NEWS AND COMMENT by Buford Davenport

N6C--\$11,040.00. That is the equivalent of what Abernathy's 16 Emergency Medical Technicians have donated to their community. To qualify for the EMT rating, a person spends an estimated 300 hours classroom, study, hospital and ambulance training. That is 300 hours times 16 people, amounting to a total of 4,800 hours. That many hours based on the federal minimum wage law of \$2.30 per hour would be a dollar and cents figure of \$11,040.00. That much spent in time just to qualify. Add to that the number of hours these people have spent on runs since Abernathy's Emergency Medical Service ambulance started operation a few months ago and you have several thousand dollars more than the \$11,040.00 in time they spent to qualify.

Abernathy's Medical Technicians want to conduct seminars, workshops, schools or first aid training courses for this and neighboring communities. The EMTs also will be donating their time and efforts further if these sessions can be set up. The County Line Community Club has voted to have the Abernathy EMTs conduct a first aid course at the County Line Clubhouse next month. The EMTs will have open dates before the County Line event. If just a group of individuals, or any local organizations would like to attend courses here, call City Manager Larry Fields, 298-2545, 8 to 5, Monday through Friday, and he will contact the EMTs. Also, the Abernathy EMTs will, if called upon, conduct courses in neighboring communities, including New Deal which is in this EMS area. Some local EMTs have been involved in conducting courses as far away as Tulsa.

The Emergency Medical Technicians, as individuals and an organization, cannot solicit donations for equipment. I am not an EMT, so I am free to tell the public that a very vital piece of equipment is needed for the EMTs to use in first aid courses they will give. It's a "dummy" and these kind of dummies don't come cheap. Price range is from \$360.00 to \$1,600.00, depending on size and construction of the dummies. Similar to department store manikins, the "dummies" actually are manikins which are specially built models of the human body for teaching first aid and life-saving procedures. Among demonstrations that can be performed with the manikins is a course in what one should do until a doctor or EMTs arrive. They show what the layman can do until help arrives for a person who has quit breathing or whose heartbeat has stopped, and for a person whose breathing has been hampered by objects lodged in the windpipe (obstructed airway) or from the tongue stopping intake of air. In the proposed courses to be given by the EMTs, spouses of persons with a history of heart trouble may learn procedures that could save the life of their husband, wife or family member.

Someone, or some organization, experienced in fund raising should take over the project to solicit donations to buy this piece of equipment to be used by the EMTs. I'm not very good at this sort of thing, but we will help publicize such a drive.

Fondy, Oswalt, Riley Take Oath: NEW TRUSTEES SWORN IN, OFFICERS ELECTED AS SCHOOL BOARD CONSIDERS FULL AGENDA

At the regular meeting of the Board of Education of the Abernathy Independent School District, the oath of office was administered by Mr. Earl Carter to the newly elected board members Dan Fondy, Jerry Oswalt, and Bob Riley. After the swearing in ceremony and signing of commissions, the Board reorganized for the 1976-77 school year. Elected president was Billie Harrison, previously vice-president; Bob Riley, elected for vice-president, and David Pinson, secretary.

Routine reports presented to the board were the budget progress report through April; Tax Collection report showing 98.61% of the taxes as having been collected. Oral reports included reports of the U.L.L. band contest that was held in Abernathy on April 27-28; the luncheon report revealed that the cafeteria was in sound financial condition through the first 9 months of operation. Participation had dropped to 608 students in average daily participation. It was brought out that a drop during spring months is a common occurrence in public schools. The enrollment report indicated a slight decline from the previous month. Total enrollment of the local schools was 1168 on May 1st.

In other action, the Board accepted resignations of Kathy Compton, Migrant Teacher and Dwain Harris, High School Math teacher.

Correspondence was studied from the Office of the Governor concerning statewide appraisal and the opportunities that would be given to correct any inequities that might appear on the state report.

The Board set June 10th

as the meeting date for the Board of Equalization and appointed a board whose names will be announced after their acceptances. Without action, the board discussed a need for physical facility improvements. Those in attendance at this meet-

ing were: Billie Harrison, President; Bob Riley, Vice-president; David Pinson, Secretary; Lon Carmickle; Jerry Oswalt; Dan Fondy; Richard Howard. The next regular meeting will be June 7th at 8:00 p.m. in the Board Room of the high school.

Republican Primary Voters Warned Against "Crossing Over" For Area Democratic Run-Off Elections

Hale County Clerk Mildred Tucker warned that Hale County residents who voted in the May 1st Republican primary will not be allowed to vote in the Democratic party's June 5 runoff.

The warning came in response to speculation that many county Democrats who voted for Republican Ronald Reagan in the state's first residential primary will attempt to vote in the two Democratic Commissioner runoffs, featuring Ronald

Morris and Edgar Brown in the Precinct 1 race and incumbent Jack Eason and Henry Rieff in Precinct 3.

Miss Tucker said she had received several calls, both before and after the primary elections, concerning split voting in the primaries, which is a Class A misdemeanor.

She added, however, that a resident who did not vote in the May 1st primary will be able to vote in the Democratic primary runoff.

Also, primary voting has no effect on how residents may vote in the November general election.

SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK SLATED FOR MAY 23 - 30

May 23 through May 30 has been declared Soil Stewardship Week. This is a time for all people to pause and offer thanks to their Creator for the priceless gifts of air, soil, water, and sunshine which make all living things possible.

Soil Stewardship Week can be traced back to Rogation Days. More than 1500 years ago, the area of Vienne, France suffered widespread crop failure and hunger brought about by bad weather and earthquakes. The Bishop of Vienne called for prayer and penance on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The custom spread and now Rogation Days are widely observed around the world.

In the United States, Rogation Days became Soil and Soul Sunday held on the 5th Sunday after Easter. In 1946 this became Soil Stewardship Sunday. It was set aside by religious leaders to remind

their congregations of man's duty to be a good steward of the land.

In 1954, the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts began sponsoring the observance, expanding it to Soil Stewardship Week, beginning with the 5th Sunday after Easter and extending through the 6th Sunday. The program is carried on under the guidance of a special Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of clergymen representing many religious denominations.

This program is being conducted in order to help bring an awareness of the tragedy taking place throughout the State of Texas due to fires. 1976 is the tenth anniversary of the Shriners Burns Institute in Galveston. Since opening our heart and doors to burned children, we have admitted over 5,000 cases coming from 41 states and 16 foreign countries. This experience has taught us that the only humanitarian solution to the burn epidemic is prevention. We believe that you agree and trust that you will assist us in informing the citizens in your jurisdiction about the practices which can prevent a burn accident from happening to them or their children.

We can also expect and ask that we will receive health and life as we continue drinking in the word of God.

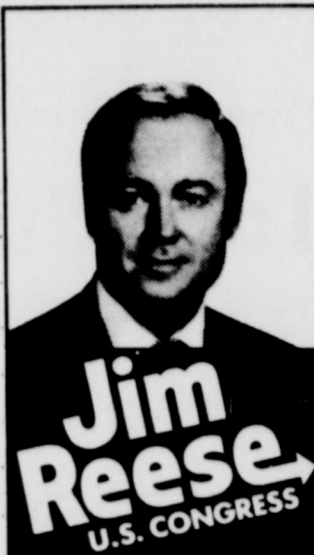

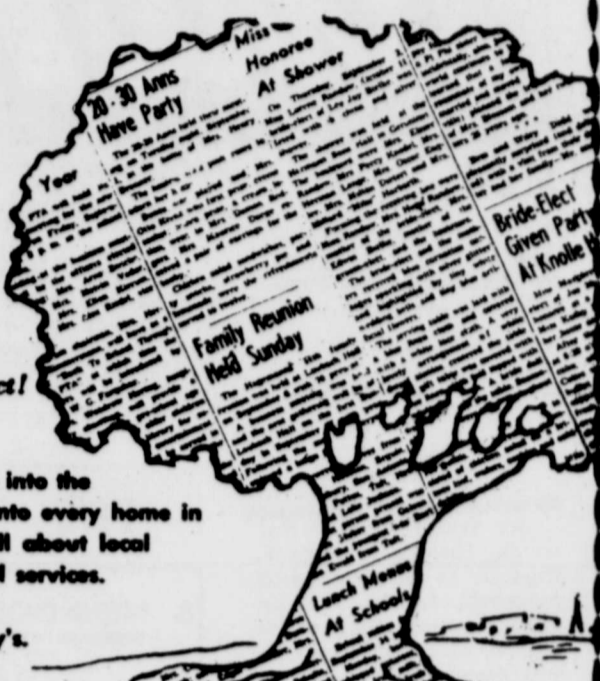

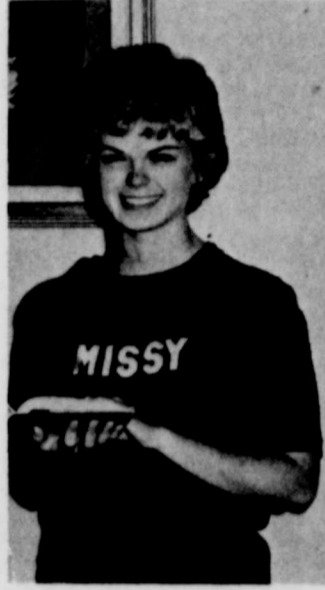

NEC---\$11,040.00. That is the equivalent of what Abernathy's 16 Emergency Medical Technicians have donated to their community. To qualify for the EMT rating, a person spends an estimated 300 hours classroom, study, hospital and ambulance training. That is 300 hours times 16 people, amounting to a total of 4,800 hours. That many hours based on the federal minimum wage law of \$2.30 per hour would be a dollar and cents figure of \$11,040.00. That much spent in time just to qualify. Add to that the number of hours these people have spent on runs since Abernathy's Emergency Medical Service ambulance started operation a few months ago and you have several thousand dollars more than the \$11,040.00 in time they spent to qualify.

Abernathy's Medical Technicians want to conduct seminars, workshops, schools or first aid training courses for this and neighboring communities. The EMTs also will be donating their time and efforts further if these sessions can be set up. The County Line Community Club has voted to have the Abernathy EMTs conduct a first aid course at the County Line Clubhouse next month. The EMTs will have open dates before the County Line event. If just a group of individuals, or any local organizations would like to attend courses here, call City Manager Larry Fields, 298-2545, 8 to 5, Monday through Friday, and he will contact the EMTs. Also, the Abernathy EMTs will, if called upon, conduct courses in neighboring communities, including New Deal which is in the EMS area. Some local EMTs have been involved in conducting courses as far away as Tullia.

The Emergency Medical Technicians, as individuals and an organization, cannot solicit donations for equipment. I am not an EMT, so I am free to tell the public that a very vital piece of equipment is needed for the EMTs to use in first aid courses they will give. It's a "dummy" and these kind of dummies don't come cheap. Price range is from \$360.00 to \$1,600.00, depending on size and construction of the dummies. Similar to department store manikins, the "dummies" actually are manikins which are specially built models of the human body for teaching first aid and life-saving procedures. Among demonstrations that can be performed with the manikins is a course in what one should do until a doctor or EMT arrives. They show what the layman can do until help arrives for a person who has quit breathing or whose heartbeat has stopped, and for a person whose breathing has been hampered by objects lodged in the windpipe (obstructed airway) or from the tongue stopping intake of air. In the proposed course to be given by the EMTs, spouses of persons with a history of heart trouble may learn procedures that could save the life of their husband, wife or family member.

A donation to buy such a mankin possibly could help save your life or the life of a loved one.

Someone, or some organization, experienced in fund raising should take over the project to solicit donations to buy this piece of equipment to be used by the EMTs. I'm not very good at this sort of thing, but we will help publicize such a drive.

Soil Stewardship Week can be traced back to Rogation Days. More than 1500 years ago, the area of Vienna, France suffered widespread crop failure and hunger brought about by bad weather and earthquakes. The Bishop of Vienna called for prayer and penance on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The custom spread and now Rogation Days are widely observed around the world.

In the United States, Rogation Days became Soil and Soul Sunday held on the 5th Sunday after Easter. In 1946 this became Soil Stewardship Sunday. It was set aside by religious leaders to remind

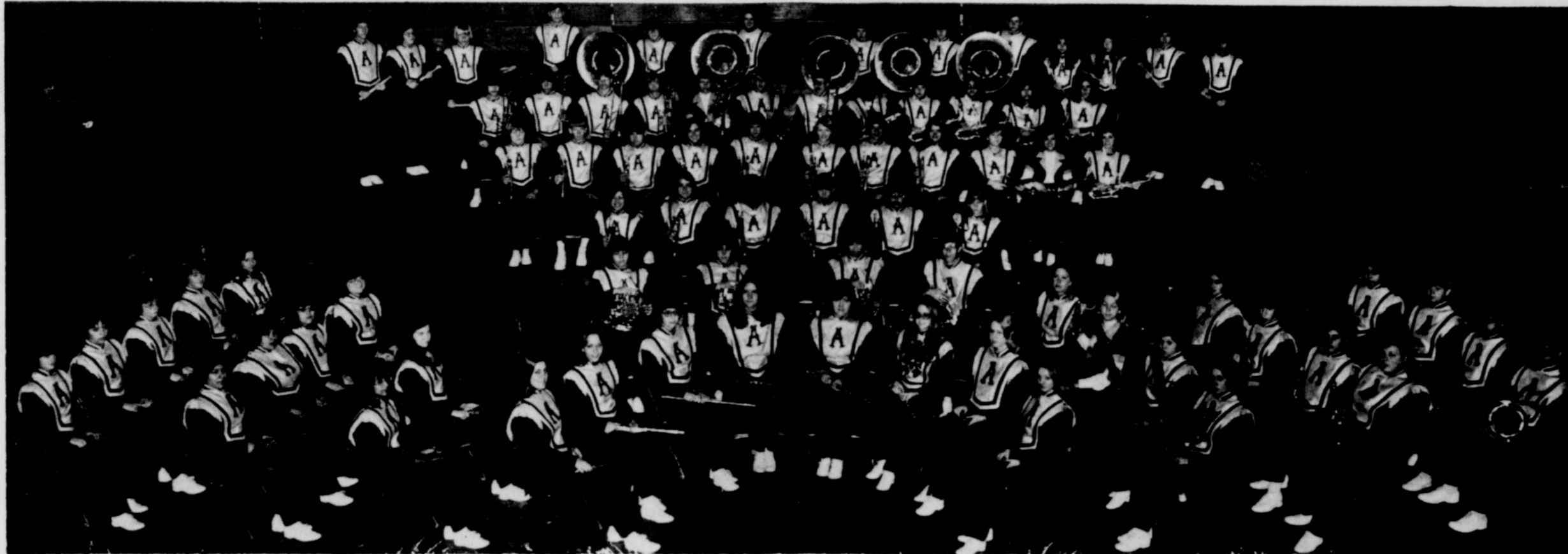

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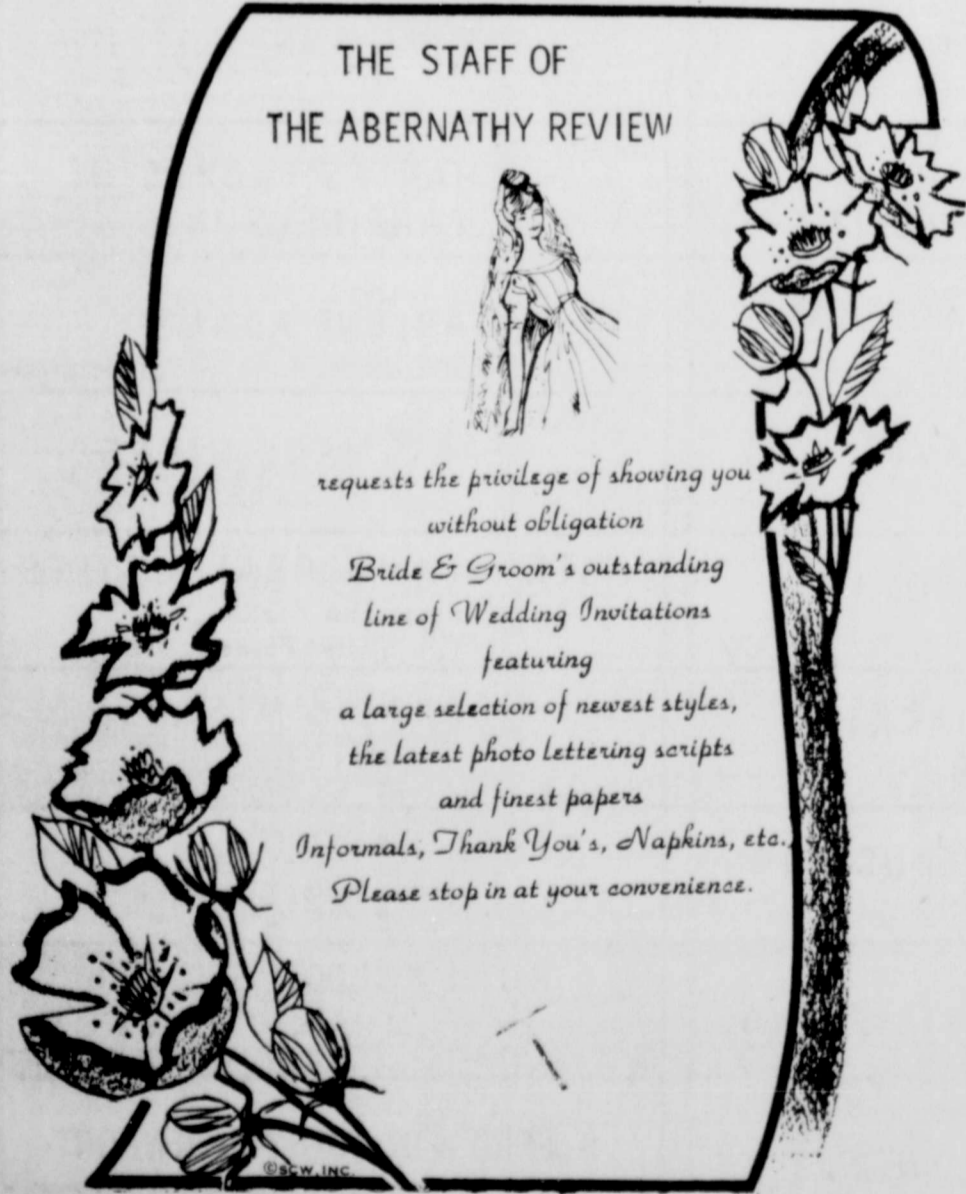

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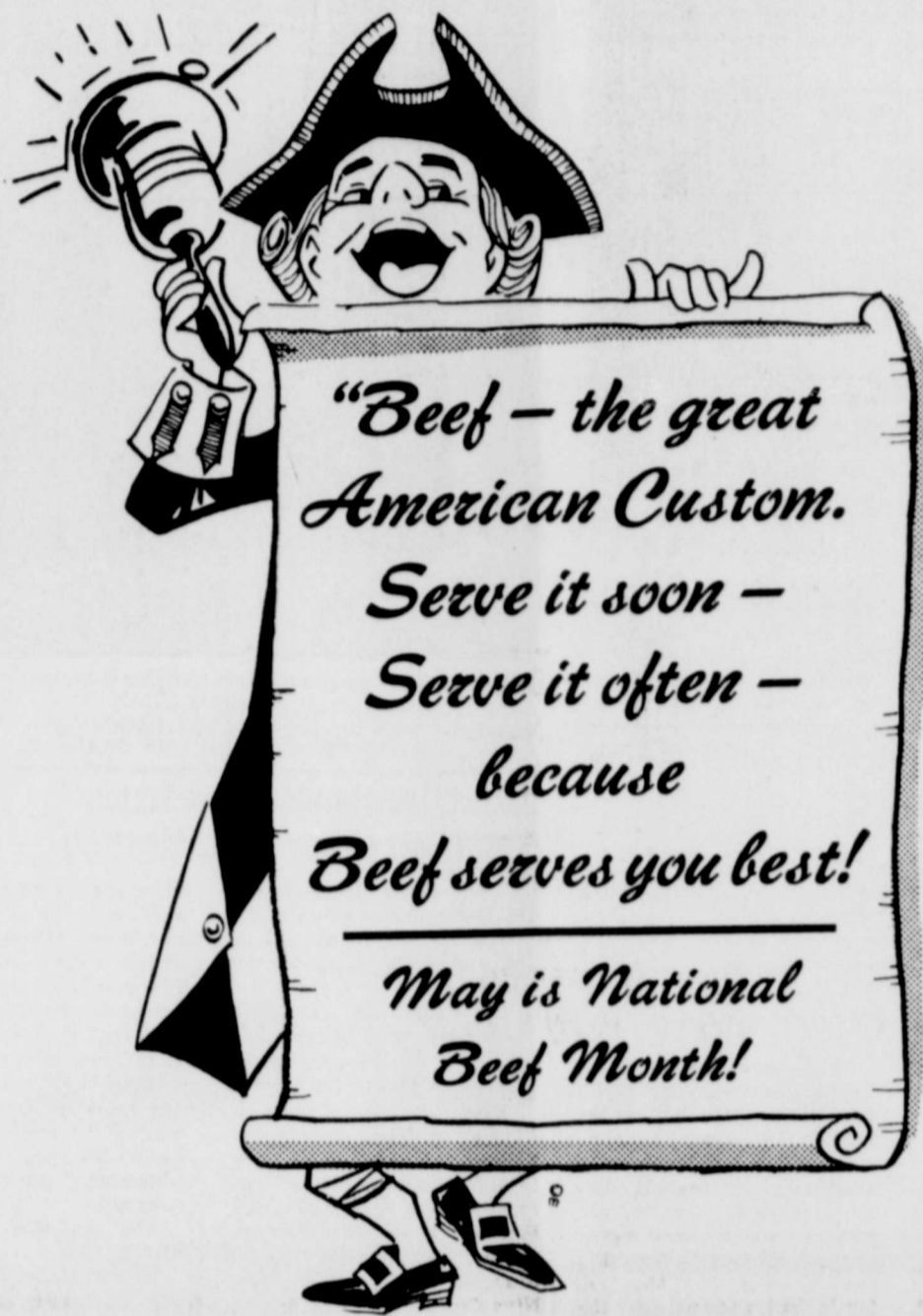

| 3 to 4-pound beef blade pot-roast | 1/2 cup buttermilk |
| 1 tablespoon flour | 6 medium carrots, cut in 2-inch pieces |
| 1 tablespoon dry mustard | 1 package (10 ounces) frozen Brussels sprouts or 1 pound Brussels sprouts |
| 1 1/2 Teaspoons Salt | 1 cup buttermilk |
| 1/4 teaspoon cooking fat | Flour for gravy |
| 1 beef bouillon cube | |
| 1/3 cup hot water | |

Mix flour, mustard, salt and pepper; dredge meat. Brown in cooking fat in large frying-pan or Dutch oven. Pour off drippings. Crush bouillon cube, dissolve in water, add to meat, cover tightly and cook slowly 1 1/2 hours. Add 1/2 cup buttermilk and carrots and continue cooking, covered, 30 minutes. Add Brussels sprouts and continue cooking, covered, 30 minutes or until meat and vegetables are tender. Remove meat and vegetables to warm platter. Blend 1 cup buttermilk with flour and use to thicken cooking liquid for gravy.

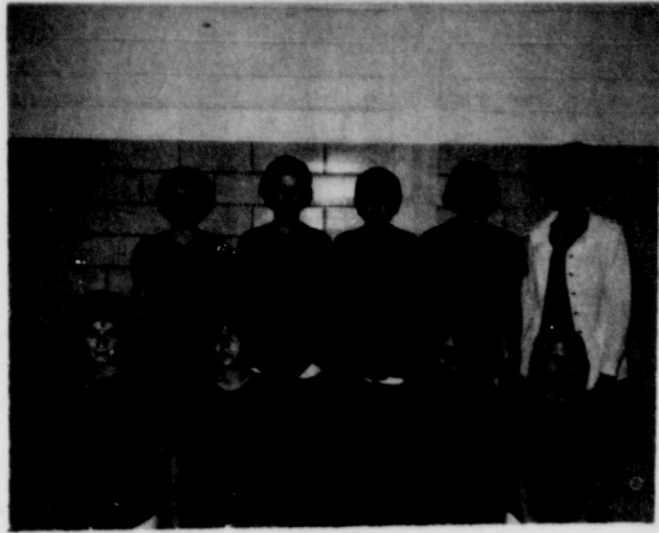

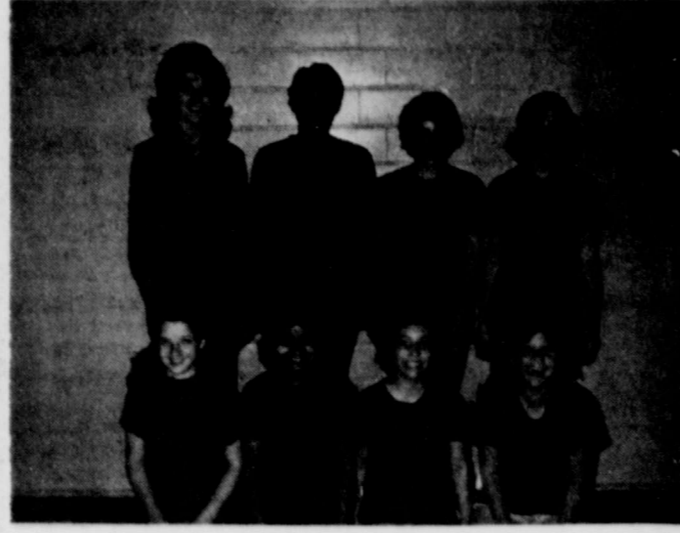

SAFER BUS TRANSPORTATION FOR SCHOOL CHILDREN IS AIM OF DRIVER-TRAINING PROGRAM UNDERWAY HERE

A Texas School Bus Drivers' training course is currently being conducted by the Education Service Center, Region XVII, at Abernathy Junior High School.

The course, part of a comprehensive safety program dictated by recent laws passed in the state legislature, is being carried out as a cooperative effort by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Education Agency, and the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety.

In passing the law, the state legislature charged the Texas D. P. S. and T. E. A. with the planning of a school

bus driver training program, and gave the responsibility for coordination and development of a statewide comprehensive traffic safety program to the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety.

Under the program, the local Region XVII Education Service Center, along with others over the state, has the responsibility of coordinating the training for area schools.

The course includes 20 hours of instruction aimed at making school bus drivers competent in every phase of school bus operations; and in making the local schools

transportation system safer for students.

Of the 20 hours involved in the course, eight are spent in exercises which simulate actual situations which might arise for school bus drivers; and twelve are spent in actual classroom instruction. Upon completion of the course, drivers will earn a School Bus Driver's Certificate, which is renewable every three years upon completion of an eight-hour refresher course.

Topics included in the course range from Preventative Maintenance and Regulations and Driving Procedures, to Defensive Driving

and Safety and Emergency Procedures. Instructor and coordinator for the local course is Frank Bartlett.

The training classes currently underway at the local school will end on May 17, and are made up mainly of athletic instructors from Abernathy, Cotton Center, New Deal, Idalou and Shallowater. An additional course will begin locally in August for regular bus route drivers.

Over the state, the aim of the program is to see at least 50 per cent of the state's school bus drivers completing the 20-hour course by August of this year.

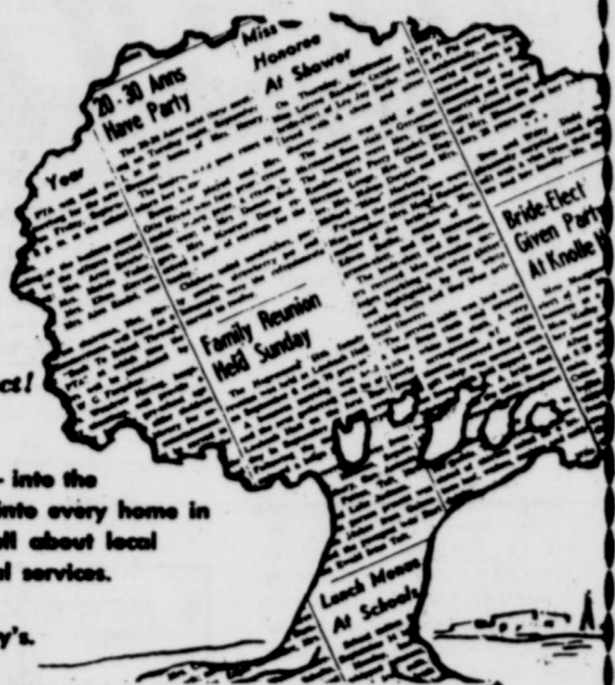

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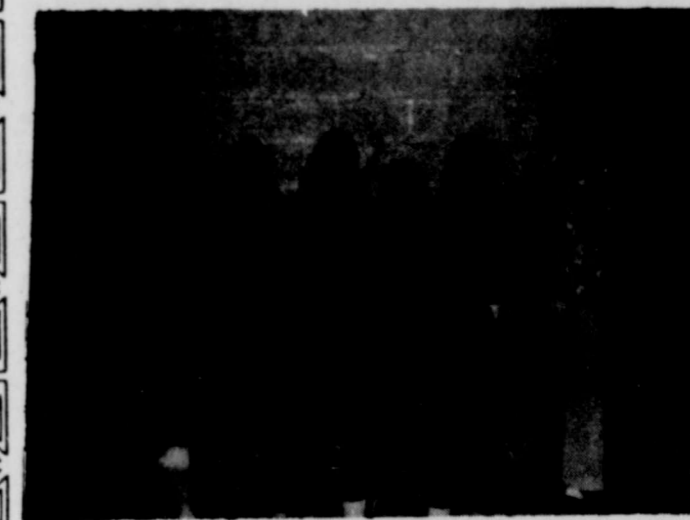
