

SWINE "NOT TO BLAME" FOR INFLUENZA PROBLEM

COLLEGE STATION ---Swine suffer from influenza each fall and winter just as humans do. But the virus that causes influenza in each is not the same, so swine should not be tabbed the villians in the current concern over a flu epidemic this fall.

"The current influenza danger is a human-to-human problem and does not really involve hogs or pork," emphasizes Dr. James Armstrong, a veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Since pigs or pork are not the cause of human

SHEEP OUTLOOK NOT BAAAAAAAAAAD-A decrease in sheep numbers has boosted the market outlook, says a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Choice slaughter lambs should average from \$52 to \$57 per hundredweight through June and then hit the mid-\$40's during the summer before rising some again during the last quarter of the year. Sheep numbers on January 1 were 8 percent below the January 1, 1975 level, with breeding ewes down 7 percent and sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter down 9 percent in the major sheep feeding states. The average sheep is worth about \$7 more this year than last.

Armstrong lists a few facts that human medicine and veterinary science authorities have agreed upon:

-- Medical concerns center on human-to-human airborne transmission of the disease, not swine to human. -- There is no known probability of contracting the

disease from eating pork. -- Transmission of influenza from swine to humans is regarded as a rarity to the point of being a

point of being a medical phenomenom.

-- There is no scientific certainty that the current socalled swine influenza in humans is the same virus found in swine.

Influenza was first diagnosed in swine in 1918 and took a heavy toll. However, it has recurred each year since then, with losses generally low -- ranging from one to three per cent. Armstrong points out that the disease spreads rapidly in swine herds but most animals recover in 3 to 10 days. Stunting and reduced gains are the most important e conomical factors.

pick up their financial feet a bit" in 1976, according to W.B. Criswell of Idalou, President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.,

"And after two bad years in 1974 and 1975, a good crop with decent prices this year for many of us is almost a must,

April rains have put overall High Plains moisture conditions in better shape than is normal for the first of May, the PCG official notes. An estimated 75 percent to 80 percent of the non-irrigated acreage slated for cotton has had sufficient moisture for seed germination, and observers point out that there is still time for the remainder to get rain during the most desirable planting season.

"Price-wise, almost every indicator points to strong markets this fall," Criswell says. "Consumption of our product is on the increase in this country, export sales are almost certain to be up substantially from 1975, and I see very little likelihood that the U.S. or foreign producing countries will grow enough cotton in 1976 to create a surplus supply.

The carryover of cotton in the U.S. on August 1 this year is now expected to be in the area of 3.5 million bales. U.S. production, based on the indicated plantings of 11.2 million acres and assuming normal abandonment and average yields, may come to about 10.5 million bales, giving a total supply for the 1976-77 marketing year of 14 million bales. That figure is even lower than the total supply of 14.1 million for 1975-76, in itself the lowest supply since 1923-24.

Many in the industry are concerned that cotton supplies may be too short and cotton prices too high over the next year or two, causing cotton to lose markets to its synthetic com-





NSC---One of the good reasons for marking your ballot for Choc Blanchard to continue as Sheriff of Lubbock County is the tripe smeared over page one of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Saturday morning, May 15. Would it please the A/J if the taxpayers of Lubbock County bought the Hilton Inn, placed bars on loors and windows and put the prisoners up in style?

NSC---It was a sad day for Lubbock and the South Plains when Charlie Guy and associates sold The Avalanche-Journal to the present ownership, based in Augusta, Ga. Charlie Guy and his staff had a real feeling for the city and the South Plains... a feeling that no longer is

The new owners of the A/J quit sending the afternoon paper out into the boondocks soon after they took over from Charlie Guy and associates. It is circulated in the city only.

The Fort Worth Star-Telgram, once among the best daily newspapers in Texas, no longer is available on news stands in Hale County. I don't know about newsstands in Lubbock. We were told that the closest the Star-Telegram delivery truck comes to this area is Odessa. Whether or not the Star-Telegram was cut off out here before, or after, Amon G. Carter, Jr., and associates sold to an Out-of-State corporation I do not know. Outof-state interests coming in and buying up the print and electronics news media is not good for Texas.

It's time again to remind readers that opinions expressed in "News & Comment" are my own, and do not necessarily reflect those of the publishers and editor. I add this for their protection, because the Avalanche-Journal could make me feel pretty silly for writing these comments.... such as, if the Avalanche-Journal comes up and gives Abernathy extra

good coverage before and after our three-day celebration, July 3-4-5. We hope they do. They will be welcome in Abernathy...then, or anytime they choose to come. The fact that I disagree with their policies has nothing to do with that.

AUSTIN-Beware of high-pressure telephone salesmen peddling pesticides, cautions Agriculture Commissioner John C.

Although no complaints have been received of such deceptive practices in Texas, it's a good idea to be on the alert, White said.

"In eleven states, farmers have been duped by salesmen who claim, over the telephone, that the pesticide could be used with crops and would provide three to six years of weed control, and the salesmen failed to indicate that the product was in diluted strength." White explained.

Upon delivery, most farmers found that the label specifically read "for non-crop use."
