometer records the temperature rise as the sample burns while a digital printer records the results on

The next test is to determine the percent of volatile elements in the coalprimarly the amount of hydro-carbons and fixed carbon in the sample. A weighed sample is placed in a crucible and placed in a 555 degree C. electric fumace for six minutes to remove the moisture. The sample is then placed in a se cond oven for an additional six minutes at 950 degrees C. Then the sample is weighed and the weight loss represents the amount or percent of

volatile materials. Another important aspect of the coal that must be determined in the laboratory is the percent of ash it contains. To make this test, the sample is placed in a 750 with forced air. Complete combustion is attained in this analysis and all that remains is the ash-oxides of iron, aluminum, silica, cal-

cium and magnesium. The coal that SPS is receiving for use at Harrington Station has approximately five percent ash. This means that in every 100 ton car of coal there will be about five tons of ash. The 350,000 kilowatt unit at the new plant will use about 1million tons of coal per year, leaving about 50, 000 tons of fly ash.

of dollars per ton, Southwest-SOUTHWESTERN SURVEY REVEALS AREA CATTLE FEEDING ON DECLINE

The number of cattle being fed in area feedlots is still on the decline, it was revealed today in the 1976 Fed Cattle Report compiled by the Agricultural Development of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The report covers the 45,000 square mile area served by SPS, including 30 counties on the North and South Plains of Texas, 4 counties in Eastern New Mexico, 3 in the Oklahoma Panhandle and one county in Southwestern Kansas.

Fed cattle production for 1975 was down 19, 6 percent with 3, 280, 443 cattle fed compared to 4,082,142 in 1974. The peak year for number of cattle fed was 1973 when area feedlots fed 4, 962, 763 head. The 1975

33. 9 percent since 1973. Feedlot capacity since 1974-the peak year-has also declined 5, 1 percent while the number of feedlots with 1,000 head capacity and above has gone down from 191 in 1971 to 148 at the beginning of this year.

Sam Thomas, SPS Agricultural Development Manager thinks that the long term future for the cattle feeding industry is bright "The experiences of the past two years has had a strong similarity to the 1963-64 periods when the profit picture was sobad it appeared the cattle

erience has been complicated by higher grain costs and feeder cattle, but the enthusiasm, dejection, despondency and elation that comes from the feed yards follows a very familiar pattern.

"I am in hopes that fed cattle numbers will increase at a 15 to 25 percent annual rate unless there is a compensatory reduction in fed cattle numbers in other areas," Thomas concluded.

kets and uses for the fly ash. It is particularly suited for use as a roadbed material, as an additive for concrete mixes and for landfill uses.

> When coal is burned in a boiler, it is necessary to know the fusibility or melting point of the ash. At certain temperatures, the ash begins to form slag inside the boiler and on the outside of the boiler tubes. This can eventually cause major problems in the boiler and lead to a complete shut-down for cleaning and repairs.

To determine the fusibility of ash, the sample is shaped into a cone and heated in an ash fusion furnace. By viewing the sample through an optical pyrometer, a devise for measuring the temperature of glowing objects, the melting point can be determined.

The temperature in the boiler is then kept justbelow this melting point, thus preventing the formation of slag and damage to the

Since the fly ash will be sold for other uses, it is important that an analysis be made to determine the percent of trace materials it contains. Trace materials include such metals as lead and arsenic that have a potential of being harmful to the environment. These tests make sure that the fly ash will not contaminate the water strata or nearby lakes and streams when used for commerical purposes.

The percent of trace metals in the coal sample are determined by the use of an atomic absorbtion spectrophotmeter. The sample is burned in a graphite furnace and a spectrical light beam analyzes the sample.


Finally, the coal sample is given a sieve analysis to check the size of the coal and to make sure it is not too large for the crusher equipment at the power plant. On the other hand, if the coal is too fine, if will be hard to control and create dust problems. This test also checks the performance of the coal pulverizer at the plant.


The introduction of coal as a boiler fuel marks a milestone in the energy picture for the 45, 000 square miles served by Southwestern Public Service Company. No more power plants will be built by SPS that use natural However, gas will play an important role for sometime in come.
